

options for how your body is treated from the moment of death to your burial or cremation.

This course features both information from Paul and discussion by all participants.

Paul Barlow is a member of a group titled Death and Dying Matters, Augusta Margaret River, that promotes a view that a healthy life considers death to be a normal part of life.

Barlow says: "There's value to accepting death as part of life. When I was 31, my brother who was 34 passed away. My ability to accept his death enriched my life and changed it in many ways.

There is something around death that can shift you and if you allow that shift to happen, in my experience, life changes."

Having comfort with death will allow you to walk through it in a much better way. You will also gain knowledge on various things that need to be done when a person dies and how to plan for it.

Previous attendees have gained comfort with the idea and reality of death and knowledge about various things that need to be done when a person dies and how to plan for it.

While much of the class is discussion through an open guided conversation, participants can 'pass' and not talk about particular subjects depending on their comfort about various topics.

This 4-session course is mainly for residents of Augusta and surrounding districts and is also being offered in Margaret River later in the semester. A minimum of 3 participants will be needed to run the course.



#### On behalf of the Management Committee of the **Augusta Community Resource Centre**

From Monday 31 January, proof of vaccination requirements will expand to apply to venues and events state-wide.

Showing proof of vaccination to enter certain businesses and venues is an important public health and social measure that helps to protect the community against COVID-19.

There are a few ways you can show proof of your COVID-19 vaccination, both in a digital and paper-based

The WA Government has also launched the ServiceWA app – a free, convenient and secure mobile application that will help Western Australians with WA's Safe Transition, including proof of vaccination requirements.

Based on the latest health advice, a mandatory COVID-19 vaccination policy for a majority of occupations and workforces in WA will be introduced in a phased approach.

The policy follows the existing mandates in place for workers in high-risk industries, including those interacting with people at an increased risk of being infected with COVID-19, or people who are vulnerable to the impacts of COVID-19, or where it is necessary to avoid risk to the safety of the community.

At the Augusta CRC we are adhering to the mandated requirements in place and will be doing all we can to protect our staff, volunteers and community.

At present masks must be worn at all times in the Augusta CRC and include mandatory check-in procedures. As from the 31st January 2022 the CRC may also be requiring proof of vaccinations at the Centre.

Please treat our staff with respect and note these requirements do not necessarily express personal views and as such any abusive behaviour will not be tolerated.

With the 50th Anniversary & Xmas Celebrations now past, activities in the Lions trading activities were extremely busy, some \$11,000 was banked for the two trading days between 5th & 10th January – this excludes any accruals for CDS activities contributing significant funds for future Lions purposes. A notable achievement by all Lions and their volunteers.

The Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) recorded its 1,000,000th container on

December 16th. CDS commenced on the 1st October 2020, in just over 15 months since start up there has been an average of around 75,000 containers per month.

This CDS operation has put back into the community by way of the 10c refund over \$100,000 since commencement. This does not include the earning Leeuwin Lions make from its contract with WARRL for processing the containers.

An outstanding achievement by all involved by a project started by Phill & Gail Robinson whose contribution was recognised with the presentation of the Melvin Jones Awards at the 50th Anniversary Celebrations.

The CDS operation continues to grow with just under 55,000 containers deposited in the first week of January and not all containers are being capture. For example, most 10c containers discarded at the two Shire-operated caravan parks end up going to landfill - Lions are now attempting to address this!

Whilst on the matter of recycling, Leeuwin Lions also still recycles newspapers, so save them up & drop them off when leaving your containers at the CDS shed.

Changes within the relevant Worksafe Legislation that now encompasses volunteer workforces such as current Leeuwin Lions activities combined with mandatory COVID regulations has brought out Lion Peter Keppel's previous work experience and skills in ensuring all operations meet compliance requirements. #### **HMAS NIZAM MEMORIAL SERVICE 2022**

The Annual HMAS Nizam Memorial Service will be held on Sunday February 6<sup>th</sup> at 10.00 am at Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse where the memorial cairn is located.

77 Years ago, on February 11, 1945, at 2215 hrs, HMAS Nizam, was 11 miles south of Leeuwin Lighthouse, when it was struck by a freak wave. The ship rolled 75 degrees and tragically ten sailors were swept overboard never to be seen again. They were aged 18-23 years old.

Lest We Forget .. LS Colin Ryder, OS Garnett Hill, OS John Wallace-Barnett, OS Keith Mills, OS Leslie Holloway, AB Victor Keys, AB Alfred Kerr, AB Allen Milich, AB Vincent Richardson and Stoker John Poulton.

The five 'N' Class Destroyers, Napier, Nizam, Nestor, Nepal and Norman were built in the UK and although part of the Royal Navy, were commissioned to The RAN and crewed by Australians throughout WWII.

The 'N's served in every ocean in the world and hold 26 Battle honours between them. Unfortunately Nestor was sunk in the Mediterranean in June 1942 and never came to Australia. After their battles in the Atlantic, Africa, Mediterranean, Crete and Tobruk, the four 'N's joined the British Pacific Fleet playing a major role in the defeat of the Japanese.

After the war ended, N Class Destroyers associations were formed in NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, South Australia, Queensland and lastly Western Australia in 1989. Today Western Australia is the only branch still operating.

Associate Membership is open to any direct descendants of N Class Sailors and Affiliate Membership to anyone who has a keen interest in our association.

This year we also commemorate the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our Memorial Wall, which was dedicated in 2002. Plaques affixed to this wall are dedicated to our N Class Sailors who have passed away since the end of WWII. There are 112 places on this wall which is almost full.



Over the past years, we have been very fortunate to have the full support of the Commanding Officers from HMAS Stirling, The RAN Band, Navy buglers and magnificent catafalque parties guarding the memorial for the HMAS Nizam Service.



#### DID YOU KNOW...

The Wadandi were the first peoples in this area. They called it "Doogalup". Wadandi traditional country covers an

estimated 1,800 square miles (4,700 km2). Predominantly coastal, it encompasses Busselton and the areas from Bunbury to Cape Leeuwin and Geographe Bay. Inland it reaches the area around Nannup.

The Wadandi peoples were the sole inhabitants of the area for an estimated 45,000 years before the arrival of British colonial settlers at Augusta in 1830, and are one of fourteen language groups of the Bibbulmun (Noongar) peoples.

Cape Leeuwin was named by Matthew Flinders on December 7, 1801 at the commencement of the circumnavigation of Terra Australis (Australia); taking the name of the adjoining area which had been called Leeuwin's Land by the Dutch navigators when The Leeuwin (The Lioness) rounded the cape in March 1622. The Dutch described the land they found as lowlying, sandy dunes and marked their charts 'Leeuwin's Land'.

This March is the 400th anniversary of the discovery of "Leeuwin's Land" now called Cape Leeuwin.

There will be numerous commemorations and celebrations of the anniversary throughout 2022. Watch this space for more details.





trail camera demonstration. Using the wildlife cameras is a great way to monitor wildlife without disturbing them, also helps with surveying foxes and feral cats in our local area. Since the introduction of the European red fox in the 1860's there are now an estimate of 7.5 million foxes throughout the land, in a 10km radius there are 1,256 foxes assuming there are only 4 foxes per square km, usually there are more.



Predation by the fox is considered to be a major threat to the survival of native Australian fauna. In

our local area, foxes are causing threatening decline to ground dwelling mammals, birds and reptiles between 33g and 5.5kg or more if hunting in a pack with cubs. This decline has affected local numbers of possums, bandicoots, phascogales, antechinus, many birds but swans suffer greatly along with the longneck turtle. The list goes on and every night more and more wildlife is lost to foxes and feral cats

AWCWA is working with Augusta Ferals in developing a community volunteer fox/feral cat control program, and we are looking for volunteers to help out, if you are interested please contact details below.

AWCWA has been very busy fundraising and with the help of our generous community we managed to help our wildlife carers with the cost of rehabilitating injured or orphan native fauna. AWCWA would like to give a big thanks to all who kindly donated towards purchasing the much needed tranquilizer gun. Thank you.

#### **Kindness and Compassion**

"... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol." Paul wrote these words in his letter to the people in Galatia, almost

2000 years ago. In our time, when we are facing an undefined period of coping with Covid, after being almost free of it, kindness and compassion are surely very important.

We believe that a very important quality of a life centred in God is growth in compassion. This meaning is expressed in perhaps the most concise summary of Jesus' teaching that there is in the gospels. The verse (Luke 6:36) combines theology (what God is like) and ethics (how we are to live) in a few words; be compassionate as God is compassionate. We are told that God's primary quality is compassion; therefore, a life centred in God will be compassionate. Compassion of course means actually feeling the pain and suffering of other people as well as being moved to do what we can to alleviate it.

In Christianity, as in other faiths, we speak of the spiritual journey. This is an inner journey; it is about the heart and the soul. For Christians it is the opening of the self to the reality of the Spirit. This opening begins the process by which the self, at its deepest level, is reoriented and transformed.

The Christian life is not about pleasing God as one who admonishes and judges. It is not about believing now, or being good now, for the sake of heaven later. It is about entering a relationship in the present that begins to change everything now. Spirituality is about this process; the opening of the heart to the God of divine love who is already here.

God loves us already and has from our very beginning. The Christian life is not about believing or doing what we need to believe or do so that we can be saved. Rather, it's about seeing what is already true; that God loves us already. It is about beginning to live in this relationship. It is about becoming conscious of and intentional about a deepening relationship with God. It is about living out kindness, compassion and love in our relationships with others. Christianity's goal is not escape from this world. Christianity loves this world and seeks to change it for the better.

Jesus spoke of God this way: "Be compassionate, as God is compassionate." Compassion is the primary quality of the central figures in two of his most famous parables: the father in the parable of the Prodigal Son and the Good Samaritan.

People are essentially good. In the difficult times ahead we can be sure that we will see the very best of people in our community, as they seek to assist and support one another with kindness and compassion.

East Augusta Bushfire Brigade farewells two stalwart community members, Errol Rutherford Snow 5/4/1939 - 8/12/2021 and Peter Hamilton Brindley 25/3/1956 - 26/12/2021. 





As the weather warms up, so does the insect activity, and in February we generally see an increase in bee reports. With the spotlight shining on the recent incursion of the exotic red-dwarf honeybee (*Apis florea*) in Forrestfield WA, it is important to think about how you may be able to tell the difference between friend and foe!

WA is home to approximately 1000 species of native bees, and these bees are vastly diverse in terms of size, form, colour and how social they are. In fact, most of them look and behave extremely differently to the European honeybee, *Apis mellifera*. The majority of our native bee species are solitary and do not belong to a hive or produce marketable quantities of honey like European honeybees. Instead, after mating the female will excavate shallow burrows in soil or find small holes to nest in wood, where their larvae can feed and develop.

#### **Trending natives**

Blue Banded Bees (Amegilla spp.) are furry bees coloured with iridescent blue or white stripes on a glossy black abdomen, and they can range between 10-12mm in length. In Australia, carpenter bees, teddy bear bees and blue banded bees are some of the few species able to perform what's known as 'buzz pollination'. Although most flowers can release their pollen automatically, some species like tomato plants can only release pollen when its flowers are vibrated repeatedly. Buzz pollination involves bees

clamping their legs to the anther (the male part of the flower typically containing pollen) and contracting their flight muscles vigorously to release the pollen.

The amazing handywork of female **leafcutter bees** (*Megachile* spp.) can be seen as perfectly neat circles or ovals cut out of the leaves in the garden. These are carefully transported back to the singular burrow she has excavated where she will then weave them into little cradles for her eggs to hatch. These bees range from 6-15mm in length.

#### **Native bee resources**


Keep a look out for our beautiful native bees this summer as they are excellent pollinators, and you can attract them into your garden by making a 'bee hotel'. Type the following search terms 'DIY Bee Hotel', AussieBee', 'Western Australian Museum' 'or 'native bees WA' into your internet search engine for the best information.


#### Get clicking!

Spotted an unfamiliar bee and not sure if it is a friend or foe? It's always better to reach for the camera before a fly swatter! Wherever possible, aim for clear photos that show their colours and body markings. If the bee is already dead, include a pen or ruler in the photo so we can judge its size and try photographing the wing vein pattern – it's very helpful with identifications of similar looking species.



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
