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Frank Mullins turns 100

Herbert Francis Mullins, better known as Frank, is to spend his time between Augusta and the Bullant Drive celebrating the milestone of turning 100 years old this farm until selling the property in 1977. then from 1935 he boarded at Christ Church Grammar School in Claremont where he received his junior school certificate studying Mathematics, Physics, Biology, Commercial Methods and Bookkeeping. Frank is Christ Church Grammar School's oldest living old boy.

Farming was in Frank's blood and after he finished school he returned to the farm in Waroona where he milked cows on the family farm until at the age of 20



he was enlisted to the 44th Australian Infantry Battalion where he did two years of service. During this time the battalion was never deployed overseas but rather was assigned to the Special Mobile Force that was formed to respond in the event of a Japanese raid against installations in Western Australia. Frank was discharged in October 1944 and paid out a sum

of 85 pounds, enough to purchase a motorbike and a farm on Bullant Drive in Forest Grove where he made a success of farming; milking 50 cows.

Frank married the love of his life Ethel in 1959 in Witchcliffe and honeymooned at the Perth Royal Show. The farm was affected by the Karridale bush fire of 1961. Frank and Ethel were holidaying in their caravan near Albany at the time and of course there were no mobile phones at the time to easily notify Frank of the disaster. The local police officer informed Frank of the fire.

Frank and Ethel later purchased a house in Augusta overlooking the Blackwood River and Frank continued At the age of 95 he moved to the Leeuwin Frail Aged Lodge and then later to Augusta Hospital where he still resides. Frank will be celebrating his 100th birthday with his family in Augusta where he will be presented with his letter from Her Majesty the Queen.

Leeuwin Lines

With life member Phill Robinson's second term as President completing at the

end of June (his 27th year as a Lion), it's worth reflecting on the contribution that Phill has made in leading the team of Leeuwin Lions & Volunteers over the past two years.

- The establishing of his 'beloved' Container Deposit Scheme which commenced in October last year and from the Lions' portion they receive for processing the returned containers (6c per container) has already paid for the shed modifications / upgrade and the new forklift - some \$35,000 in total.
- In establishing the Scheme there was a lot of behind the scenes detailed work in establishing, recruiting, and training volunteers in the computer system, occupational health & safety compliance, safe working procedures, logistics of collecting & despatching recycled containers and waste as the processing of the recycled containers is very much upon an industrial scale. Every Thursday & Saturday morning there are 8 to 10 volunteers processing the containers.
- Phill & Lion Brian Thomson undertook the lead on shed renovations, not sure who did all the recruiting, chief suspect that Lion & wife Gail had something to do with the whole process and is certainly making a big contribution along with the likes of Lion Peter Keppel with his Occ. Health & Safety experience. All assisting Phill getting the project of the ground.
- Under Phill's leadership, the current year's donations to local community groups and individuals is in the order of \$90,000 with a further \$36,000 already committed for the next financial year. The new year commitments include funding for Skin Cancer Screening bus, funding of traineeships for the forthcoming Augusta Child Care Centre, sponsorship for two positions on the youth training ship Sail Training Ship Leeuwin etc
- In addition to the above \$90,000 in direct donations, the recycling on the Container Deposit Scheme adds a further \$60,000 back into the community (see below)
- Well done Phill on your leadership over the past two years.

Container Deposit Scheme

The total number of re-cycled containers is now approaching 600,000 or in monetary terms, \$60,000 back to either community groups or individuals & \$36,000 to Leeuwin Lions for running of the scheme. Let alone the reduction in waste going to landfill.

With Leeuwin Lions running this scheme when combined with direct donations of \$90,000 there is the above \$60,000 from the Container Deposit Scheme which is in effect increasing the contribution Leeuwin Lions make into the community to some \$150,000 for the past year.

Just a reminder it's estimated that some 30-40% of containers that qualify for the 10c refund are not being recycled. In monetary terms this is estimated at some \$30 -40,000 pa forgone to the Augusta community when you combine the Lions & individual refunds.

presentation by Steve Wood, "Winter in the Garden". Steve's enthusiasm is so infectious. As he said, winter is all about weeds - don't we know it! There has been pretty much world wide condemnation of Roundup, so, if you are using it remember to use a mask and gloves and only use it on paving and pathways. He recommends Yates 'Slasher', while it

is more expensive, one bottle costing meeting we had about \$30 will last a year. He has a very clever weeding tool (see photo), which he hopes will become available before too long. And those snails and slugs? Use organic pellets by Multiguard. They are made from an iron product and so when they break down they will not leach nasty chemicals into the soil. Spent coffee grounds added to your compost bin also helps deter the critters. There are so many plants and veggies that can be grown over winter but remember to feed them. Richgro produce a range of 'Organics' garden food which is excellent. This feeds the life in the soil, but it still needs some potash. Winter is the time to propagate cuttings, in particular deciduous trees and roses. Water in with some Yates 'Anti Rot' to prevent rotting. Remember, for your Roses to look their best for the Spring Show, prune them 100 days beforehand, so that would be around the second week of July. Manure straight after pruning.

Over the years, several celebrated golfers have pitted their skills on the country courses and have been significantly challenged by the nuances and complexities of sand greens.

Michael Dennis, a well-known Western Australian golfer, has won the tournament on six occasions. Having grown up on a farm in Karridale and having first played golf in Augusta as a kid, Michael has an advantage when it comes to sand greens. In fact, many readers will know Michael's family very well.

The Dennis family were Foundation Members and Office Bearers of AGC - Pat and Jack Dennis were his grandparents, and Jennifer and Barry were his parents.

Stephen Leaney is probably the most prominent golfer to have won the Sand Greens title. Coming from Royal Perth GC, Leaney claimed the winners shield at Augusta GC in 1992 and turned Professional later that same year. Over his career, he won 16 professional tournaments. In 2003, he came second in the US Open and, in 2004, he qualified and played in the Masters (Augusta, Georgia, U.S.).

The clubs that host the Sand Greens are each subject to various environmental and/or financial constraints and must rely on the innovation, energy, and good nature of



its volunteers. AGC, for example, is constrained by a lack of water. The water table in our coastal sand hills is over 800 feet deep, and the cost of pumping water to the surface is prohibitive. Lack of trained personnel is another limitation faced by many smaller clubs. A good grass green requires the close supervision of expert turf managers. It is common knowledge that, although slower, a sand green is a far superior putting surface when compared to a poorly maintained turf green. Synthetic greens are another option,

but they, too, have significant Sand Green at Leonora maintenance requirements. GC

As golfers know, no one green is ever the same as another. Sand greens, in particular, vary radically, as their "puttability" is determined by factors such as sand type, proximity to the ocean or rivers, as well as factors like annual rainfall and wind.

I strongly encouraged them to undergo a medical assessment at the Augusta Hospital where they were cleared, before continuing their walk.

Naturaliste Charters Whale Watching

Flinders Bay has swelled with whales over the past few months! The annual migration is well underway where whales migrate from Antarctica to the coastline of Australia. Here they will mate, give birth and enjoy the warmer waters.

The Humpback whales this season have been spectacular! Male competition pods been showing off their agility and endurance. High energy displays of breaching, tail lopping, rolling and shoving all to impress a viable female. They are also very curious of boats, coming up alongside for a closer look!

These whales not only bring beauty and entertainment to Flinders Bay, they also supply the area with crucial nutrients! While feeding in Antarctic waters during summer, the whales develop a yellow-coloured tinge to their skin. This is a thick layer of epizoic diatoms and cyamids, also known as simple algae and lice! They are non-parasitic, so they do not hurt the whale unless in plague proportions. When the whales arrive in warm waters the outside layer of skin will slough off, taking with it the diatoms and cyamids. Breaching and slapping onto the water will aid in this "moulting" process.

All of this adds an extra supply of essential nutrients to the local marine ecosystem as fish, crustaceans and seabirds will feed on it! The skin can come off in very small pieces up to an A4 size and leaves fresh clean skin underneath. The whale's migration can be essentially described as a six month visit to the day spa.

In the coming months we expect to see more Southern Right Whales take up residency in the bay while Humpback whales continue their northward journey to give birth.

In the bay, we ask that boat drivers reduce their speed during these migratory months to avoid a whale collision. It is also important to note that Southern Rights with a calf are the most vulnerable. If you see a cow and calf pair, keep your distance. This pair will continue to move around if disturbed and each time

Worth taking your camera out!

If you've ever noticed any colourful, strangely patterned moths or caterpillars in your garden, chances are that they may be one of our true blue, Aussie hawk moths and caterpillars. There are approximately 60 species of hawk moths in Australia, all differing vastly in colour, shape and size.

Identification

From the family Sphingidae, hawk moths are large, stout, and have cigar-shaped bodies. They are such good fliers that several aircrafts are named after them. Most hawk moth caterpillars have a distinctive spike on their back end. Many of the hawk moth caterpillars have diagonal bands running across their bodies, or large eye spots on the thorax and abdominal sections. These markings help with camouflage, disrupting the outline of the body to confuse predators such as birds.

A brief life story

Moths can lay up to 100 eggs on the underside of the larval (caterpillar) food plant. Early instar caterpillars feed underneath the leaves, but will make their way to the stems as they grow and develop their camouflage patterns.

Once large enough, these caterpillars will pupate within the leaf litter. Pupation can last anywhere from one to 25 weeks.

Fun Facts

- Hawk moth caterpillars cannot bite or sting and their spike is harmless! They may sometimes regurgitate green fluid if threatened or annoyed.
- Hawk moth adults are predominantly active during dawn and dusk. They can be seen around plants feeding on nectar, or around water such as puddles.
- Hawk moths are the most significant pollinators of papaya and pawpaw plants.

Although hawk moth caterpillars may eat your plants, their damage is minimal and moths play an essential role in providing great pollination services for many plant species. It's best to leave them be!

Scott River Action Plan Implementation Strategy Gets the Green Light

2020 saw the release of the Scott River Action Plan report which was prepared in collaboration with the Scott River farming community, local industries, Traditional Owners and government agencies. The Action Plan presents a framework to protect and enhance the health of waterways of the Scott River Catchment without impacting on current and future agricultural productivity.

The implementation of the report's recommendations are the next stage of this important piece of work, with the LCDC securing funding from the State NRM for a 3 year program of activities including whole farm planning, landholder workshops & support, focusing on drainage & nutrient management, soil health, cultural awareness and riparian works at the farm & sub-catchment scale, GIS Mapping, revegetation works & case studies.

A whole farm planning course will be kicking off in July with fully funded places reserved specifically for 5 farming enterprises (2 participants per farm enterprise) from the Scott River area. This innovative 4-day program will show farmers how to design and plan a healthy, resilient and productive rural landscape for their farm business in the 21st century.

The planning components will cover key issues such as how to "see" your landscape using landscape thinking, the water and nutrient cycles in rural landscapes, how energy flows and biodiversity functions in rural landscapes, climate, landforms & soil types on your property, the landscape and agricultural elements of rural planning and steps to effective property planning.
