



Having stood since 1895, the lighthouse is now needing some care and attention to keep it operating for the next century.

The Restoration team has been busy continuing the essential tower works since the last update.

- The removal of all paint is now complete.
- Repairs to all limestone blockwork and mortar joints is complete.
- Reinstatement of the stairs and landings has begun.
- New electrical wiring is being installed.

The weather, in particular the wind, has caused some challenges, but extra skilled workers have been called in to help keep the works on schedule for completion in time for the April school holidays.

Leeuwin Trail Update

The Shire has commissioned Common Ground Trails to undertake a multi-criteria analysis of options to continue

the Leeuwin Trail from Dead Finish to Cape Leeuwin.

The analysis will investigate each trail alignment option and develop recommendations on the basis of performance against cultural heritage , environmental values, trail user experience, constructability, accessibility and costs. A Council briefing session will be held in the afternoon of Wednesday 9 March at the Augusta Council Office will be held vitually, Meeting links will be issued on the Shire's website as part of the meeting notice and the Shire's Facebook page. Following the briefing session, a report recommending community consultation of preferred trail alignments and construction details will be considered by the Shire Council at the Ordinary Council Meeting on March 23, 2022.







The area around Augusta was first settled by the Wadandi people, at least forty thousand years ago.

More recently, explorers and trading ships encountered the coastline of this Southwest corner of the continent.

However, they caught lots of fish and commented on the large sharks 'as fierce as any they had encountered', that were present around the ship. After departing late on the 18th, the ship took a few days to round Cape Leeuwin before heading towards Shark Bay, and on to Timor.

It is planned to have a couple of low-key events to remember that small part of the bigger history of the region. Such as a light breakfast at the Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse Cafe on the 18th and possibly a sundowner that evening. So, if you are interested in either event, please contact

BUSY ENTITIES, BUSY LIONS

All Leeuwin Lions entities continued to trade strongly into February despite the school holidays finishing and car parking overflows onto the street diminishing. The shed is full and furniture, clothing and bric-a-brac have reported strong sales, the Toy Shop and Bookshop have been frantic, the Adventure Centre has remained very popular and well occupied, and all Lions and volunteers have been happy being very busy.

SAIL TRAINING ON BOARD STS LEEUWIN

The three Leeuwin Lions sponsored 'sailors' have all now completed their voyages on the STS Leeuwin and the club enjoyed the tales of their experiences on the 'high seas' at a social meeting on Monday 28th February. Leeuwin Lions have been sponsoring at least a couple of voyages each year since the inception of the program — believed to be some 30 plus years.

YOUTH FOUNDATION

As announced at the 50th Year Celebrations, to mark the 50th Anniversary Year of the Lions Club of Leeuwin, the Board decided to establish the Jim Challis Youth Foundation. A starting fund of \$10,000 is to be established to assist local individuals in the Leeuwin Lions District to upgrade or renew their vocational skills and /or educational qualifications to assist them in their endeavours. Additionally to reward & encourage those who provide the services in our community.

Naming the fund after Jim is a recognition of his 50 years of service to Leeuwin Lions. Whilst being the current President, Jim has also been President upon three previous occasions, Secretary on three occasions and a Board member since inception.

Examples of Foundation support available:

- TAFE traineeships for example Childcare Assistants
- Assistance with travel & accommodation for apprentices who have to work away to gain the work experience necessary to complete the apprenticeship

- Youth encouragement & training STS Leeuwin voyages and similar activities
- Assistance with tuition fees and textbooks etc for prequalified individuals to upgrade or gain tertiary/vocational skills upon the basis of a reimbursement as subjects are 'passed'.
- Introduction of Leeuwin Lions District Awards to recognise 'the best" of those who service our community. To be done in conjunction with other groups such as Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the. Augusta Community Development Association.
- Apprentice or trainee of the year
- Customer service person of the year
- 'Tradie' of the year

CONTAINERS ROLLING IN, MORE REQUIRED

The number of containers processed in January totalled 163,800 - earning Leeuwin Lions along with donations, a total of \$16,300 for the month. Sadly, there continues to be a significant number of recyclable containers still going to landfill.

ZONE II MEETING

Leeuwin Lions hosted the W2 District Zone II Luncheon and Meeting on the 28th January, which was well attended by clubs in the Zone. The meetings are normally held quarterly for the purpose of reporting activities and discussing and seeking resolution of issues common to all. The forum is an ideal opportunity to gain the experience of other clubs as the world around continues to change, whether it be pandemics, government legislation, or information technology. The mandatory changes required by both the Covid and relevant Work Safe Legislation that now encompasses all volunteer workforces, such as Leeuwin Lions has in the CDS Shed and all its other entities, were discussed at length. Zone Chairperson Trish Robinson was pleased with the strong contributions that Busselton, Dunsborough, Cowaramup, Margaret River, Leeuwin and the newly formed club of Vasse are making to their communities and commended the substantial financial support being given to many worthy causes.

LIONS SKIN CANCER SCREENING RETURNS

The Lions Cancer Institute (LCI) will be providing a free Skin Cancer Screening in Augusta on 9th and 10th April. This free service provides for the early detection of skin lesions and where a lesion is identified a referral is made to your GP for further investigation. For booking information contact: Gailene 0475 708 163

The Lions Cancer Institute is a project of the Lions Clubs of Western Australia. Since the early 1990's LCI has been providing full body skin screening clinics throughout Western Australia, with an emphasis on screening in the remote and rural areas of the state.

From humble beginnings, the Volunteers of LCI have screened over 80,000 patients and records show that with the annual rate of referrals to a GP in the order of 27% (21,600) and lesions suspected of being life threatening at 6% (1 260). Early detection will save lives and lessen the need for invasive surgery.

LCI's screening program is supported by qualified volunteer Dermatologists, Plastic Surgeons, Dermoscopists and GP's.

Funding for LCI's screening programs and research grants is provided by donations from Lions Clubs of WA, business and the public.

A note from the Suggestion Box by one member who felt he was being overworked in the furniture shed was for a spa and sauna to be incorporated as well.



The Augusta Golf Club held its Annual General Meeting on 3 February 2022. At that meeting, a new Management Committee was elected and installed. Of especial note was the retirement of

two long-standing committee members, who have served our club in voluntary capacities for many years. Their committed service should not go unacknowledged. I refer to Jim Swarbrick and Nick Dornan.

Jim Swarbrick

Extracting personal details from Jim is no easy task, so, for this brief "golfing biography," I have sought information from a couple of his mates and scoured the Honour Boards at both Margaret River Golf Club (MRGC) and Augusta Golf Club (AGC).

Jim first played golf in Margaret River in the late 1970s. Like many, his first few games were disastrous, and had it not been for the support and encouragement of well-known MRGC identity, Gerry Ryan, Jim he would have given up. Clearly, though, Gerry had an eye for talent because, before too long, Jim began to win championships. Indeed, Jim's name first appears on the MRGC Honour Boards in 1980 when he was the Men's Champion, and, for the next fifteen years, or so, his name is to be found on almost every MRGC Honour Board mounted on the walls of that club.

- MRGC Men's Champion: 1980, 1981, 1983, 1984, 1986 and 1990
- MRGC Men's Foursome Champion: 1980, 1981 1984, 1985, 1986, 1988, 1989 (partner L. Bedford) and 1996 (partner P. House).
- MRGC Mixed Foursomes Champions: 1982, 1986, 1990 – partnering with his lovely wife, Shirley.
- Jim was also Men's Captain of MRGC in 1986 and 1987.

After moving to Augusta, Jim again took the reins of Men's Captain, serving in that role in 2013 and 2014.

Jim continued to win championship events at AGC, winning Men's Foursome events in 2017, 2020 and 2021,

and the Mixed Foursomes event in 2013, 2014 and 2019. For all his athleticism and golfing skill, Jim is most highly honoured for his role as AGC President, a position he held from 2017 to 2021. During this period, he was instrumental in upgrading the pathways—the rocky trails are now smooth, bituminised corridors. He works tirelessly on the course, mowing, bagging, trimming, shaping—doing whatever is required at the time. Jim is wise, he is committed, and he is an example. Thank you, Jim.

Nick tells me that his first experience of golf was going for a walk on the Old Course at St Andrews. He was eight years old and was given a club and ball to hit along the fairway. Despite his prestigious surrounds, Nick's introduction to golf was unpromising, for, following a lusty swing, he hit his sister squarely on the forehead.


That was Nick's last swing of a golf club until he tried again at his local golf course at Harefield Place near Uxbridge. He played there for four years, from the age of eighteen to twenty-two.

After migrating to Australia, Nick's life became very busy. He became the Shire President in 2002 but relaxed by making a point of playing casually at AGC. Nick officially joined the club in 2011 but did not accept a committee position until 2014. Since then, he has spent seven

Nick's golfing highlight is undoubtedly his victory at the Augusta Masters in 2015.


Leeuwin in Lego

Chris McRae, a Performing Arts teacher from Perth, has always had a fascination and love of the stories and history behind lighthouses. "The tales that come from past keepers, the engineering behind the builds and the maritime stories are so rich and full of character" he said. Chris spent his high school years in Bunbury and always loved visiting Cape Leeuwin. "It has such a unique quality being the most southern mainland lighthouse in Australia and the point where the two oceans meet" he continued. Chris travelled to Cape Leeuwin in 2020 with a group of friends in 2020 as part of Perth At Home Theatre's 'Stories from the South West' project, directing and filming the short play 'At The Lighthouse' by Perth playwright James Forte on site at Cape Leeuwin. 

Have you hear the word Amigurumi?



It is a Japanese word for "crocheted knitted stuffed toys" and is the Japanese art of crocheting small, stuffed yarn creatures.

The word is a compound of the Japanese ami, meaning 'crocheted' and kurumi, literally 'wrapping' as in nuigurumi (sewn) stuffed doll.

Amigurumi is essentially the same as crochet, only it refers

specifically to the process of making 3D toys. Crochet uses a range of techniques, whereas amigurumi almost always involves working in the round, making spheres, which are then stuffed to form the limbs of little toys.

Where amigurumi's origins are murky, it definitely

has its main roots in Japan. Some speculate that they appeared as early as dynasty periods.

The first actual amigurumi dolls appeared at the start in the 1970s. The concept sprang up alongside other kawail (cute) trends, like chibis which means "little" versions of normal people and objects.

The bulk movement gained footing when it reached the United States in the early 2000's. It exploded into the form most people know today, resulting from the blend of Eastern and Western creative thinking. Of course, the internet then made short work of bumping it to the top of the list.



If previous records are any indication, the course will again become popular with several visitors paying an annual membership rather than paying a separate green fee each time. This also applies to locals. You can complete a round of golf, on this course, in somewhere between an hour to an hour and a half as many times as you like, and over a year, for only \$50. It becomes quite obvious for regular golfers, that an annual membership is the most economical way to go! In addition, an annual membership also entitles you to voting rights, and if you wish, to join in the 'Scroungers' competition on Wednesdays and Fridays.

The club has just held its AGM and the following office bearers were elected:

Ray Wakelin President V/President Tim Sutherland Herman Gerritsen Secretary Rosemary Gerritsen Treasurer

Together with an elected committee of 6 members, they will be working and looking at ways of improving the general condition of the fairways, greens, and surrounds. At present the reticulation system is in urgent need of an overhaul.

At the AGM, members made the decision to increase the green fees to \$10 as from 1st March to non- members. The main reason being that much of the work has become too difficult, and may have to be outsourced,

which usually has a cost associated with it. In addition, increased fuel and insurance costs are adding to the club's costs. The club regrets making this decision but, if we want to make improvements and the club is to survive, this was a necessity.

The \$10 fee is still one of the cheapest fees for golf in Australia and compares favourably with most country golf courses. So, a membership fee with the extra benefits is the way to go! Only \$50.

This can be paid at the Augusta Shire offices (open Tues, Wed and Thurs) by cash, or at Xtreme Sports, next to the BP service station.

"Woe to you who are rich"

In 2021 the richest adult population in the world was the Australian. Median wealth was \$315,000.

Why did Jesus say "Woe to you who are rich"? I've been poor, and I didn't like it very much. I've been well-off (for a while). Jesus makes it clear that God has a special place for the poor, the hungry, the grieving, for the little person, the vulnerable person. But what's wrong with being rich? Why would Jesus say, "Woe to you who are rich"?

It has to do with the attitudes that too often go with being rich. It is all too easy for well-to-do people to feel superior; to look down their noses at the rest of the world, to hide behind locked gates and entryphones; to insulate themselves from other people's needs. Failing to care about other people. Material things can so easily distract from the spiritual.

Jesus' words stand as a warning to those of us who have enough (or more than enough). He warns us not to drift into a false sense of security, into complacency, arrogance, pride or greed.

Most of us are richer than we care to admit and we can learn from Jesus. We can turn things around. We can check to see who needs help; and we can begin helping. Some years ago, a man called William White wrote an obituary about a friend; an ordinary man who was not really ordinary at all:

"The other day, the longest funeral procession that has formed in ten years followed my friend three miles in the hot sun out to the cemetery. The reason so many people lined up behind the hearse that held the kind old man's mortality was simple; they loved him. He devoted his life to people. In a very simple way, without money or power, he gave of the gentleness of his heart to all around him.

We are apt to say that money talks, but it speaks a broken, poverty-stricken language. Hearts talk better, clearer, and with a wider intelligence. This old man with the soft voice and the kindly manners knew the language of the heart and he spoke it where it would give zest to joy and life.

He was infinitely patient and brave. He held a simple, old-fashioned faith in God and his loving-kindness. When others gave money, which was of their store, he gave prayers and hard work and an inspiring courage. He helped.

In his sphere he was a power for life. And so, when he lay down to sleep, hundreds of friends trudged out to bid him good-bye with moist eyes and with cramped throats to wish him slumber."

If we want people to speak well of us, and to have God think well of us, let us live a life like that.



Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds & diseases March 2022

Borers are a hot topic

The onset of hotter weather has drawn many borer species out of the woodwork, and enquiries and photos are coming in thick and fast. Photos of insects, entry/exit holes, information about the species of tree or wood and the signs/symptoms being seen, all help us to identify what is common and what is not.

Ecologically, borers have a role to play, and their tunnels and holes left in trunks and branches make homes or hiding spots for other species. Some native borers make holes the perfect size for native bees to nest in. However, it's their damage to plants and trees, as well as timber and wooden products that make them largely unpopular, and destructive.

There is an abundance of native and established borers species in WA, but concerningly, there are many highly destructive borer species globally. The introduction of these borers into new parts of the globe can devastate streetscapes, forest ecosystems and horticultural industries, not to mention some species' impacts on timber and wood products. So, with the detection of borer activity more likely in these hotter months when borers are most active, keep your eyes peeled, and report!

New symptoms, new detection

When a dying branch fell from a backyard Maple tree, the discerning eye of an East Fremantle

resident thought something looked amiss and reported the borer damage via the MyPestGuide™ Reporter app. The result? Our department is now responding to a new incursion of the exotic Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB), Euwallacea fornicatus, and operations are working hard to contain and delineate the extent of this pest. For more information, see: agric.wa.gov.au/borer.

Public reporting of borer signs and symptoms are encouraged as surveillance ramps up to detect the extent of the Polyphagous shot-hole borer, and the trees affected.

Reporting

We can't all be insect identification specialists, and it's hard to know what's common and what's not, but if something isn't common or familiar to you, please report it. Make reports particularly valuable by including as much information as possible about the signs and symptoms you are seeing. Collect and hold onto samples of suspect insects whilst awaiting identification, and if taking photos, include things like a ruler or a pen in the photos so the dimensions of things can be gauged.


If borers are coming out of furniture, timber, wooden platters, bowls, or ornaments - report it, and we'll provide identification services and guidance from there.

No Porkies! Feral Pigs On Notice in the Scott River

Towards the end of last year we announced our success (together with our partner the Lower **Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group** (LBVPMG)) in securing funding from the WA State Natural Resource Management Program for a threeyear feral pig control program in the Scott Coastal Plain. The growing menace of pigs in the Scott River area poses a very real & serious threat to both the environment and agriculture with the project providing a necessary strategic, collaborative, multiyear control program to protect the area and achieve

The project consists of 6-month trapping blocks in strategic locations per year for three years supported by a monitoring program and trialling of the 'Hoggone' Feral Pig Bait Box. Key to the program is working closely with landholders in the area to ensure that pig sightings and damage are recorded to identify hot-spot areas for the field officers to focus their work.


The LCDC will be supporting the LBVPMG field officers through managing and reporting on the data collected, developing and extending supporting resources for our community, facilitating workshops and working with the landholders in the Scott Coastal Plain area to maximise the impact of the project across the region. Stay tuned for updates and progress reports on this vital program.

This project is supported through funding from the Shire of Nannup, Ents Forestry, and the State Natural Resource Management Program, and is facilitated through a continuing partnership with the Lower Blackwood LCDC the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group.









As part of our Regenerative Agriculture in Practice 2021 project we have been cataloguing the motivations, challenges & experiences of a number of local farmers who are incorporating regenerative farming principles into the way the run their daily operations.
