His partner Danielle, owner of WILD by Dani, immerses herself in nature often, and has fine art prints and canvases available, focusing predominantly on the South West WA region. You will also find calendars, greeting cards, and other smaller products in the gallery. Dani is happy to take orders for a range of sizes of her photography, and handcrafted framing is an optional add-on from Ben.



All of the artists featured in the Hamelin Bay Furniture Gallery take pride in producing work that is handmade with love, wrapped with environmentally conscious packaging, and made to last a lifetime.

Leeuwin 400

'Whilst at the front of the lighthouse, waiting for my next tour group to arrive, I glanced at a plaque placed on the stone wall. The Leeuwin ship sailed past in 1622. I had read that plaque before, but today reflected upon that voyage. Sailing along this treacherous coastline, unknown to those from other lands, what did those on board the ship see and feel, looking toward this coastline?' - Paul Sofilas recalls. That was around 2015. Paul also thought about the future — in 7 years it would be 400 years since that ship passed by the Cape. Could be something to commemorate...

Leeuwin 400 community event was held at Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse on Sunday 30th of October 2022. A 'Welcome to Country' by Wardandi custodians, a new plaque was unveiled by the Ambassador from the Kingdom of the Netherlands, live performers, fun & games, art activities, historic displays and more. That is until the forces of nature intervened. On the afternoon of Saturday 29th, the wind is up, and rain squalls are lashing the Cape. With the intensity to increase the following day. The call is made, by the Leeuwin 400 working group to go with Plan B - relocate event to the Augusta Centennial Hall.

Early Sunday and the Augusta community are in full swing adapting to the change of venue. Augusta Community Rowing set up their skiffs at the front lawn whilst the other activities are set up in the foyer, hall and atrium. The 'community art project' upcycling a 5 by 17 metre yacht sail for as the canvas, is being installed along the side wall of the hall. And pride of place on the stage is the plaque draped behind the unveiling curtain.

The squalls of rain and wind rolling over the town reinforcing the decision to relocate from Cape Leeuwin. By start of proceedings, later in the morning, the hall is filled with locals and visitors.

After Augusta Margaret River Shire President, Paula Cristoffanini opens proceedings and thanks everyone for attending, Iszaac (Zac) Webb, begins by welcoming everyone to Wardandi Boodja. Zac engages the crowd through stories and knowledge, informing and educating, as to the culture of this area's first peoples and their connection to country.

The Dutch Ambassador Marion Derckx follows and gives an insightful speech regarding the connections between the Netherlands and Australia from 1622 to the present. Then Zac and the Ambassador unveil the plaque. The commemorative message scribed in three languages - Wardandi Noongar, Dutch and English. Whilst the Leeuwin sailed past 400 years ago, the Wardandi/Pibelmen People have lived in the area for tens of thousands of years. An aspect of the commemoration, the Leeuwin 400 committee wanted to acknowledge.

Stuart Hicks (Chairman of the board of the MRBTA – the group responsible for initiating the plaque) then spoke of highlighting Cape Leeuwin as a Great Cape of the Southern Hemisphere through a walk trail concept called 'Rounding the Cape'. The Anchormen then set the maritime theme by singing sea shanties to entertain the crowd.

Later that afternoon, a 'Maritime Stories' panel discussion took place at the Colour Patch restaurant. Featuring Zac Webb, Historian - Nonja Peters, Maritime Archaeologists - Martjin Manders (Netherlands) and Jeremy Green (WA Museum). Chaired by Author and Historian Bill Bunbury (Former ABC presenter).

In 1622, the crew aboard the Leeuwin took note of the Southwest coastline, and it appeared on maps in Europe, five years later. What would the Yungunjarli (People) have thought if they looked out and saw the white sails of the Leeuwin sailing past?

Leeuwin 400 was created thanks to a working group consisting of Rebecca Young from AMR Shire, Chris Collins from ACDA, Paul Sofilas from Augusta Historical Society/ **MRBTA** and Rachuel Knapinski from **Augusta Community** Resource Centre. This working group showcased the importance and success a collaborative effort in creating a community event that is recognized worldwide can achieve such great success. Many thanks to all involved in the group, stakeholders, volunteers and community members.

Augusta residents help shape the future of health services

WA Country Health Service (WACHS) recently hosted a series of community workshops for coastal South West residents, including one in Augusta.

Held at the Augusta Community Resource Centre, the morning saw community members, the local Shire and hospital staff come together to give feedback and make suggestions to help guide the future of regional health services for older people.

The workshop was well attended with 45 participants including 31 community members, 13 WACHS staff and one representative from the Augusta Margaret River Shire. Attendees formed groups to discuss:

- Current services
- Opportunities for future health services in the local area
- Improving the patient healthcare journey and the patient experience.

The key themes raised included:

- Transport for appointments and services
- Access to health and community services closer to home
- Access to more aged care services including dementia care
- Attraction and retention of staff and volunteers to provide health and community services.



The information gathered from the workshop will be used to plan the future directions for health services for older people and develop a health service plan that meets their needs across South West coastal areas.

Boranup Bushfire – December 8th 2021

In the lead up to this anniversary I would like to remind you all to please make sure you have a Bushfire Plan in place. Here is my story on the big fire from last year.

Wed 8th December started like any other day. I have an App on my phone called Bushfire.io, all of a sudden I get a notification about a fire in the area. I had a look at the map and honestly did not think much of it, it looks like it is far enough away from our property and it could just be a small fire that will get put out quickly. Boy was I wrong! Around 20 minutes later I get a call from a good friend who lives on the ridge, telling me that fire looks big and it's in your direction, you better get home and check it out.



The next 4 days were the most stressful and challenging days that my husband, family and I have been through. I clearly remember not sleeping on the Wednesday night, our sky was completely RED. My husband works FIFO and I rang him at 11pm to tell him that I am a little unsure of this fire, and to be honest a little scared. At 4am while the kids where still asleep I knew I had to prepare to leave. Lucky we had a caravan, so I loaded it

up with supplies, clothes, food, and anything I found of value that I could grab easily on my own and if everything burnt to the ground at least we would have a small roof over our heads and a few clothes on our back. Some good friends came early Thursday morning and drove the caravan out of the farm to safety. By 12 o'clock Thursday I had left our farm with my children, dogs and chickens in the car heading for Augusta. By this time I could see the fire in the trees and the smoke was getting really black and thick, my kids were starting to find it hard to breathe and they were really scared.

Thursday, my husband got a flight home from Newman and as he landed in Busselton at 1.30pm he thought our home was gone, all you could see was a massive plume of thick black smoke from the air. After spending a night shift at work, no sleep, a flight home, he then stayed awake all night to defend our home. Getting the place prepared for impending doom was the top of the priority. We were right in the middle of this fire zone with embers flying past his face as he did what he could to save our hand built home.

One very important thing I remember from the fire is thinking to myself "what is it I can afford to lose" and "what is it that we cannot replace". Our lives and our beloved dogs where the first things to save, you then consider the things and possessions you have worked so hard to accumulate over the years "can

you replace them?" or "if I lose my home, where can I live". So having hubby at home defending while we were safe was one of the most stressful parts. We are so extremely thankful to a very good friend of ours who drove out to help Ben defend our home. It was a little more comforting knowing someone




else was out there on those last few days, putting out embers with the hose so that hubby could get some sleep. So many of us are forever grateful to the massive effort all the volunteer and emergency service men and women who defended and saved homes, we are so lucky to have not lost a single home in this massive fire. Even though we did not lose any homes the impact it has had on our family, pets and ourselves is longer lasting then people assume. You are forever evaluating the land in which you live. A bushfire can be one of the most traumatic experiences you can have. We still had smoke until 18th December pluming around our house and property. It took weeks of washing our clothes, sheets, and curtains to get rid of the smoke smell. Burn marks in the decking and furniture is a forever reminder of how close we got to losing everything, the fire came within 400 meters of our home.

Bushfire preparedness should be done in the lead up to the fire ban which always comes into effect in October/ November. However it is still not too late to prepare your home, property and belongings. We have some new resources at the Augusta CRC, including a Bushfire Preparedness Toolkit from DFES and other information. So please do call past and grab one. Whether you are a permanent resident, holiday home owner or a visitor to Augusta I highly suggest you have a plan in place for a bushfire disaster.

In 2000 B.C., the Babylonians celebrated the New Year during a 12-day festival called Akitu (starting with the vernal equinox). This was the start of the farming season to plant crops, crown their king, and make promises to pay their debts. One common resolution was the returning of borrowed farm equipment (which makes sense for an agriculturally based society). The Babylonian New Year was adopted by the ancient Romans, as was the tradition of resolutions. The timing, however, eventually shifted with the Julian calendar in 46 B.C., which declared January 1st as the start of the new year. January was named for the two-faced Roman god. Janus, who looks forward for new beginnings as well as backward for reflection and resolution. 

Sunday the 23rd October brought with it a southeasterly breeze of 6 to 8kns. The multihulls were away first, but in the starting box things went a bit askew. Oh well, being a championship heat it was decided a restart was in order.

The monohulls started next, on time, with Seabird getting the gun and F-Troop about 5 seconds behind her. By the start of the second lap it had turned into a real ding-dong battle, with the breeze freshening the lead changed a couple of times and finally F-Troop took the win. The boys were ecstatic.



It was a chaotic charge for the line the second time round for the multihulls. Catatonic broke and was recalled, the rest of the fleet were hard on breeze as they made their way down to the Lion Island mark. Apart from a minor bingle through the race it was plain sailing. The brand new Sea Saw was the winner although not quite as brand new anymore, next was Xena and Sirius Lee in third.

Race two, a consistency race, started in 10kns and saw Sea Saw, Xena, Double Shot and Seriously Lee all set out at a cracking pace, the others trying hard to keep up. After three laps, there was less than a minute in it across the line. Sea Saw fastest and the consistency points to Double shot first, then Yellow Taxi and Xena.

6/11/22. Wind was from the southwest at 15 to 20kns for the first multihull race. Ten boats left the shore but only nine started, Double Shot out with an unfortunate cracked hull. Catatonic took the early lead, Cliff Hanger and Xena not far behind, with the rest of the fleet spread. By the third lap the distances between the first three had closed and Xena pulled off a tantalizing come from behind, to be fastest by two minutes. The championship points going to Xena, Sea Saw and third Catatonic.

The second race was started in 20+kns and was a beauty. The usual suspects led the way, the whole fleet being tested with the stronger wind. On the last lap Cliff Hanger was dismasted, Yellow Taxi capsized, both needing help from the ever-vigilant crew on the rescue boat. Sea Saw took the line honours. Billy M, Emily Jean and Xena third took the consistency points. There were some cold and



worn out sailors at the end of the day.

We had the pleasure of having Don Wild visit us and watch the racing. It looked like he wished he were still out there. Not on a multihull though. His last sail was here in True Love, a beautiful little yacht he loved. He and his brother Rod, learnt to build sailing dinghies and yachts back when they were at school, then sailed them on the Swan River at Royal Perth and South of Perth Yacht clubs. They were both really good yachtsmen.

13/11/22. It looked more windy than it was, southeast 10 to 15kns. Both classes started together, a recipe for disaster lately. Buzz Box led that way, Xena, Frisky and Yellow Taxi hot in pursuit. Xena was taking it to Buzz Box only to see the master clear out to the finish, Frisky and Yellow Taxi fought it out for third.

Redback and Pigs Might Fly were at it from the start, both caught up in a series a tacks to windward before Redback picked the lift that saw her skip away from the field to easily take the win. Big Red Dwarf was closing in, but taking water didn't help her cause, finishing third. On the yard stick results, a type of handicap, she finished first for the championship points, Redback second then Pigs Might Fly.

The second race, another all in start, saw Buzz Box break the line which handed the rest of the field a handy headstart. Xena capitalized and streaked ahead and never looked like being challenged. Second Yellow Taxi and third to Frisky.

In race two Pigs Might Fly took the early lead and pulled away on the windward leg to be just leading after the first lap. Redback picked the breeze better and saw her pull away. It got close at the finish but the damage was done, Redback fastest and Pigs Might Fly taking the consistency points.

Many thanks to the starting box and safety boat crews, without them the racing just doesn't happen.

Thanks also to Augusta IGA with the \$500 from their Community Chest going towards a Net gun which can be fired to capture birds or small animals. With so many seabird needs, especially hook & fishing line entanglements, this is an essential tool. Thanks also to Seabird Rescue WA for training Kerry Bell.

The end of the year is nearly here and this is the last edition of the Pelican Post for 2022. The hordes are descending on our small community and we typically experience a rise in criminal activity and incidents of anti-social behaviour.

Traffic matters ...

Road safety is an important part of policing and with any holiday period, our roads see a considerable increase in vehicular movement. As a result, Police will be patrolling our roads targeting those road users who have little or no regard for others. Be patient and courteous to other drivers when travelling and remember that your journey may take a little longer.

WARNING: Double demerit points will apply from 00:01am Friday 23 December 2022 to 11:59pm Sunday 8 January 2023 inclusive.

Slow down, don't use your phone, wear your seatbelt, and don't drink and drive.









Remember – Road Safety is everyone's responsibility.

There will be additional police patrols on our roads so expect to be stopped at some time. You will be breath tested. Unfortunately, some people still don't get it. If you plan to drink, don't drive. If you drive, don't drink. Pretty simple really, but some people seem to think they can't go out and enjoy themselves without drinking. Sometimes we don't catch those people until it's too late. A few people have been caught for drink driving in recent times. Of note, was one driver who blew 0.149 (almost three times the legal limit) just after 1.30pm! That person lost their licence on the spot via an instant disqualification and has to appear before a Magistrate to explain their behaviour.





Are you going away on holidays? Remember, if you are towing a caravan, boat or trailer, the maximum permissible speed is 100kph. In towns and built up areas with no signs, the speed limit is 50kph.

Help us help you — Not everyone is honest. Please make sure you secure your property. At this time of year, we traditionally see an increase in reported theft. 



Our students returned to Hamelin Bay for the second time this year to continue valuable conservation work on their Adopt-A-Spot site with our friend Tracey Muir of Margaret River Nature Conservation.

Our site is looking rejuvenated and the children enjoyed the sunny weather as they pulled weeds and cleared space to plant pigface to help prevent further erosion at the beach. They learnt about why we need to eliminate weeds, such as onion weed and euphorbia.

After the students finished planting pigface, they headed to the beach to learn about shorebirds and their habitats with Greg, a volunteer from Birdlife Australia. Greg suggested that we should always take a container to the beach and collect rubbish, mainly plastics, to help project the environment and habitat of our precious fauna. We did a quick collection of small plastic waste to end the excursion.

In their first lesson, the students learnt print-making, and were so engrossed in this project. They produced some beautiful work that will later be incorporated into lanterns.

Augusta's Dark Sky and Why it is Worth Protecting - Part One

Dark skies are defined as places "where the darkness of the night sky is relatively free of interference from artificial light."

You might think that Western Australia with its vast unpopulated places would have a lot of dark sky – and you would be right. But with WA's very high city-based population, around 90 percent of people reside in urban areas where light pollution is significant.

Many of those people get a shock when they spend a few nights in Augusta and see how clear the night sky is on a cloudless night. They can see the Milky Way clearly which is not something they can do in Perth. This clarity is something that Augusta residents tend to take for granted, and it is only when we visit Perth for a few days that we experience the permanent and pervasive nighttime "sky glow" that is part of living in large urban

This can be seen with the link to the following interactive map. https://www.lightpollutionmap.info which clearly shows a high level of light pollution from Busselton up to Perth. It also shows Augusta as a small source of light pollution, meaning that we experience predominantly dark skies. It is not just urban areas that create light pollution. Industry and mining also create large areas of light pollution. Light from the Wagerup Alumina Refinery near Waroona, for instance, can be experienced from 10 kms away, and observed as sky glow from a much greater distance.

So why is all of this light pollution an issue? Excess light pollution can have negative impacts on our sleep

quality and ultimately on our psychological well-being. It can also impact heavily on our native fauna – changing their feeding, social. migratory and social habits. Dark skies are a remedy for these issues. and allow us and other animals to experience a more natural lifestyle.



In the next edition of the Pelican Post we will look at the international Dark Sky Movement and the ways in which communities are tackling their own light pollution problems


Memorial Garden

Why Now? Arum Lily's biological weak link is when it is actively growing from June through to November, with the optimum time for control when

at least 50 to 70% of flowers are present (July to October) or until the flowers start to wither.

If you are a landholder in the Lower Blackwood District and you have Arum Lily on your property you are invited to drop by the Landcare office by appointment to collect some free chemical and information to assist you with the control of this invasive environmental weed.

My photo taken on my phone shows about half of the group, further down the beach there were more, but they flew. A total of around 40 Sanderlings feeding in the seaweed wrack where there were a lot of small maggots.

There are so many migratory birds at the end of Deere Street, Augusta on a low tide - Sanderlings, Ruddy Turnstones and other shorebirds all feeding together. Lots of resident Red-capped Plovers and 10 Australian Pied Oystercatchers.

28 October

On Deere Street beach, I photographed 1 Bar-tailed Godwit, 1 Great Knot, 3 Red Knot, 20 Red-necked Stints, 20 Sanderlings (all migratory shorebirds) and 15 Red-capped Plovers (resident beach nesting birds BNBs). Chris Haskett




