Although it is a game of triples the team can consist of four players with players being able to be subbed on or off anytime during the game.

168 teams from across W.A. nominated for the State wide competition which took place over several weeks at different venues. Of the 168 teams nominated only three divisional winners, one being Augusta, qualified to represent the state at the National title to be held at Pine Rivers, Queensland in November.

With 816 teams competing from around Australia only 16 teams will qualified for the playoffs in the National championship, one of which is our own Augusta team.

This is a great achievement for a small country bowling Club and our members are very proud of their success to date.

We wish them safe travels and continued success in the National Championship and should they proceed to the finals many will be watching the game on TV which we believe will be broadcast on Foxtel and Kayo.

Cape Leeuwin Trail Planning

Representatives from the Shire of Augusta Margaret River, Augusta Trails and Interpretation Community Reference Group, the Augusta CRC and the Margaret River Busselton Tourism Association recently met with Cultural Custodians Wayne and Zac Webb and David Willcox from Common Ground Trails to undertake a walk-through of the proposed trail alignment. Agreement was reached on a number of key challenges for the trail including the alignment from Dead Finish to the lighthouse.

The next step is presentation of a report to Council outlining the proposed trail alignment, construction methodology and estimated construction costs. If endorsed by Council, applications will be submitted for the necessary environmental and Aboriginal approvals and grant funding sought for construction.



Augusta Works Update

The following works are to be completed in the coming months:

Blackwood Ave Shared Path

Addressing a missing link in the Augusta pathway network, the Blackwood Avenue pathway project will see a new path and parallel parking bays created in front of Augusta Bakery. These works are scheduled to occur prior to the Christmas school holidays.

Ellis Street Precinct Plan

The Shire is currently preparing a plan for Ellis Street Precinct. The plan will indicate proposed amendments to this location including upgrades to roads and parking, landscaping, revegetation and public seating.

This work is linked to a high level review of the Shire's 2011 Boating Strategy, also to be conducted this financial year. The draft plan will be released for public comment once prepared.

The second stage of sealing works on Leeuwin Road are scheduled for October 2022 and Hillview Road is scheduled to be re-sealed prior to Christmas. Matthews and Jane Road are scheduled for re-sealing from January to February 2023.

Lions hosted a group of 27 people comprising 17 riders and support staff at the Augusta Hotel on Saturday 15th October at the end of their annual ride from Perth to Augusta.

Lion Mike Walker took care of arrangements for accommodation, food and refreshments and reported that all had an enjoyable evening.



On behalf of Lions, Mike presented a cheque for \$2,500, making the total for the ride close to \$50,000.

It was great result for the weary riders, some of whom have taken part in all 21 fundraising rides. In all over the 21 years they have raised a total of over 1m dollars.

Again, Lion Mike Walker on behalf of Leeuwin Lions hosted the group for lunch at the Augusta Hotel before handing over a cheque for \$1500.

Simon Kane from the Super Heroes, himself an affected parent, spoke in grateful terms as to what this type of support meant for the brave Super Kids facing the trials of cancer some of which so sadly is terminal.

Then on a more positive note, to the sounds of whistles and trumpets they left to complete the journey via Pemberton, Manjimup and finally Bridgetown.

The tremendous effort by all in involved raised almost \$80,000.

Augusta's Beach Clean-up 2022

A very big thank you to everyone who came along and gave our

beautiful coastline a spring clean on Saturday 15th October. Twenty-six volunteers combed the coast from Skippy Rock to The Blackwood River mouth. Age is no barrier. We are never too old or young to join in and have some fun and make a difference. 39.5 kilograms of debris was removed from our beaches.

One change we have noticed over the years is the increasing amounts of plastic and 'nurdles' that are washing onto beaches. Nurdles are small plastic pellets (less than 5mm in length) that are used to create most plastic items from plastic bottles to car parts. This year a number were collected from Quarry Bay and Skippy Rock. Being so small they are ingested by fish and birds.

Some other items that were collected: fireworks, a mystery metal item which is possibly a gas canister (from another country), 67 pieces of rope and net scraps, 40 metres of rope, 15 pieces of foam buoy, 20 pieces of foam insulation and packaging, 36 lids and tops (including tops from Indonesia and China), 60 pieces of broken glass, 42 pieces of plastic bag, 7 items of clothing, fishing line, ceramics, wood, pieces of straw, confection sticks, cups, plates and cutlery.

The debris collected has been analysed and added into the Australian Marine Debris Database. With this information trends can be observed, changes noted, and source reduction plans introduced. Thank you Jaquie for helping with the sorting and counting of the debris.

Thank you to everyone who joined in and to all our wonderful community members who collect debris along our coast throughout the year. You are making a big difference and helping Augusta stay the beautiful and healthy place it is.

The Augusta Rowers have come to the attention of the Margaret River Busselton

Tourist Association (MRBTA) who want to do a photo shoot on the Blackwood for an upcoming article in their magazine upon Augusta – the photoshoot is pencilled in during the period 1st -4th November. The MRBTA have been made aware of the skiff building projects to which they have registered their interest – details to come for the photoshoot closer to the date & hopefully we'll get good weather.

Rowing activities are again increasing with people returning home from their winter expeditions, increasing daylight and improving warmer weather. Noticeable during the morning rows has been the lack of dolphin sightings let alone any interaction as in the past – hopefully they will return shortly as the fresh water coming down the river abates.

All life jackets have had an annual inspection as all the adult lifejackets are of the manual inflation type. During this process we have become aware that many members are not familiar with the inspection & inflation of the jackets. To this end a session will be organised in the near future where a jacket will be activated inflated - possibly following the AGM.

Two children's & two youth size life jackets that do not require inflating and have the head support already in place have been purchased. These are quite different from the adult inflation type in that new jackets are a vest type & vellow in colour. The children's size jacket for 20 - 40kgs body mass is for 6 to 10 year old's and the youth size is for 40 - 80kgs body mass. The adult inflatable life jackets are for 40 kgs & above body mass.

Additionally 6 fenders of the inflatable tear drop shape, have been purchased which are of a type that will double as buoys / turning marks for regatta etc.

At the time of writing, preparations are underway for the Leeuwin 400 where the Rowers will have the skiffs on display and planning to have some 'hands on knot tying' and other nautical rope skills.

Yet to be advised, but somewhere in the above will be the launching of the Nannup Skiff built by the Nannup Men's Shed. The building of the Acorn continues, currently fitting the thwarts(seats), once these are in place gunnels and floorboards will follow - and then it's the big clean up and sand for painting / varnishing.

The question is being asked 'what next?' particularly by some of the wives of the builders. Being discussed at present is the building of two smaller boats – one of least being what is known as a 'pram dinghy' which can be fitted with a sail or just rowed. Very often these dinghies are used as tenders and can be transported as a car topper or on a conventional box trailer. The plan is that this dinghy be raffled as a fund raiser.

The building of the pram is relatively straight forward because of its size & "stitch & glue" construction, however, there will not be enough tasks for all to contribute. Just as a matter of interest, whilst the number of builders fluctuate, last week there were 10 builders for morning tea! Accordingly the builders are considering a more complex 10ft sail / rowing dinghy in addition to the pram dinghy that will take an adult & child either sailing, rowing, or fitting of a small outboard for fishing on the estuary. Again this build would act as a fund raiser.

The release of Australia State of Environment Report 2021 (SoE Report 2021) has

Since 2000, an estimated 7.7 million hectares of threatened species habitat has been cleared, an area bigger than the size of Tasmania, with 90% never having been assessed by the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

An estimated 3 billion animals were killed or displaced during the Black Summer Bushfires alone, an extreme event linked to climate change. The quality of our soil, air and water are deteriorating, and according to projected models, we will be on this trajectory for years to come, despite efforts made today.

This month of November 2022, the world population will reach 8 billion. Every one of us relies on the Earth's resources, however humans are capable of a conscious shift.



A day of great sailing was had by all. Thanks as usual must go to the start crew Rose, Sue and Peter and Lance on the rescue boat.







Bee swarms – creating a buzz

Why do bees swarm?

Swarming is a natural process for European honey bees (*Apis mellifera*) and forms part of their reproductive life cycle. Honey bee colonies are stimulated to increase their numbers in response to increasing day length, warmer weather and increased availability of nectar and pollen. As a beehive becomes overcrowded, the queen bee and hundreds of worker bees will leave the hive and go in search of a new home. This bee 'swarm' will often remain in the area for a short period before moving some distance and resettling as a tight cluster of bees. Bees then scout for an appropriate nest site, which the swarm will move to and inhabit.

The parent colony will have prepared for this division and raised multiple queen cells from which one will mate and establish as the new queen for the colony.

What do I do if I come across a bee swarm?

Don't panic! If the swarm is still flying, keep your distance. Once clustered, the swarm is usually placid and unlikely to show aggressive behaviour if left undisturbed. Avoid interfering with the swarm if

you're not experienced in its collection or destruction.

Report swarms of bees found near marine ports, airports or domestic freight terminals to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development. These will be screened for biosecurity concerns such as new (exotic) bee species, pests, and diseases.


If a bee swarm settles at your property and doesn't move on, you can arrange to have it removed by either contacting a swarm collector or licenced pest controller. The Western Australian Apiarists' Society (WAAS) lists swarm collectors on their website (waas.org.au/swarms), whilst other contacts can be advertised online, in community directories or newspapers, noticeboards or advertised on social media community groups.


Bee swarms located on public or private lands, or establishing in above or below-ground infrastructure (e.g. Telstra pits), should be reported directly to the respective land or infrastructure manager.

Lower Blackwood Catchment LCDC Community Update October 2022

Evaluating the Outcome of Engagement



We are delighted to announce our success in securing a grant in the latest round of State NRM Funding for our project 'Evaluating Engagement'. The project will undertake a long-term and holistic evaluation of our landholder engagement over the last 4 years, gauge the impact of this work, and then we'll use the information gained to inform & improve our current and future programs and on-ground works.

We will also undertake an evaluation of our longer term on-ground works (eg. Fencing and revegetation) over the last 20 years to establish the impact of these projects on catchment health but also the social impact. By this we mean to see whether or not there is a ripple effect on neighbours surrounding the area where the work has been undertaken and the effect of landholders as key influencers on their neighbours.

We are super excited about this project as we'll be able to assess the success or otherwise of our AAA Engagement Framework (Increasing Awareness, Providing Advice, and Encouraging Adoption), in supporting landholder uptake of regenerative and sustainable agricultural practices and the corresponding environmental, economic and social impacts on those landholders and the wider catchment.

Reveg, Reveg ... Scott River in the Frame

Plenty more natives going in the ground around riparian areas in the catchment. A good example of this is at a Scott River Dairy Farm in which 15,500 plants over 4ha were planted by Capelife in mid-September. One section of the site is a disused strip of paddock adjoining some good quality shrub land on the property, the new plantings will create a 6ha area of wildlife and bird habitat on the farm. Another section of the site is a winter-wet patch in the middle of the farm with a watercourse running through. The

riparian revegetation will enhance stream functions, improve water quality and provide habitat for riparian native wildlife. A win win for the farm & the flora and fauna.

In total, combined with other locations in Scott River, around 20,000 plants over 7 hectares have gone into Scott River damp ground and water edges over the past couple of months with 7km fencing out in or contracted (4km of which is in kind contribution from land holders).

A fantastic effort and a big shout to all the landholders, contractors, volunteers and LCDC team involved!



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


