Major Restoration Update September 2021 - March 2022

Having stood since 1895, the lighthouse is now needing some care and attention to keep it operating for the next century.

Site facilities for the restoration work are now up and running, with scaffold construction 35% complete. Deconstruction of internal accessways has commenced.

The next stage of the works will focus on the decommissioning of the main lantern and a temporary lantern taking its place.

Visitors continue to enjoy access to the Lighthouse precinct and award-winning interpretive centre, along with hospitality from new cafe owners, Ben and Lisa.

Augusta Childcare Update

Council resolved at its 22 September 2021 meeting to redevelop part of the Augusta Recreation Centre to facilitate the provision of a childcare service for long day care as well as out of school hours care (before / after school and vacation care).

The Shire is in the process of tendering the construction contract to undertake these works with dates provided below.

- Request For Tender (RFT) Advertising: 13 October 2021
- Deadline for Submissions: 24 November 2021
- Report to Council: First available meeting in 2022
- Contract Award and Commencement: January / February 2022

Alongside this, Council also resolved to grant Augusta and Districts Community Childcare a lease with an initial 3-year peppercorn period to enable them to provide these services to the Augusta and surrounding communities.

Director Corporate and Community Services, James Shepherd, met with the Augusta and Districts Community Childcare Inc. in early October to go through the next steps and answer questions, and will continue to provide updates to the Committee and broader community as this project progresses.

Augusta Road Works Updates

Leeuwin Road Works

As part of the Regional Road Group Grant funding with Main Roads, the Shire are currently reconstructing Leeuwin Road, Augusta.

This includes installation of four new stormwater pits and culverts, improvements to the existing road surface as well as sealing with kerbs, line marking and signage.

Please note Skippy Rock Road will be used for access to Leeuwin Lighthouse during this period. The beach in the closed location will also be closed during reconstruction for safety reasons. Property access will not be affected. Some delays are likely so please consider an alternative route where possible.

The Shire appreciates your patience during this time.

Works are expected to be complete by the end of December, weather permitting.

Flinders Bay Holiday Park Road and Exit

Stage One works are now completed with the main exit onto Leeuwin Road now constructed. The entry has been widened to improve vehicle access as well as a dedicated pull over lane for people checking into to the park.

Upgrades have also been made to stormwater drainage, directional signage and visitor car parking.

Stage Two works in progress include completion of an Emergency Only Exit onto Davies Road.

The visit by District Governor Stephen Berry

provided the opportunity to present medallions to founding Charter President Dr John Williams, Jim Challis & David Watterson recognising their valuable service over 50 years to Lions.

In DG Stephen Berry's address to members he raised the issues that many service clubs throughout the state are facing in retaining & attracting new members and volunteers. The challenge is for clubs to find a format that suits the demographics of the area & not necessarily to be locked into the traditional formats such as twice monthly Dinner Meetings etc.

A sausage sizzle was enjoyed on Saturday 2nd October to celebrate the first anniversary of the Container Deposit

Scheme where over 800,000 containers were processed in the first 12 months. This returned \$80,000 back into the community with the 10c returned to depositors and with the 6c per container earnt from WARRL (State Govt body) for processing / sorting the containers. This has allowed Leeuwin Lions to pay for the upgrade / refurbishment of the shed to efficiently process the containers, purchase a new forklift and have funds available to distribute to Lions' causes.

There are typically as many as eleven volunteers working in the CDS shed on Thursday & Saturday mornings – many of whom are not financial members of Lions but very valuable Lions Volunteers. It is worth noting that most other Container Deposit operations are run by private individuals or commercial operations.

Thank you & well done Lions volunteers.

Planning is afoot to build a new shed or modify/ expand existing ones to accommodate a new kitchen /smoko room and office / storeroom for Lions' memorabilia. This will be a staged approach but sorely needed with the number of participants volunteering their time servicing Lions' causes.

Peter Keppel & his team have already split and stacked next year's firewood (it's worth a look). This year's firewood deliveries totalled 49 tonnes and with the changes to the logging of old growth forests it is anticipated that firewood will become more difficult to obtain & hence more expensive. As a precaution Peter has ordered an additional load for processing next year – a bit more exercise for Andy Butcher who insists upon splitting 80 rounds per day by hand for his daily exercise!

Peter Keppel also doubles up as our OH&S manager , working with Carmel Norris from the CRC and advises that there are a number of changes forthcoming in the new year for volunteers. More to come.

Margaret Martin has again being busy propagating the flowering plants for the Streetscape Ladies to 'Pink Up Augusta'.

The Book of Job

We have recently been reflecting on the Book of Job. In 1985 I was in Poland and went to Auschwitz. Later, I visited the Holocaust Museum in Jerusalem. In

both places I was reminded powerfully of "Night", by Elie Wiesel, a survivor of the Auschwitz concentration camp. In it he describes a desperate fellow Jew being shot dead on the barbed wire. Someone asks "where is God" and another replies "On the wire, with our dead friend".

The 6 million Jews murdered by the Nazis would have known the Book of Job. Can Job suggest an answer to the terrible question of where was God when six million Jews were murdered?

The problem has been discussed for millennia: namely, if there is an all-powerful, all-knowing and benevolent God then why do bad things happen in the world? For more than 70 years this question has been discussed in relation to the Holocaust in a simple question: "Where was God at Auschwitz?" Where was God when six million Jews, including one million children, were murdered?

There are, broadly, two schools of thought: that God allows free will to exist (however painful) or that the Holocaust is indeed a form of punishment. I believe, as do many others, that the idea of the Holocaust as an act of punishment by

The October 2021 meeting was held on Thursday 21st October in the Society's room. There was a reasonable attendance

including a group visiting from the Margaret River Historical Society and one guest.

Our Guest Speaker was Emeritus Professor Richard Read from the school of design at the University of Western Australia. Richard is also an art historian and his topic was on one particular painting by Thomas Turner of the Blackwood River, painted perhaps from somewhere near the settlement and near where the Turner Caravan Park is at the present time.

Thomas Turner was a son of James Woodward Turner who was among the group of first settlers who arrived on the Emily Taylor in 1830. Thomas Turner was sixteen when they arrived but he had an extensive education in England before the family came to Western Australia. He proved to be an artist of some talent and his paintings demonstrated the changes made to the settlement over the following years after their arrival.

Professor Read has spent time around Augusta including time in a canoe trying to identify where the series of paintings

God is obscene. We must reject totally the idea that Hitler could be part of any Divine Plan and that such terrible suffering could emanate from God.Theologians claim that in Nazi Germany God had to withdraw, whatever the consequences, to allow humanity to exercise free will.

We are left, like Job, wondering why terrible things happen to innocent people: for many survivors the idea of losing all members of their family, their worldly possessions and their dignity is not theoretical. For those people this results in several responses: ranging from spiritual renewal to rejection; to devoting their lives to bettering the world, to self-destruction as is the case of many who sadly could not cope with the guilt of surviving when their families perished.

Job does give an answer of sorts. We are left in the midst of a divine mystery. If we can find the strength to reaffirm God, to question our ways of life and shed the arrogance of surety then we can like Job rebuild our lives, our communities, our institutions. This reaffirming act of faith is a symbol of hope.

To quote Ernest Levy, a concentration camp survivor, "If there is no faith in humanity, then there is no point in having faith in God".

were done and whether changes to the tree images and the shoreline were because Thomas Turner was trying to portray something other than just a record of an area.

There has been an exhibition of Thomas Turner's paintings at the Art Gallery of Western Australia where Professor Read was able to fully appreciate the scale of the paintings and the skill of the artist to demonstrate the type of country the little settlement was trying to farm.

Copies of some of Thomas Turner's paintings are in the Augusta Museum. At one stage we also had some of the originals but they have now been sent to the Art Gallery of Western Australia.

We thanked Professor Read for his very comprehensive paper on the paintings of Thomas Turner and the research results he was able to share with us.

The next meeting of the Augusta Historical Society will be on Thursday 18th November at 7.00pm.No Guest Speaker has been arranged as yet but an email will be circulated closer to the date. NOVEMBER IS THE MONTH TO REMEMBER THEM...

On 11 November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent

after four years of continuous warfare. With their armies retreating and close to collapse, German leaders signed an Armistice, bringing to an end the First World War. From the summer of 1918, the five divisions of the Australian Corps had been at the forefront of the allied advance to victory. Beginning with their stunning success at the battle of Hamel in July, they helped to turn the tide of the war at Amiens in August, followed by the capture of Mont St Quentin and Pèronne, and the breaching of German defences at the Hindenburg Line in September. By early October the exhausted Australians were withdrawn from battle. They had achieved a fighting reputation out of proportion to their numbers, but victory had come at a heavy cost. They suffered almost 48,000 casualties during 1918, including more than 12,000 dead.

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than 60,000 of them had died. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the post-war decades.

Each year on this day Australians observe one minute's

As part of the State NRM Funded project Scott River Action Plan Implementation Strategy and on-ground action' there is currently funding support available for Scott River landholders to undertake on-farm reveg either to improve riparian (waterways and wetlands) areas or to increase biodiversity on the farm, improve remnant vegetation and provide native shelter belts.

Seeds Are In the Ground!

With soils warming up and more rain on the horizon, last weekend was the perfect opportunity to get the seed into the ground at our first Pasture Biodiversity Project (https://lowerblackwood.com.au/pasturebiodiversity-to-build-soil-health-resilience-in-thelower-blackwood) demo site.

The site, located in Rosa Glen, was dry enough to get the tractor on, and was prepared for seeding with some intensive grazing and once over with a flail mower. The sheep have been allowed back onto the site for a few more days prior to germination to keep the existing pasture as short as possible & reduce competition.

Seeding Practical Details:

- Seeding Method: Direct Drill
- Seed Mix: Millet, Field Peas, Cow Peas, Buckwheat, -
- Sunflower, Turnip, Lucerne, White Clover, Chicory, Phacelia
- Seed Preparation: Seeds were mixed then a biological simulant coating applied using a concrete mixer.

- Seed Coating: Compost extract, molasses, milk, soft rock phosphate, liquid seaweed, seeder starter trace minerals

What's bugging my *Pittosporum*?

Speckled sap suckers

With summer just around the corner, it's time to look out for these notorious, native bugs on your Pittosporum plants: Pseudapines geminata or the *'Pittosporum* bug'. These bugs are come from a large family of shield bugs called Pentatomidae. As their common name suggests, these speckled sap-sucking insects feed primarily on Pittosporum plants but occasionally love to munch on our very own native bluebell creepers and Rottnest Island pine.

Pittosporum is a genus of flowering shrubs native to Australia, New Zealand and some parts of Asia and South Africa. Despite each Pittosporum plant species usually having a shield bug species that is specific to them, the most common *Pittosporum* bug species we see around in WA is *Pseudapines* geminata across all Pittosporum plant species.

Did you know?

The relationship between the *Pittosporum* bug and its *Pittosporum* host plant is complex and

symbiotic (meaning a close, long-term biological interaction between two different organisms). The wingless nymphs (juvenile form) of these bugs resemble the black sticky seeds of the Pittosporum plant, which also serve as an important food source for the nymphs and adults. When the shield bugs are predated upon by birds, these seeds stick to the birds and are carried away, aiding seed dispersal and subsequent propagation of the Pittosporum plant! In cases of insects mimicking their food source (seeds), the bugs that most resemble the seeds are harder to find by the predators and therefore will not be eaten.

Critter Control – If Needed

Pittosporum bugs can quickly build up to large numbers and cause serious damage to your *Pittosporum* shrubs if not controlled early. With regards to control, there are several organic options which target these sap-sucking insects including pest oils and soaps, however for severe infestations, a systemic insecticide may be needed to get them under control.

Got unfamiliar pests bugging your plant? Take photos, record the plant species and report it!
