Coastal Farm Australia Pty Ltd Proposal Aquaculture Trial Project

In response to Mr Jay Harman's letter to editor;

I certainly understand concerns expressed recently by Mr Jay Harman and others but hope I can reassure all parties that their

comments are acknowledged, that we are committed to assessing and responding to these concerns, and hope to progress our ambitions with support from the community which is key for a project of this nature.

Coastal Farms Australia is a start-up with no significant investment at this stage, merely exploring the concept of both seaweed and polyculture aquaculture using native species here in Western Australia. We are a small team of three, fronted by myself, with support provided part-time from two others. The benefits of such farms are clear and well documented in terms of climate change (carbon sequestration), land use and food security.

We wish to explore coastal aquaculture in a controlled and easy to access environment that the sites in the application provide, there is no intention for either site to become a commercial 'farm' as such, and the research and development exemption application, which our application sits under, would allow us to scientifically and physically test scenarios for efficiencies of any future projects.

Our goal is to ultimately blueprint a system which is sustainable, benefits the environment and also has a positive impact on the local community through direct and in-direct employment, and we are very confident we can achieve this based on work done in other parts of the world. We will be working with academia in the first instance (laboratory and research resources) but open to working with other parties (research or entrepreneurial start-ups) with some already expressing an interest in working with us if these sites were granted.

The idea of the recently cancelled community engagement meeting in Augusta, was not an obligatory process for the application but more something we wanted to do, to let people know about our intentions, seek feedback and proceed together on the most acceptable approach. This appears to have somewhat backfired on us given some of the negative messages we have received, maybe we were a little optimistic about the responses we would get, but also the messages seem to be geared toward a large-scale commercial farm and not the research and development area we are aiming toward.

We have been in touch with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPRID), and they have suggested that we follow due process from this point and as such we will address the concerns of the community through that channel going forward.

That said I would like to specifically address points in Mr Jay Harman's letter in your 'Letter to the Editor' section of your newspaper:

- Introduced Species. We will only be focusing on growing kelp in the first instance, our original application included a number of seaweed and shellfish varieties some of which are not local, however this sits within our wider aspiration of developing other farms in different parts of Australia in the future. Our application is being revised to only list kelp species which grows locally and in abundance in waters off Augusta
- Entanglement for Marine Mammals. This has been identified as a risk, however a seaweed farm of this nature is not a new

concept, and this issue is mitigated significantly adhering to well documented guidelines and a carefully designed and managed lease. A seaweed farm in close proximity to land also decreases the risk posed by being able to react if there are issues, or refine/repair the farm infrastructure in a time efficient manner. Our current farm design uses single independent lines to grow and harvest kelp species.

- Habitat Impact. The benefits of a seaweed farm are profound and well documented. Seaweed is the fastest growing biomass in the world and well managed seaweed farms are deemed to have a net benefit to the environment in which they are placed. The threedimensional nature of the farm creates a natural haven and habitat for a wide variety of marine species and especially pelagic fish, which has obvious benefits for local fishery. Seaweed sequesters carbon more efficiently than planting trees with no risk of bushfires releasing carbon back into the atmosphere, requiring no land use, freshwater input, pesticides, fertiliser or feeds.
- Cultural Impact. This will be addressed as it must through engaging with the local Aboriginal community. The Aboriginal peoples of Australia were some of the first seaweed innovators in the world and we hope we can build a sustainable and culturally acceptable farm project with mutual benefits for all.

To end this letter, I once again want to reiterate that we were formed on our vision to develop sustainable regenerative coastal farms to address the critical issues we face surrounding climate change, land use and food security. This project in Augusta serves to provide a pilot project to refine, improve and validate the benefits of seaweed farms from an environmental perspective but also the coastal communities that they are placed within.

And as a final note, as part of our application we will be removing the CPA-01 site from the application and only focus on the proposed area to the south of the harbour.

Alert over Skin Cancer Screening Results

The Lions Skin Cancer Screening Bus was in Augusta over the weekend of 9th& 10th April and a total of 134 screenings were conducted with a total of 23 individuals (or 17%) referred for further investigation – some with potentially life-threatening lesions. - ALARMING; that almost 1 person in every 5 had lesions warranting further investigation, some very serious if left unattended.

Notable also was that more women (60%) than men (40%) presented themselves for screening and that 18% of those who did present had never been screened for skin cancers previously - which suggests there were a number of repeat customers which is a good thing. However, highlighted from this weekend exercise, was the absolute importance for people who have not have a Skin Cancer check before, do so as soon as possible. For those unaware, Augusta Medical Clinic can arrange appointments with a doctor who specialises in Skin Cancer Screening and visits weekly. The Leeuwin Lions are a big supporter (& contributor)

to the Skin Cancer Screening Bus which typically visits Augusta bi -annually and is open to all.Perhaps more important is the service the Skin Cancer Screening Bus offers to the remote and regional areas of our State where it is much more difficult to see a specialist doctor. Lions Cancer Institute has been fundraising for 3 years to provide a new fully equipped and purpose - built bus at a cost of \$750,000 and expects to reach this target later in the year. To assist with this effort, Treasurer David Turner was on hand to pass over a cheque from the Lions Club of Leeuwin for \$15,000. In doing so he acknowledged the great work that the team of volunteer doctors and support crew do throughout the State.

A big thanks to Lions Gailene Shore and Carolyn Balding and several volunteers in handling the bookings and coordinating another most successful Lions community service. Also to Augusta School principal for his wonderful support and provision of facilities.

Worksafe Health & Safety - (WH&S)

As reported in last month's Pelican Post, the recently legislated WH&S changes which now apply to all organisations, including volunteers as well as employees. Early next month, Leeuwin Lions will commence rolling out its Workplace, Health & Safety Management procedures to meet the Club's responsibilities and compliance to this legislation.

The procedures cover all the Club's activities including the collection and sale of clothing, household goods, furniture, scrap metal, hire equipment, firewood, plants and shrubs from the sheds at the Hillview Road complex, the processing of containers at the Container Recycling Shed, and the operation of the Book Shop, Toy Shop and Augusta Adventure Centre.

Fortunately, the work to meet WH&S compliance for the operation of the Container Deposit Scheme provided a sound background from which to expand the new statutory requirements to cover all other Lions entities.Lion Peter Keppel and Carmel Norris, manager of the Augusta CRC, developed & prepared the procedures and are to be complemented on the massive job they have done to ensure that Leeuwin Lions are best prepared to understand and comply with the new legislation.

Trish also made the point that the Adventure Centre has more than adequate areas for on-site activities and the local environments of the Blackwood River, Flinders Bay, Hamelin Bay and Cape to Cape walk trails offer many other appealing outdoor options.

We would like to take this The Augusta Historical Society Inc. opportunity to congratulate Margaret River and

Districts Historical Society for their amazing Group Settlement celebrations on Saturday 26th March at Rotary Park, Margaret River, recognising 100 years since the first group was formed. The weather was not kind to them, but they still managed between the showers (just as the original settlers would have)!! Well done.

1921 Group Settlement at Kudardup and 1922 for the Margaret River area.

A brief meeting on March 17th, which included a mystery piece of machinery brought in by one of our members - after much discussion and inspection it was agreed it would be passed on to the museum curator for possible identification and possible display. This was followed by a very interesting talk by Paul Sofilas about St Alouarn as it was 250 years since he (St Alouarn) arrived in our area. Paul had planned to introduce another speaker, but they were unable to attend so thank you to Paul for filling the breach so very well. This was followed by a Toast to our French explorers with wine provided by Rosily Vinyard

and a light supper.

We are also coming up to the anniversary of our first settlers arriving in Augusta. 192 years ago (if I have done my maths correctly). On May 2nd, 1830 the first group of settlers arrived to found the town of Augusta. Perhaps, at this time we could pause and consider what they faced. Unknown terrain, weather, animals, etc. Seriously limited communication. No roads or medical help.

Could you picture yourself starting things from such a basic level? I know I would consider it very daunting. They endured through flooding - Turners moved their home further up the hill after being flooded. Lack of supplies - some meals consisting of possum and swan!! Fire – Bussell's home was burnt down at Alexandra Bridge and they eventually moved to the Vasse area. We are still here today because of these hardy souls and others that followed.

First Settlers, Timber Workers, Group Settlers, ANZACS. We have so very much to remember, honour and appreciate as we go forward making our own history.

The invitation from **RFBYC** Rowing Squadron row on the 7th May has been changed from Cottesloe to RFBYC to rowing from South Beach through the

heads to RFBYC - allegedly this is an easier row as there is less swell, current & rowing with the prevailing weather patterns. The row is supported by at least three power boats including a large RIB.

If the weather turns foul, an alternative row will be organised for example - down river from Elizabeth Quays or similar back to RFBYC for lunch or just have luncheon! At the time of writing we've got one boat organised & there is room for another boat and /or support rowers.

The decals acknowledging the sponsors have now been gathered and affixed to the new oars that are now ready for use. The new oars are a Macon blade and almost a metre longer than the existing Cleaver blade oars and were set up with assistance of Croker Oars. The Macon blade is more suitable for rowing in choppy waters & the ocean.

Amazing Love By STEWART MACPHERSON

My favourite hymn is And Can It Be, written in 1738 by Charkes Wesley. It has been a source of inspiration for me for many years. I preached on it on Good Friday this year. Reflecting on the death of Jesus it asks: "Amazing love! How can it be that thou, my

God, shouldst die for me?' Good Friday is not a day of mourning. It is a celebration of the victory of the cross. Jesus said "When I have been lifted up from the earth, I will draw all people to myself" (John 12:32) The "lifting up" is two things. Jesus being lifted painfully on the cross. Jesus being raised up to glory.

The cross we lift up on Good Friday is an empty cross, the cross from which the Lord has risen, the cross which represents both his suffering and his triumph. In honouring the plain wooden cross, we honour the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection, which has won us salvation through the grace and love of God.

Jesus dies. But when he dies on the cross he not only reaches his utmost emptiness, but also shows God's utmost love. We look at the dying Jesus and we see the dying world. Jesus, who on the cross draws all people to himself, dies millions of deaths. He dies the death of the rejected and the lonely, the high and the powerful, the famous and the popular. Most of

give assistance to large wildlife without causing panic, fleeing or being a hazard to the rescuer? Answer: Sedation, but from a distance via a Tranquilising gun.

TRANQUILISER GUN DONATIONS

With the great support of the community via raffles & donation bucket and the incredible donation of \$5000 from the Lions Club of Leeuwin we are well on the way to obtain this necessary, lifesaving tool. Dave Bell has now received his Police clearance and everything was posted to the Veterinary Surgeons Board and he is linked up with Ben Teague, Margaret River Equine Vets. Without the use of sedation an animal who could not be safely reached, in the past, may have required euthanasia. With these donations we can cover the gun cost and associated costs purchasing the tranquilising solution. PENGUIN RESCUE

Pengi the Rockhopper Penguin, moulting as penguins do, came to Kerry & Dave Bell's attention because it was underweight. Pressure is on penguin populations due to changing sea current temperatures. Never having raised a penguin before this was a terrific effort with advice from Margaret Larner and WA Seabird Rescue centre at Albany. After having Pengi in an enclosure with a paddle pool container they got it to be viable for transport to

all he dies the death of all the people who live their lives and grow old and tired, and trust that somehow their lives were not in vain. The hymn reminds us that "He left his Father's throne above, so free, so infinite his grace, emptied himself of all but love..." Jesus was both human and divine. The hymn spoke so strongly to me on my return to faith: "Tis mercy all, immense and free; for, O my God, it found out me."

We all seek to avoid pain and concentrate on pleasure. It was ever thus. In 1418, Thomas a Kempis wrote:

"Jesus has in these days many people who love his heavenly kingdom, but few who bear his cross. He has many who desire comfort, but few who are ready for trials. Everyone longs to rejoice with him, but few are ready to suffer for him. Many people love Jesus as long as misfortune does not fall upon them. Yet those who love Jesus for his own sake and not for any comfort they can get from him, bless him in every trial and distress of heart, just as they do amidst the highest spiritual comfort."

We are shocked by the Cross into our proper relationship with Christ; personal, painful, joyful, constant. The lines of the hymn which continue to speak most strongly to me are these: "Long my imprisoned spirit lay... I woke, the dungeon flamed with light, my chains fell off, my heart was free, I rose, went forth and followed thee."

Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds & diseases May 2022

Surprise finds

Considering lighting the fire to keep warm this winter? If so, you might notice wood boring larvae when splitting your native timber firewood. Do not worry, despite the similar looking appearance of boring beetle larvae, these are not the European house borer (EHB) and pose no risk to your home. They do however, make great snacks for birds!

Pictured in this article are the wood boring larvae of native Longicorn beetles, also referred to as longhorned beetles due to their long, serrated antennae. The native Eucalyptus longicorn beetle, *Phoracantha semipunctata* is the most reported species to our service.

The adult beetle lays eggs under bark or in cracks of host trees such as jarrah, *Eucalyptus marginata* and marri, *Corymbia calophylla*. The larvae hatch and bore into the tree and tunnel through the wood. Once large enough, they chew an escape tunnel to the wood surface, plug it to prevent predators entering, and chew a larger chamber to pupate into an adult beetle. The beetle emerges from the wood by chewing through this plug.

The life cycle from egg to adult is poorly understood in south-western Australia but may be <1 year.

If you have been chopping firewood for years but are only starting to see these borers, it's likely the trees your firewood has been collected from are under increasing stress. Borers are predominantly secondary pests and drought stressed forests are highly susceptible to borer attack.

If you want to learn more about these native borers, browse the internet to find some great research papers through Murdoch University in WA. If you want more information about EHB, visit agric.wa.gov.au and search 'EHB'.

Reporting

We can't all be insect identification specialists, and it's hard to know what's common and what's not, but if something isn't common or familiar to you, please report it. Make reports particularly valuable by including as much information as possible about the signs and symptoms you are seeing. Collect and hold onto samples of suspect insects whilst awaiting identification, and if taking photos, include things like a ruler or a pen in the photos so the dimensions of things can be gauged.

If borers are coming out of furniture, timber, wooden platters, bowls, or ornaments – report it, and we will provide identification services and guidance from there.

Weedy Wattles - a pretty problem!



Not native to WA but often confused with the local native wattle Acacia saligna, Weedy Wattles are indeed a pretty problem!

Why are they a problem?

Most wattles are good at colonising cleared vacant land, especially following a disturbance such as fire. They grow quickly and can produce a prodigious amount of seed which is spread by birds, insects and water to other areas.

Once established they compete aggressively with other native plants for water, light and nutrients. They can, under optimum growth conditions, create dense, almost impenetrable thickets of just acacia trees, effectively wiping out all other plant habitat for native animals.

How can they be controlled?

Wattles are best controlled as seedlings when they are easy to hand-pull or spray with a herbicide. Control of mature plants typically involves labour intensive cutting and removal of the trees. It is important that cut branches are also removed as they can produce adventurous roots and sprout leaves. Now is the time to act as trees are most effectively controlled using herbicides between March and August.

Through our **State NRM funded 'Weedwork -Declared Weed Control Support in the Lower Blackwood' Project** we are able to offer landholders the opportunity for a 50% contribution towards control of weedy wattles with a special call out to Scott River landholders - we have quarantined some funding to assist you to get on top of this pretty problem.
