Meet Hayley Bain Senior Environment Landcare Officer

What does a typical day at work look like?

My work days can be really different depending on what is going on at the time, involving the protection of the environment here in the Shire.



If I'm lucky enough to be working in Augusta,

my day usually involves meeting up with the volunteers in the Augusta Coast and Landcare group. The volunteers do incredible work in our bushland reserves throughout the year, helping to control invasive weeds and revegetate degraded areas.

We will visit some of these reserves, and work collaboratively on projects that help to restore and enhance these natural areas that have become impacted over time by increased development and visitation.

What is the best part of your job?

I love getting to work with volunteers. They are amazing, passionate people who commit their own time to protecting the environment, and are a real inspiration to me. Without volunteers we would not have achieved some fantastic environmental outcomes in our natural areas around Augusta such as at Redman Brook, the Hardy Inlet foreshore, and along the Leeuwin coast.

What do you love most about Augusta?

Augusta contains some of our most intact and pristine natural areas remaining in the region and it is a real natural wilderness. Every time I visit I learn something new about the environment from the rugged coastline of limestone and granites, to unique vegetation, threatened flora and fauna, cave systems, wetlands, and beautiful beaches.

As one of the many clubs and organisations in the district that is run entirely by volunteers the Augusta Golf Club fully deserves the numerous accolades it received as a result of the event. The course which looked superb is truly a tourist attraction and a great asset to the town.

Tim Irvine – First International Director from WA

Tim Irvine of the Lions Club of Atwell has become the first International Director from Western Australia.

A Lion for nearly 39 years he is well known by clubs in the Southwest [Zone 11] and in fact throughout Western Australia and nationally.

Tim is keenly invested in the early stages of a 'Lions International' program aimed at taking the organisation into the future. In the next two years he will visit locations as diverse as Minneapolis, Belfast, Boston,

Vancouver and Cairo. His world-wide connections have brought him to the early assistance of the Lions Club of Leeuwin. Due to the Lions Club involvement in the "Leeuwin 400" celebrations to be held at Cape Leeuwin on 30th October 2022, it was decided that the Club would try to establish a sister Club in Holland from where the sailing ship "Leeuwin" was built, or from where it sailed.

Well-known local Lighthouse Keeper and MRBTA Research Officer Paul Sofilas told Lions that the "Leeuwin" was built in Amsterdam and sailed from the port of Texel for the Amsterdam Chamber of the Dutch East India Company which operated from 1602-1799.

Armed with this knowledge a call was put out to Tim Irvine who happened to be in New Zealand on International duties at the time. However he willingly agreed to follow up as he would be meeting with his Dutch contacts around the end of August. Lions of Leeuwin now eagerly await the advice and recommendations Tim is able to provide in the near future.

Lismore Flood Relief

It was described as the worst-in-a-500-year flood and for a time Lismore, the birthplace of Australian Lions, went under. Since the horrific floods in February/March, local Lions have been working furiously to help individuals and businesses get back on their feet - and there's still a long way to go.

Lismore Lions have had their barbeque trailer out, cooking for locals and volunteer workers, including the military for several weeks. Many members of the Australian Defence Force were so moved they donated a very generous amount of money to the Club's fundraising efforts.

There have been many terrible and sad stories from residents about their flood experiences and two members of the Lismore Club itself were very badly affected. About \$7,000 was spent on barbeque supplies, thankfully however, much more than this was received from

donations at barbeques and other sources.

To date the Club has received about \$150,000 from other Lions Clubs around Australia, which together with its own funds are now being distributed to flood victims via the purchase of white goods and bedding. Lions Club of Leeuwin is yet to finalise its donation which is likely to be substantial and decided at its Board Meeting in September. Lismore in 1947 was the first Lions Club established in <u>Australia</u>.



Despite the terrible floods the Club remains determined, along with Lions Clubs elsewhere, to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of Lions in Australia. Leeuwin Club has plans for a commemorative garden and party to highlight the 75th Anniversary which also coincides with the 60th Anniversary of Lions in WA.

Guest Speaker

A very interesting presentation on his life-long passion of excellence in cattle and sheep production was given by nationally recognised breeder and Show Judge John Spencer at the second Dinner Meeting for the month on 22nd August 2022. Along with a partner he purchased what was considered to be one of the best Poll Hereford bulls in the world at an auction in Canada at a record price at the time of over \$300,000 dollars to become a pioneer in the field of genetics and embryo transfer.

To add to his involvement, John judged cattle at all the major shows in Perth, Adelaide, Melbourne, Sydney and Palmerston North in New Zealand for a period of 25 years. John and wife Dallas are now enjoying retirement in Augusta, but he still remains a keen interest in the cattle industry and is a willing consultant for those who would like to share his wisdom and experience.

In addition, Ross Newbury addressed and told of his long association with Augusta spanning some 60 years. He and wife Sylvia have determined to retire to Augusta and to join the Lions Club of Leeuwin. Both are great contributors and on recent visits have worked as volunteers in the Recycling Shed.

The Club is pleased to have people such as Ross and Sylvia and hope that they have a number of like-minded friends.

Please NO umita Wildlife Care W.A. Inc. feeding wildlife

It's seems to be human nature to feed the little critters, it makes us feel good but it's not good for the critters. You are killing them with kindness.

Human food just does not cut it for wildlife. It's often highly processed and lacks the species-specific nutritional requirements needed to help that animal thrive. Even unprocessed fruits and vegetables are not good for wildlife since it's not their natural diet.

Food commonly fed to wildlife, such as mince, bread, shredded cheese or pet food, can lead to health complications, devastating nutritional imbalances and even cause life-threatening issues. Particularly for magpies, a diet that relies on mince will lead to weakened bones, rotting beaks and poor overall body functions: causing baby maggies to suffer major calcium deficiencies that so they can't hold their heads up, or stand because their neck and legs are malformed. While a popular pastime of feeding bread to ducks and other waterbirds, the bread can stick to their beaks, causing rot from inside out. Discarded bread in rivers can support the buildup of harmful bacterial causing the botulism disease in birds and long-neck turtles and many other water-based critters.

If you want to do something nice for little critters it's has been said, that for the survival of wildlife one water source is worth any number of trees. Provide a shallow dish, such as a large plastic pot saucer, of clean water. Whilst some birds will use birdbaths, many more birds and other animals seem to prefer a shallow bowl on the ground. Place the dish in a location under a tree with clear ground around which will not provide cover for stalking cats.

Provide natural food sources by planting a variety of native vegetation to ensure you have flowering plants (nectar sources) throughout the year; the basic rule being grevilleas, grevilleas and grevilleas. However, there are many other species which also provide nectar.



Dense impenetrable bushes and ground covers provide protection for small birds and bobtail lizards. Nestlings and eggs are predated, not only by cats, but also ravens, kookaburras and rodents.

AWCWA would like to remind the public under current legislation it is illegal to feed wildlife with up to a \$2000 fine.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD's) Biosecurity Blitz is back in 2022, with a special focus on reporting tree pests and diseases.

The TREEmendous Biosecurity Blitz aims to protect Western Australia's trees from an increasing number of exotic threats, such the recent incursions of polyphagous shot-hole borer and myrtle rust.

Whether you work in forestry or horticulture, like to bushwalk, have trees in your backyard, in the local park or on your street, you can help protect our trees into the future by checking them for pests and diseases and reporting any you find during the Blitz.

Every report helps!

Every report helps to increase the likelihood that serious pests and diseases will be detected early, providing the best opportunity to eradicate or contain them.

If your report turns out to be a common pest, that data is used to support WA's export trade.

- Download the free <u>MyPestGuide® Reporter</u> <u>app</u>.
- Check trees in your backyard, property, local area or nearby bushland for pests and diseases.

- Every report gets a response let's see what's in that tree! You will also receive a weekly email with pest identification and tree health tips, information on priority tree pests, activities, and invitations to webinars and workshops.

Trapping Season Is Over But Pigs Still On Notice!

Our intrepid team from the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group (LBVPMG) have put away their traps till November – it's just a little too wet to be out with the risk of bogging high, especially in the Scott River. They haven't hung up their rifles though, they are still available for call out responses so if you spot a feral pig on your property then head to our website to report it at this link: https://lowerblackwood.com.au/feral-pig-control

We are delighted however that the trapping season has been a resounding success - we are currently preparing our end of season report so numbers to come, which we'll be making public at our September face to face Talkin' After Hours event so stay tuned for that invitation!

This project is supported through funding from the Shire of Nannup, Ents Forestry, and the State Natural Resource Management Program, and is facilitated through a continuing partnership with the Lower Blackwood LCDC the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group.

A New Perspective on Weeds

As tempting as it is to simply get out the herbicide to control weeds on our farms, gardens & bush, the consequences of doing so are becoming less and less palatable. Increasing levels of herbicide resistance, plus a rising level of awareness of the potential for negative ecosystem & human health consequences from chemical intervention, means that responsible use of herbicides is critical and needs to be more nuanced and strategic.

Our recent webinar 'A Healthy Ecosystems Approach to Efficient Weed Control' with NZ agroecologist and soilspert Nicole Masters was a fascinating insight into the world of weeds and alternative approaches to dealing with them.

A stand out message was that weeds really are 'doctors of the soil' and generally will indicate what soil issues are present & need correction - for example:

- Bare soil
- Low organic matter
- Mineral imbalances
- Microbial imbalances and/or
- As a safety valve for toxins.

Once this is understood then management becomes proactive rather than reactive, dealing with the cause rather than the symptom.

Want to know more? Watch the webinar at https://youtu.be/WCyjGCptva4 for actions on specific weed issues and on how to reduce the impact of herbicide when it does have to be used.

This webinar forms part of our project 'Weedwork', supported through funding from the WA Government's State Natural Resource Management Program, and our project the 'Lower Blackwood Online Community Forum & Information Hub', supported by FRRR, through funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund. The goal of the hub is to enhance our local farming community's capacity to connect and engage with each other - sharing knowledge, skills and practices that build a community better prepared for, and more resilient to, the impacts of drought & other climate extremes into the future.



Through our project 'Weedwork - Declared Weed Control Support in the Lower Blackwood', we are able to offer landholders the opportunity for a 50% contribution towards control of declared weeds - if you have any of these on your property then you may be eligible for funding to assist with their control.
