Naturaliste Charters

The past month has been full of life here in Flinders Bay. The humpback competition pods were rife, charging around with electric energy, serenading the females. This time last year we experienced similar rowdy behaviour. With a gestation period of 11 to 12 months, there are no surprises we have plenty of calves this season.

These calves have been a highlight by breaching, spy hopping, and tail slapping with their teeny tiny and markfree bodies.

Another highlight which we always love to see are the numerous rainbows throughout the day. From morning to afternoon, the sky is sprinkled with a touch of atmospheric magic. Double whales jumping out under the colourful banner create a picture perfect scene for whale watching.

When there is jumping or surface active behaviour there tends to be something left behind in the water... whale skin! The whale migration is said to be like a visit to the day spa, with breaching like a bubble bath. Their old Antarctic skin comes away, helped by excessive splashing. This in turn leaves skin chunks up to the size of an A4 sized sheet, which the residential birds and fish gobble up!

Another unique feature to the humpbacks, is their behaviour in tide lines and drifting seaweed. They tend to travel along these tide lines, moving from each floating bed, rolling in each one and lifting the weed up out of the water gently on their heads and flippers.

The southern right whales have also been regular visitors, giving birth in the region. Their calves are just as curious and energetic as the humpbacks. A wondrous sight to see, we are incredibly lucky to have these annual visitors.

Augusta Childcare Update

IPS (consultants) are well underway with their work to analyse current and future childcare needs in Augusta and surrounds. This work has been funded by the State Government through the South West Development Commission. They have been meeting with ADCC and other key Augusta stakeholders to progress this work.

The Shire has now received a set of information from ADCC and is sourcing costings for upgrades at both the Augusta Recreation Centre and the GROH house on Hillview Road with the purpose of considering each site as a possible long day care facility. It is anticipated that a report detailing a range of options for Council to consider will be ready by early September. In the meantime, the Shire congratulates ADCC for continuing to run a successful Vacation Care program at the Augusta Primary School during the school holidays.

> > Over the past few

years we have raised several wattle birds. They are soft released from our house, and usually pop in for an extra feed now and then.

So, one day a few weeks ago we saw a wattlebird on the back table. Assuming he wanted a feed we supplied some jam water which he licked at hungrily. Then we noticed he was unable to use one leg and also had half of his tail feathers missing. We think a hawk or owl may have made a grab for him. On closer inspection we saw that his left foot was very swollen as was his leg. He was missing the side claw. There was no way he would be caught so we kept on with the jam water and fed him mealworms so he didn't have to hunt but could just rest up and heal. He sat for hours beside his bowl but would fly away to roost at night.

One day, a week or so back, he flew in when Dave was home. When he went to give him some mealworms he tried to fly away but could only flutter. After quite a chase, Dave was able to catch him and waited for me to come home. When we looked him over, it was very plain he needed to go to a vet as one could smell the infection. Not only that, his little behind was so clogged up he wasn't able to excrete. He had been sitting in the one spot and not moving when he needed to "go". We bathed his little behind to soften the material enough to clear his opening. We think he was in so much pain and that's why he couldn't fly. We made an appointment with our vet in Busselton who specialises in native creatures, and Dave took him up the next day.

Well, great carers we are, it turned out that, not only was his foot swollen, he had a break in his leg higher up. Mind you, he would have gone to vet a whole lot sooner if we could have caught him earlier. Our vet prescribed antibiotics and pain killer drugs for up to ten days, but thought he would probably die from the infection

He has been resting in a suitable cage on the back table for nearly two weeks now, and I am happy to say, the infection is gone so he is off the drugs and waiting for the next course of action when Dave will take him to Busselton. The vet will probably take his leg off up to the knee because the foot is non-viable. He will be in care until that wound heals and he gets used to using his stub to help with his balance. After that he will be freed to come and go as he wants. We will supplement his feeding until he doesn't need it anymore. He can fly well with only half his tail feathers but will talk to the vet about it.

We are very chuffed that this bird knew to come home when he needed help. Makes everything so worthwhile.

CAPE LEEUWIN ON THE AIR FOR LIGHTHOUSE WEEKEND

August 20-21st is the International Lighthouse and we can. The support of lighthouse staff and the MRBTA Lightship Weekend (ILLW), and once again a team of radio enthusiasts from around WA will be getting together you can get to Cape Leeuwin or Cape Naturaliste, please drop in and say hello – or call us on air, if you can! at Cape Leeuwin to build and operate a temporary Amateur Radio station. The team will be setting up on the Thursday and Friday, and on-air throughout the weekend. Further information is available from Anthony on 0428 Members of the public are welcome to visit the station and 985 995 find out more about ILLW and Amateur Radio.

ILLW began in the late 1990s, and takes place annually to highlight the historic significance of lighthouses and lightships for the safety of marine transport and communications. Each year, Amateur Radio enthusiasts across Australia and around the world set up radio stations at lighthouses and aim to communicate with each other. Cape Leeuwin has been part of ILLW for nearly 20 years, operating under the callsign VK6CLL. There will also be Amateur Radio stations at Cape Naturaliste, and several other lighthouses around WA including Rottnest and Fremantle.

The group started the venture five years ago and the project has been divided into four sections each section taking approximately three years to complete. Jan grows up to 1000 plants a year for this project and she is also a wealth of knowledge about the history of Flinders Bay and Augusta.

Tomato plants like bicarbonate of soda so sprinkle a little around the roots regularly from when you first plant them. This will reduce their acidity and make the tomatoes sweeter to eat.

Mark and Mel are packing their bags and getting ready for their UK and Sydney tour. Wow!!!

It all began in late 2017 when they were contacted by Black Swan Theatre Company and asked to be a part of an upcoming play that would be shown at the Perth Fringe Festival. The play is about a young woman with Downs Syndrome determined to live life to the full in spite of her disability. Julia Hales wanted a career, a normal family life, and to have the same opportunities as everyone else.

She set about to write a play, and with the help of Finn Brannigan and Claire Watson, she put together a play based on her favourite television show "Home and Away", showcasing her life, her family, and her aspirations for the future.

Incorporating others who also have Downs Syndrome, the play premiered at the State Theatre Centre, Perth, in March of 2018. Filling the Underground Theatre for 6 performances and with outstanding reviews, Julia proved that she was very capable, and so each, in their own way, were the other six. Life returned to normal after that until they were contacted again and asked if they would be available for a UK tour of the play.

This was set for 2020 but Covid had other ideas. They were disappointed but were proud of the fact that they had been asked to go. Then in late 2021 an email arrived asking if they would be available for August 2022, the tour was back on!!

Julia had been asked to take her play to the Edinburgh Festival. This is the largest and most prestigious festival

in the world and has been the starting point for many of the well-known artists we have today. As the tour began to take shape, they learned that they would have two weeks rehearsals in Perth, take a 23 hour flight to the UK where they would be playing at the Purcell Room in South Bank, London for 4 performances, then take the train to Edinburgh for 5 performances at the Lyceum Theatre. Packing their bags again they return to Perth for a five- day stopover before flying over to Sydney for a further 5 performances at the Opera House for the Sydney Fringe Festival.

Mark and Mel will celebrate their 22nd wedding anniversary just after they return in September. What an achievement. Well done guys, from a very proud mum.

The Garden of Eden: The Human Condition By Stewart MacPherson

I don't take the story of the Garden of Eden as a report of an actual event. But I do believe that this story tells us something profoundly true. We will become more comfortable with ourselves as imperfect human beings

when we have learned what the story is really about. Adam and Eve were the first humans. They had all the strengths and weaknesses of humans. The account of Adam and Eve eating the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, is, as I see it, a mythical description of how the first human beings left the world of animal existence and entered the complex world of being human.

Human life is more complicated because we are aware of the moral dimensions of the choices we make. The more authentically human we are, the more complicated our lives become. When God warned Adam not to eat from the Tree was it not a warning? Of how things would be as a human? As humans we have free will, we can choose, can act, and we also receive the consequences for those actions.

Once Adam and Eve are in the complicated world of human moral expectations, they inevitably make mistakes; they are uncomfortable at being judged and scrutinised. They blame others (Adam blames Eve, Eve blames the snake).

Surely the message is that we often abuse our freedom and make bad choices. The serpent tells them in so many words, "Go ahead. Eat the fruit. You won't die. God said that but that's not really true. You can't trust

God. God just wants to keep you from becoming like gods yourselves."

Temptation was irresistible for the first human beings. We are all Adam and Eve. We sin. We put ourselves before God. We rebel. We choose to use our power to reject God and to harm the garden rather than tend it. This is our story. This is our condition, the human condition.

God decrees that Adam will have to work for his food and that Eve will find childbirth and childrearing painful. But they are not punishments from God. Work, sexual intimacy, parenthood, a sense of mortality, the knowledge of good and evil; aren't these the things that separate us from the animal kingdom? These are the things that make us human.

The story of the Garden of Eden is not an account of people being punished for making one mistake, for not being perfect. It is the story of the emergence of humankind. Adam and Eve moved into the world of moral demands and moral decisions.

Religion should not be the voice of condemnation, telling us that the normal is sinful, and the wellintentioned mistake is an unforgivable transgression that will damn us for ever.

Religion should say: "I will guide you through this minefield of difficult moral choices. I will offer you comfort and forgiveness when you are troubled by the painful choices you made."

Aviary Escapees

Have you seen any escaped pet birds in the wild recently? The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) is calling on bird owners to ensure they are aware of the keeping requirements for some regulated species and ensure that their beloved pets do not become bothersome pests.

It is an offence to keep restricted bird species without a permit, and failure to comply can result in seizure or a fine. Conures, Indian ringneck parakeets, Alexandrine parakeets and macaws are a few examples of birds which legally require a permit to enter Western Australia and to be kept here. The permit conditions required for these declared birds include keeping them in a secure, double-door aviary.

DPIRD staff recently identified several birds in the Kimberley that were not being kept in line with the regulations, as the owners were unaware of import and keeping requirements. bird. Information on restricted keeping permits can be obtained from the Department of **Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions** (DBCA) Wildlife Licensing section.

If these declared birds were to be released or escape into the wild, especially breeding pairs or species that may interbreed with wild birds, they would harm our native wildlife and agricultural production by damaging fruit crops or competing for food, shelter, nesting sites or other natural resources.

If you are keeping restricted birds, check that you have the required permits. For interstate travellers, some bird species are prohibited entry into WA altogether, and all restricted birds require a permit to enter. Make sure that you know your obligations before bringing in your treasured pet with you.

If you see any unfamiliar birds or pets outside their cages, report it to the Department's Pest and Disease Information Service or MyPestGuide, and be sure to include photos, a description of what you saw and the time of day. Let's prevent these beloved pets becoming problematic pests!

Be Weed Aware! Weedy Wattles



Sydney Golden, Flinders Range and Queensland Silver Wattles are all pests of major proportions here and they are flowering right now!!

How can they be controlled?

Wattles are best controlled as seedlings when they are easy to hand-pull or spray with a herbicide. Now is the time to act as trees are most effectively controlled using herbicides between March and August.

Through our project 'Weedwork - Declared Weed Control Support in the Lower Blackwood', we are able to offer landholders the opportunity for a 50% contribution towards control of weedy wattles with a special call out to **Scott River landholders** - we have quarantined some funding to assist you to get on top of this pretty problem.

Not Just Wattles! - our Weedwork funding also covers other declared weeds too - if you have any of these on your property then you may be eligible for funding to assist with their control.
