PURSUANT to the powers contained in Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, you are hereby required and therefore ordered by the local government to carry out fire prevention work in accordance with the requirements of this Notice, on or before 30 November 2021, and maintain the requirements up to and including 12 May 2022

Inspections, appointments, education and compliance

Owners and occupiers who would like an early inspection by appointment, for reasons including bio-security, locked gates and dangerous animals, or for explanation on the requirements of this Notice, should contact Rangers as soon as possible and by no later than 1 November 2021. Where inspections by appointment are not requested, Rangers are appointed as Bush Fire Control Officers with the power to enter land under the Bush Fires Act 1954 and will be inspecting properties for compliance without further notice from **1 December 2021**.

People who do not comply with this Notice or a Variation to this Notice may be issued with an infringement Notice (\$250) or prosecuted with a penalty up to \$5,000. The Shire of Augusta Margaret River may carry out the required work on the land at cost to the owner/occupier.

Rangers may exercise discretion where owners and occupiers have engaged with the Shire and can demonstrate that they have taken active steps to comply with this Notice.

Requirements of landowners and occupiers

- All landowners/occupiers must carry out fire prevention work in Part A of this Notice.
- 2. Owners/occupiers of Residential and Rural/Residential lots over 4001m² must comply with the requirements of Part A and Part B.

Variations to the requirements of this Notice

Where compliance with requirements specified in this Notice is not practical due to environmental considerations and constraints, owners may apply to the Shire of Augusta Margaret River for a Variation to the Firebreak Notice. Applications must be completed on the approved form, which is available upon request or can be downloaded via the Shire's website. Applications submitted after 1 November 2021 will be required to pay a \$150 fee, but applications received before that date are processed free of charge.

A. REQUIREMENTS APPLYING TO ALL PROPERTIES IN THE DISTRICT OF AUGUSTA MARGARET RIVER

1. Firebreak Requirements

2-metre wide firebreaks around all piles of garden refuse and/or wood stacks, fuel and fodder. In this Notice a Firebreak means an area of land that has been cleared of all trees, bushes, grasses, and any other object or thing which may be flammable, leaving a bare surface to a width specified under the requirements in Parts A, B, C or D with a minimum four (4) metre high vertical clearance. Where a Firebreak is required to be 'trafficable' under this Notice, it must be capable of allowing a 4WD fire appliance to enter, exit and turn any corner without reversing.

2. Asset Protection Zone (APZ)

Means the area of land within 20 metres from the external walls of any habitable building. The fuel loading (flammable material) in the APZ is to be reduced and maintained to less than two (2) tonnes per hectare. Trees must not be closer than two (2) metres to a building, and trees must not overhang a building within four (4) metres of the external roof. APZ requirements apply to all properties (excluding vacant lots), regardless of size, and must be maintained all year round.

3. Driveway/Access way

Means the access route from the road to your main dwelling. This should be a minimum of four (4) metres wide with a minimum four (4) metre vertical clearance to allow emergency vehicles to access your property.

4. Gutters and rooftops

Gutters and rooftops are to be kept free of excessive twigs, leaves and plant material.

5. Bushfire Management Plans

Properties subject to an approved Bush Fire Management Plan, being a plan that has been developed and approved by the Shire to reduce and mitigate fire hazards within a subdivision, or as part of a development approval, must comply with the requirements of their plan in addition to the requirements of this Notice

Note - where the requirements of a Bushfire Management Plan are inconsistent with the requirements of this Notice, owners should apply for a Variation to the Notice, otherwise the higher level of protection is to apply.

B. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS APPLYING TO RESIDENTIAL/RURAL RESIDENTIAL LOTS 4001M² AND OVER

- 1. Firebreak Requirements
- Minimum 3-metre wide trafficable firebreaks within 10 metres of all boundaries. 2. Grasses slashed/mowed to less than 10cm
- Vacant/cleared land that is not being actively grazed.
- C. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS APPLYING TO RURAL LOTS (EXCLUDING PLANTATIONS, VINEYARDS, ORCHARDS AND OLIVE GROVES):
- 1. Firebreak Requirements
 - Minimum 3-metre wide trafficable firebreak required within 100 metres of a boundary that abuts a road reserve. •
- 2. Grasses slashed/mowed to less than 10cm
- Vacant/cleared land that is not being actively grazed.
- D. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS APPLYING TO PLANTATIONS:
- 1. Firebreak Requirements
 - 10-metre wide mineral earth firebreak around each cell or block minimum 3 metres must be trafficable.
- 2. Grasses slashed/mowed to less than 10cm

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS APPLYING TO VINEYARDS, ORCHARDS AND OLIVE GROVES: E.

- 1. Firebreak Requirements
 - 5-metre wide mineral earth firebreak around each cell or block minimum 3 metres must be trafficable.
- 2. Grasses slashed/mowed to less than 10cm

The following Notice is hereby given to all owners and/or occupiers of land within the Shire of Augusta Margaret River

Changes Roll Out.

The Augusta Margaret River Community Bank board is rolling out a new business plan for our Augusta Branch. The biggest change that customers will notice are to the trading hours - from 3 days per week to 5 half days per week. (The total of trading hours will be approximately the same due to extra opening and closing duties across the week.) Trading hours will change from October 2021 and will be Monday to Friday from 9.30 am to 1 pm.

Our dual goal is to carefully manage costs and to ensure the long term viability of the Bank in town and to provide the best services that we can to suit the majority of customers. Our statistics indicate that the majority of trading occurs in the mornings. This may not suit everyone, but we hope customers can utilise the lunchtime trading window, which has us open until 1pm each day.

This change of hours has a small impact on costs and, we hope, a very positive impact for the town in terms of returning a community dividend for sporting clubs and special projects.

The benefits of trading over the 5 days are:

- Consistent hours
- Businesses being able to deposit cash every day
- If there are closures due to sudden staff illness, there will still be more trading days per week
- Greater likelihood of attracting additional casual staff for shorter working hours (school hours)
- Staff will have a better flow of work to process daily

As a locally owned bank and with our board working very hard for positive outcomes for our local shareholders and the community, we hope that you will consider bringing more of your business across to us. We appreciate it is a big effort to change banks, but the rewards will be significant to both you and your community.

Chuditch or Western Spotted Quoll (Dasyurus geoffroii)

Not many people know Australia has a native cat, the Chuditch, which, with its distinctive white spots which covers the head and body, is very easily distinguished from other species in the bush. The rest of the fur is brown, with a lighter shade underbelly. Their tail is a brushy black that is unspotted and the nose is pointed with ears erect and prominent. The adult males reach a size of about 60cm and weight up to 1.5kg and the females a little smaller about 55cm and 1kg in weight.

The Noongar Season 'Kambarang' is represented by the colour yellow as it symbolises the return of the hot weather.

During Kambarang season, we see an abundance of colours and flowers exploding all around us. The yellows of many of the acacias continue to abound, along with some of the banksias and many other smaller delicate flowering plants including the kangaroo paw and orchids. During this time the balgas will continue to flower, especially if they've been burnt in the past year or closely shaved. One of the most striking displays of flowers to be seen during this season will be the moojar, or Australian Christmas Tree (Nuytsia floribunda). The bright orange-yellow flowers serve to signal the heat is on its way. October is also the most likely time of the year that you'll encounter a snake as the reptiles start to awaken from their hibernation and look to make the most of the warm to assist them in getting enough energy to look for food. It's also a time that many young families of birds will be singing out for their parents to feed them. Koolbardies (magpies) will be out protecting their nests and their babies. Many things are undergoing transformation with the warm change in the weather and longer dry periods accompany a definite warming trend. source ECU

Pasture Biodiversity Project gets Green Light

Stage 1 of our Pasture Biodiversity project commenced with the selection of our 3 sites thislocated in Rosa Glen, Warner Glen, & Scott River, all have 3 distinctly different soil types and profiles so we look forward to seeing how they all respond to the project activities.

With no time to waste we've been out & about in the catchment this week with our project consultants Anthony Quinlan & Mark Tupman conducting base line testing on the sites.

The testing covered a range of soil health parameters including:

- Soil Chemistry Analysis
- Soil Physical Structure Assessment
- Soil Biology Assessment
- Water Infiltration test
- Soil Compaction Assessment
- Soil Cover % Assessment
- Pasture Species Count
- Leaf Sap Samples

Over the next month we will be putting together a Demonstration Site Plan for each site which will describe the when, what & how of the seeding program and how the site is to be prepared & managed over the spring /summer period. Don't fight the flight of the termites!

Should termites cause a fright?

When we hear the word termite, we all get a bit concerned, given their associated risk of damaging wooden infrastructure, especially if left untreated or unmonitored. But did you know that not all termites cause damage to buildings, and are all in fact, a beneficial part of our natural environment?

Termites are social insects that build large nests in soil or wood and are an integral part of the Australian ecosystem. There are more than 150 species of termites occurring in Western Australia, and only 12 of these are known to damage timber. Termites help to recycle organic materials and aerate soils. They are also an import part of the diet of other animals, and their feeding activities even provide hollow logs for birds and mammals, like the endangered numbat, to use for nesting.

What does a termite look like?

Termites are small, soft-bodied insects that feed on wood, grass, dead leaves, bark, fungi or the dung of herbivores. Although they are commonly referred to as white ants, they are not related to true ants. They have no waist between the thorax and abdomen as seen with ants, bees or wasps. A termite colony is split into three groups known as castes: workers, soldiers, and alates. The worker termites lack eyes and help to build and maintain nests, while the soldier termites are responsible for defending the nest from predators. Alate termites are the winged,

reproductive castes of the colony. These can often be observed in their thousands in spring, flying up from the ground, trunks or termite mounds. Alates are the future kings and queens of their new colonies and will congregate in the air and shed their wings after successfully mating. Termites are active year-round in their colonies, but reproductive termites are only active under certain environmental conditions.

What if I find termites in my property?

Finding termites isn't necessarily a cause for concern, as thousands of termites take flight in spring and can often enter the home through open doors, windows, chimneys, or eaves. Cut off from the soil, which provides a suitable nesting site, these termites will perish, posing no risk to the home. The important thing is to conduct regular inspections to determine if these termites are emanating from an active colony inside the timbers of your home and aren't just seasonal blow-ins. Licensed pest controllers can provide inspections and treatment services if needed. If termites are seen in the garden (winged or otherwise) do not fret, as they are doing an important job by recycling nutrients. To avoid termites recycling your stacked timbers, keep them off the ground, and use treated timbers for garden beds if you want them to last longer. diver off Seal Island. The incident occurred when the three divers encountered anchoring problems causing their 5.5 metre fibreglass boat to become stranded high and dry on the rocks.

In conjunction with paramedics from St John Ambulance and the rescue helicopter, which had to be



called in, the injured diver was airlifted from the island and taken to RPH. The remaining two divers were ferried safely back to the mainland.

The following day several volunteers

and the two divers returned to the scene, secured the boat and towed it back to the harbour avoiding any pollution of the area. After a night on rocks, pounding seas and swell, the boat was virtually damaged beyond repair.

This is just a friendly reminder with boating weather improving, for all boaties to keep the maintenance up on their boats. Check the safety gear and also the expiry dates of flares and Epirbs.

Donovan Street Bushland is home to an amazing array of native plants but also home to some interesting nocturnal animals. Pop on your head torch you may be surprised by the new world before your eyes.

Start:

This 1km loop walk will take you about an hour. The best time to venture out is ~ 30 to 45 minutes after sunset. Start on Donovan Street ~ 300m east of

Bussell Highway. A gate leads to the track with two majestic trees standing on either side. An ancient Marri (Corymbia calophylla) with large nuts (Honky Nuts) and a tall, elegant Karri (Eucalyptus diversicolor) with beautiful, coloured bark which changes with the seasons. Walk north along the track until you reach a gate on the west (~ 150m). Turn west and follow the track until you reach the gate on Bussell Highway (~500m). Turn south and walk along the narrow trail to Donovan Street (~50m). Turn east and walk back to your car (~300m). Take care – watch where you place your feet, choose a calm night and wear insect repellent.

As you walk along the track you may see Western Ringtail Possums, Brushtail Possums, Brushtail

Phascogales and on the ground our eco excavator the Quenda. Evidence of the Quendas can be seen along the trail with their conical diggings and little runnels leading into the Sword Grass (Lepidosperma sp). Your ears will also come in handy. You may hear the high pitched 'chirr' of the Australian Owlet Nightjar, the soft low 'oom-oom' of the Tawny Frogmouth, the double hoot 'boo-book' of the Southern Boobook or the spinetingling loud, deep hissing screech 'h-a-a-a' or wild cackling of the Australian Masked Owl. When spotting only keep your light on the animal for a short time and if possible use a red light.

Your torch will light up the trees. Their various shapes, sizes, structure, and beauty highlighted. In spring the forest is bursting with colour. Scattered along the track are donkey and spider orchids, the brilliant blue of Tree Hovea (Hovea elliptica) and the bright yellow of the Acacias. If it is calm, you will be able to smell the heady fragrance of the Frog Mouthed Hakea (Hakea oleifolia).

Enjoy and happy spotting.
