The Annual HMAS Nizam Memorial Service at Cape Leeuwin has been conducted at this site since 1993, and this year it will be held on Sunday February 12th at 10.00 am.

30 years ago surviving members of the N Class Destroyers set about getting the Memorial Cairn erected at Cape Leeuwin where it still stands today. Members and their families have travelled to the area each year to conduct this very special service. Unfortunately, none of our surviving members are able to travel the distance due to poor health and age.

Our association, consisting of direct descendants, families and friends of the 'N's, from all over Australia, ensure that this event continues to be recognised and is very well supported.

There is only one 'N' Class sailor left here in WA, Ron Whitmore ex HMAS Nepal. Three in Victoria, George Raphael OAM and Jack Lance ex HMAS Norman and John Lovett ex HMAS Nizam. And our eldest and only

member in NSW, Doug Wickens ex HMAS Nestor/HMAS Norman, who will be turning 102 on 30th April this year.

The five 'N' Class Destroyers, Napier, Nizam, Nestor, Nepal and Norman were built in the UK and although part of the Royal Navy, were commissioned to the RAN and crewed by Australians throughout WWII.

The 'N's served in every ocean in the world and hold 26 Battle honours between them. Unfortunately HMAS Nestor was sunk in the Mediterranean on 16th June 1942.

After their battles in the Atlantic, Africa, Mediterranean, Crete and Tobruk, the four 'N's joined the British Pacific Fleet playing a major role in the defeat of the Japanese. After the war ended, N Class Destroyers associations were formed in NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, South Australia, Queensland and lastly Western Australia in 1989. Today Western Australia is the only branch still operating.

Associate Membership is open to any direct descendants of 'N' Class Sailors, and Affiliate Membership to anyone who has a keen interest in our association.

Over the past years we have been very fortunate to have the full support of the Commanding Officers from HMAS Stirling, the RAN Band, Navy buglers and magnificent catafalque parties guarding the memorial for the HMAS Nizam Service.

We are pleased to have the Commanding Officer, Captain Gary Lawton, attending again this year, together with the catafalque party and RAN Navy band. Chaplain, Barrie Yesberg PCHA RAN (Retd) will be conducting this year's service and we sincerely thank Barrie for his support.

The RAN Navy Band will once again provide a free concert at the Augusta Hotel on Saturday 11th February from 2-4pm. Everyone is welcome.

A special thank you to the Lions Club of Leeuwin, Myles and Mary Rees, and the school children from Augusta PS and the people of Augusta who continue to provide the wonderful support of our association throughout the vear and the HMAS Nizam service.






'Total Reset: realigning with our timeless holistic blueprint for living'

Join the Fight on Invasive Sweet Pittosporum – Free Workshop

Nature Conservation Margaret River Region and the Shire of Augusta Margaret River are running a community workshop at Augusta's Turner Holiday Park from 10am to 12pm on Wednesday 8 February to help people understand, identify and eradicate the invasive weed *Pittosporum undulatum*, which often escapes home gardens and infests bushland.

Sweet Pittosporum is a fast growing, shrub or small tree with seed from the bright orange fruit spread by birds. It takes over and degrades bushland areas by outcompeting and shading the slower growing native plants. There are many large established trees and smaller plants spreading into nearby bushland areas and private property in the Augusta area.

Local residents are welcome to attend the free hands-on workshop to find out about identifying and controlling Sweet Pittosporum in the backyard. It will be led by well-known bush regenerator Rick Ensley. Tickets are free but places are limited. The community workshop will complement a broader sweet pittosporum control program being rolled out this year in collaboration between the Shire, Nature Conservation and local volunteer groups. Upcoming control efforts will target local bushland reserves, road reserves and Crown land in the Augusta area, including sites around Flinders Bay, Turner Holiday Park, Albany Terrace, Lions Park, Victoria Parade, and Donovan Street.

New Greywater System at Flinders Bay Holiday Park

The Shire is pleased to let the community know that a greywater diversion system has now been installed at Flinders Bay Holiday Park. The new system allows greywater from the existing three ablution blocks to be diverted, filtered, and then irrigated at

various sites around the property, allowing the park to responsibly manage wastewater.

The team at Flinders Bay Holiday Park are now seeking to educate guests on the importance of reduced shower times, using grey safe laundry products and washing dishes in the camp kitchen sinks to allow the system to reach its full potential.

Thank you to local wastewater solution expert "Water Wally" aka Anthony Smith and local contractors Gozzi Gas and Plumbing, and Lightning Ridge Electrical who worked tirelessly in the lead up to Christmas so the system was ready for the peak season.

'LEEUWIN 400' DOCUMENT TRANSFERRED TO PERMANENT HOME



2023 after the Christmas/New Year crowds had waned a little, President Matt Russell joined with Light House keeper and well-known local, Paul Sofilas, to transfer the "document" prepared jointly between the Lions Clubs of Texel in the Netherlands

and Leeuwin the South Western corner of Australia, to celebrate the occasion of the first sighting of Cape Leeuwin by a Dutch vessel 400 years ago in March 1622, to the security and safety of one of the original Lighthouse Keepers cottages now refurbished as a museum and interpretive centre. The "document" was presented by President Matt to Paul at the entrance to Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse and later transferred for public viewing to the museum and interpretive centre, from where it is likely to attract interest from upwards of 130,000 visitors annually.





FLOWERS FOR NIZAM MEMORIAL WEEKEND

The Lions Club of Leeuwin have for 30 years given valuable assistance to the 'N' Class Destroyers Association of WA to enable the smooth conduct of the annual NIZAM memorial weekend.

This year this wonderful group of naval veterans and their families will again descend on Augusta for the 30th Anniversary of the dedication of a Cairn (in 1993) and Memorial Service for 10 sailors lost overboard from HMAS Nizam in treacherous seas some 20 kilometres off Cape Leeuwin, only six months prior to the end of WWII.

Each year over this time Lions have provided flowers and equipment and set up approximately 200 chairs for the memorial service at Cape Leeuwin then cleaned the site and returned the chairs and equipment afterwards.

Since the added support of the Stirling Naval Base, now under the command of Captain Gary Lawton, and the exceptional talent of the WA Navy Band, those same chairs and equipment are also delivered and picked up afterwards from the FREE CONCERT put on by the Navy Band for the people of Augusta in appreciation of the welcome and

service provided. The free concert is held on the lawns of the Augusta Hotel overlooking the river from 2-4pm on Saturday 11th February with the Nizam memorial service held on Sunday 12th February commencing at 10.00am at Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse. All are welcome to attend.

Augusta Police Station

Since May 2018 I have called Augusta home after arriving here from Walpole. As a police officer, we are at the most a four-year tourist before we have to move on to another position. My time as the Officer in Charge at Augusta Police Station has, unfortunately, come to an end. Like most people, I have had good times and bad times, attended many differing jobs, and made a lot of friends. I am very grateful to the community here who have been very supportive, especially over the difficult period of the Covid pandemic.

In my career, Augusta has been the longest I have served at any single location. This is testament to the community of Augusta and I would like to take the opportunity to say 'Thank you'. Hats off to all the emergency service volunteers at St John, Marine Rescue and the Fireys who have assisted and supported me at serious incidents and a big shout out to all those other selfless people who volunteer in other capacities in the community. Without volunteers, small communities like Augusta would not have the services and protection these people provide. To all of you, I say 'Thank vou', vou have certainly made my role easier. After 37 years of policing, I am pleased to be able to say that Augusta will be my last post. I will be taking leave from mid-February until I officially retire from the WA Police Force later in the year. The search for a new Sergeant / Officer in Charge is currently underway and although Darren and Ross have only been in Augusta for a short time, they are settling in well and will continue in their roles while the new Sergeant finds their feet. I have no doubt, the community here will make them feel welcome and show them the same level of support that I received over my stay.

Traffic matters

There has been a significant increase in the amount of traffic around our town over the festive season, but most people seemed to be doing the right thing. Augusta Police alone have stopped almost 500 drivers during the holiday period with all drivers being breath tested. Most people returned 'zero' readings but a few drivers were caught out with two drivers losing their licences on the spot. At least they were stopped before they crashed. Both drivers will have the opportunity to attend court and explain their behaviour to the Magistrate, before having their licences suspended for at least six months and a substantial fine to boot. Road crashes are jobs we don't want. Unfortunately, Augusta Police and Margaret River Police, along with our volunteers, have attended a lot of crashes this holiday season. Pay attention whenever you are driving - a moment's inattention or an impulsive or impatient decision can cause a lifetime of regret. Please drive carefully.

Remember - Road Safety is everyone's responsibility.

Crime issues

The holiday period in Augusta usually sees an increase in reported crime, particularly opportunistic thieving, but this year we have not received as many reports. Although the caravan parks and holiday accommodation have been at capacity we have only received a handful of official reports.

One instance that was more serious than a stealing report was where a property was burgled. The offender gained entry to a property at night time and stole some items. Ross and Darren attended and commenced inquiries with the offender later being identified and apprehended. He is now facing the courts on a number of charges including aggravated burglary, stealing and fraud. I have been advised of some other incidents being published on a local community Facebook page. Facebook reports are not police reports. Police DO NOT monitor Facebook or any other social media platform. If something requires Police attention call the below numbers:

Garden Gossip

Happy New Year to you all and I hope you've enjoyed the summer break.

Our first meeting of 2023 will be held on Monday 20th February at 1.30pm. The venue is the Dr John Williams Meeting Room, Leeuwin Aged Units, 194 Blackwood Avenue.

Noeline Williams's gardening tip for January: I have always loved plants indoors, they have a serious role to play in cleansing the home and visually are just

brilliant. However, there is no such thing as an 'indoor plant'; some will survive longer than others indoors - trust me I know!! Keeping them on the drier side is a better idea when growing them without sunlight to prevent root rot. Overwatering is the number one killer of indoor plants – again, trust me I know!!

My tips – group plants together, water minimally, feed with liquid fertiliser (more often in warmer months, less in winter months) and wipe any dust from leaves.

Being the year of the rabbit I wonder did they spin with rabbit fur. This is the information I found.



Angora wool being spun directly from the rabbit

Angora wool comes from a rabbit, it is more like silk and is 7 times warmer than sheep wool. Angora wool is about the only fibre that can be spun directly from its source (the rabbit). It does not need to be cleaned

or carded, depending on how it is harvested. You begin harvesting angora wool when it is three inches long. This is about the length at which the rabbit begins to shed the wool naturally.

Rabbits are clean animals as they don't have lanolin in their coat like sheep, very little washing (if any) is necessary. A rabbit can yield 3-10 pairs of socks a year depending on the quality of the rabbit. The yarn can be used for knitting and felting projects. Angora wool is ideal for making baby garments, sweaters, hats, scarves and mittens.




Summer, so far, has been busy for the Augusta Volunteer Marine Rescue Group with rescues and recoveries of vessels, commencement of the building of the new base in the small craft harbour as well as various training exercises and fundraising initiatives.

Six rescues/ recoveries of boats were carried out offshore of Augusta over the Christmas/New Year holiday period by Augusta VMR skippers and crew using the RV Ryall. Most involved vessels belonging to out-of-town visitors which experienced mechanical problems and required towing back to the small craft harbour. A reminder that, in emergencies, skippers should use VHF Channel 16 with Repeater Channel 82 or, if with mobile phone reception, call 000.

Building of the new VMR base is proceeding at its new location in the small craft harbour with the foundations and binding slab laid. The walls are expected to be cast and raised soon. Fit out of the new base will require some serious fundraising so please contribute to the VMR donation jars at shops around town and at the lighthouse.

Augusta's Dark Sky and Why it is Worth Protecting - Part Two

In the previous edition of the Pelican Post we looked at the concept of Dark Sky and how most of Western Australia's population is exposed to a permanent sky night time sky glow as a result of living in urban areas. We also learned how light pollution can alter our sleep patterns and our psychological well-being, and how it can also impact on the feeding, social, migratory, and social habits of our native fauna in a negative way.


The photo below shows the light graduation (Bortle Scale) from dark sky to a heavily light polluted city sky.

need for planners to apply dark sky principles to new residential and industrial developments and ensure that consideration is given to reducing light pollution. The statement can be seen at https://www.wa.gov.au/system/files/2022-01/PS_dark_sky_astrotoursim.pdf

Astro-tourism is becoming more prominent as a tourism marketing tool, and while Augusta doesn't have an observatory to protect from light pollution, its fortunate geographical position of being surrounded by ocean, and by natural bushland, means that it already

has a good start in the Dark Sky stakes.

With the recent rapid expansion of housing and industrial estates in the wider region, the challenge for our planners and residents in general is to ensure that mitigating light pollution becomes a much more prominent issue for consideration. It has important benefits for wildlife, our health, tourism, and our general quality of life



The International Dark-Sky Association started in 1988, and as one of its roles, champions the use of "sky friendly outdoor lighting" in urban areas. It emphasises lighting to be directed only where it is needed (and not placed where it is not), to be the lowest wattage required, and to be turned off when not needed (light curfew). It also is the lead body in identifying Dark Sky Places and generally promoting Dark Sky principles. More in-depth information can be found at https://www.darksky.org/light-pollution/

A prime example of this approach is the city of Flagstaff in Arizona in the USA which became the world's first International Dark Sky City after putting in place planning measures to actively reduce light pollution. It now has 14 times less light pollution than cities of similar population (75,000) in the USA, and the Milky Way can be easily seen from within the city.

Closer to home the Western Australian government has recently released a position statement entitled "Dark Sky and Astrotourism", which identifies the

Retired Army Nurse Major Lynette Pearton will give the address and remember the nurses who died 81 years ago. We wish to thank Brian Neal retiring Karridale -Augusta RSL president for his amazing contribution and effort in the past. We are sorry to see him leave Augusta. We wish him well in his new home. Gil Goodwin will be the Master of ceremonies.

In February 1942 Japanese Forces were on the outskirts of Singapore. Of the 65 nurses who were evacuated on SS Vyner Brooke only 24 returned to Australia after the war. 12 perished following the sinking of the Vyner Brooke on February 14th. 21 were shot on Banka Beach, 4 died in the Banka POW camp and 4 at the Sumatra POW camp.

The average weight of the nurses on release from captivity was 30 kilograms. They endured harsh conditions with

limited resources as their possessions were lost when the ship sunk. The very limited diet and lack of medication caused the demise of many of their colleagues. Surviving nurses wore their uniform for each funeral in the camp and sang 2 verses from the hymn Jerusalem the Golden. We are grateful to the Augusta Primary school, Augusta - Karridale RSLWA and community who meet to honour this important anniversary.

There will be a morning tea at the Anglican Church Allnutt terrace following the service. All are welcome

New wasp season in full swing!

The annual hunt to detect and eradicate European wasps (*Vespula germanica*) from WA is underway!

Guard your BBQs, monitor your pet's food and check the insects you scoop from the pool! European wasps, we are looking for you!

The European wasp is a declared pest and must be reported. It has threatened to establish in WA since six nests were found and destroyed near Fremantle in 1977, but thanks to ongoing collaborative surveillance between the Department, community, local governments and business, WA has prevented their permanent establishment and spread.

Widely established across most of southern Australia, these highly adaptive scavengers hitchhike their way across the border and into WA each year. This season is the 45th year spent competing in a sophisticated game of 'hide and seek' against this highly adaptable and destructive pest.

Most detections are made in the Perth Metro but following regional detections in the past year DPIRD

has set up surveillance traps in Geraldton, Dumbleyung, Goomalling, Bunbury, Albany, and Eucla this year. If you live in any of these locations and would like to join the community team by adopting a surveillance trap, please search "European wasp Adopt-a-trap" online to sign up or give us a call.

Know what to look for

Unlike the widespread and similar looking black and yellow paper wasp, European wasps:

- Scavenge on human and pet food.
- Feed on fruit like grapes and stone fruit.
- Nest underground nests can grow to the size of a basketball in a single season and have a single (golf ball sized) entrance hole.
- Have completely black antennae.
- Do NOT dangle their legs when flying.

A balmy evening at the Berry Farm provided a perfect setting for our 2022 AGM in December, which marked the end of an amazing year for us. With so many things to be proud of our key achievements for the 21/22 financial year were highlighted during the meeting with the presentation of the Annual Report - here is a sneak peak at some them:

- * The successful delivery of 10 on ground & engagement projects covering a raft of sustainable agriculture areas including whole farm soil testing & nutrient management, trials of practices to improve soil health, feral pig control, riparian restoration & weed control, and the further development of a Regenerative Agriculture community of practice.
- * Growth of the LCDC team to bring to a total of 8 staff members for project management, liaison & support.
- * 6ha of revegetation plantings completed & a further 7.7ha contracted, & 4.2km of fencing completed with another 5km planned.

Engagement & delivery of information to over 1000 catchment landholders and other LCDC subscribers.

Congratulations and thanks also to reappointed Chairperson **Tim Crimp**, Treasurer **Bruce Hamilton** and Deputy Chairperson Tim Prosser.

Get on Top of Blackberry Now.. with a little help from us!

With the Blackberry flowering & fruiting season in full swing our current focus is on working with landholders to get on top of this problematic and invasive weed.

Just one berry may contain as many as 80 seeds, which are easily spread by birds, mammals (especially foxes) and water. Blackberry will persist indefinitely in an area unless it is treated. Plants that die are replaced by seedlings or daughter plants produced by nearby individuals. Plants may produce up to 13,000 seeds per square metre!

Through our State NRM funded 'Weedwork - Declared Weed Control Support in the Lower Blackwood' Project we are able to offer landholders the opportunity for a 50% contribution towards control of blackberry along waterways on their properties.


