

Works on Ellis Street Foreshore

The works will involve the demolition of the existing failing timber wall and the installation of a new sheet pile wall and footpath.

Works are scheduled to occur on the 7th of March and will take one month to complete. The jetty will be closed during this time however a temporary floating jetty will be installed at the site for public use.



Parking bays in front of the jetty will be unavailable for use during the works however parking is available at other sites in the Ellis Street foreshore precinct.

DONATIONS TO FELLOW **AUSTRALIANS IN DISTRESS**

The widespread and major floods on the east coast and more recently those to the north of our state in the Kimberley and Pilbara regions from Broome to Fitzroy Crossing and beyond have wreaked untold damage on homes, businesses. infrastructure, livestock and livelihoods. Many people have lost everything.

As with all natural disasters Lions are amongst the first on the ground to render aid and assistance. A couple of months ago, due to the record floods on the east coast, the Lions Club of Leeuwin sent to the Australian Lions Foundation (ALF) a cheque for \$20,000 to be used for immediate supplies and relief for people in the most hard hit towns around Lismore in NSW.

This month the Club has sent the same amount, ie \$20,000 to ALF for relief for those in the worst affected areas around Broome and Fitzroy Crossing.



Angel of the Outback - Nancy Bird Walton, flying doctors co-founder

From the moment she was born, Nancy Bird lived up to her name. Born in Kew, New South Wales in 1915, Bird's desire to fly developed before she could walk. Unfortunately, as a Depression-era child, she was forced to leave school at the age of 13 to help her family.

But her dream was only temporarily postponed. When she was 18, she became one of the first students at Charles Kingsford-Smith's flying school. At the age of 19, she realised her lifelong ambition by earning her pilots licence and purchasing a de Havilland Gipsy Moth.

Alongside fellow female aviation pioneer Peggy McKillop, Walton earned money by 'barnstorming', a common activity at the time. Walton and McKillop would fly into fairs and perform aerial tricks to draw a crowd, before charging fair-goers for a short plane ride. The novelty of taking a ride with a female pilot proved lucrative.

During one of these barnstorming tours, she met Reverend Stanley Drummond. The Reverend had a plan to start

a flying doctors service but needed a pilot. Nancy agreed and together they launched Royal Far West Children's Health Scheme in 1935, using her Gipsy Moth as an air ambulance. The Far West

Children's Health Scheme covered territory that wasn't covered by the Royal Flying Doctors at the time such as Queensland. Bird came to be known as the Angel of the Outback for her work in saving lives and giving peace of mind to families in rural areas.

Nancy remained with the Far West Children's Health Scheme until WWII broke, when she left to train female pilots. During the war, she met and married Englishman Charles Walton, who gave her the nickname Nancy-Bird. Even after marriage, she remained a Bird. In 1950, Nancy Bird Walton founded the Royal Women Pilots Association, continuing to help female pilots for decades to come.






The lifestyle for the Nyoongar communities during Bunuru: Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Hot easterly winds continue with a cooling sea breeze

Another striking flower that is hard to go past is the female Zamia (Macrozamia riedlei). Being much larger than that of its male counterpart, the huge cones emerge from the centre of the plant with masses of a cotton wool like substance.

HMAS NIZAM SAILORS REMEMEBERED



On Sunday 12th February, the N Class Destroyers Association of WA held their commemorative service at the N Class memorial site, Cape Leeuwin for the ten sailors lost overboard from HMAS Nizam on 11th Feb 1945.

In near perfect weather conditions, Chaplain Barrie Yesberg RSLWA PCHA RAN Retd conducted the service before a crowd of approximately

200 ppl. The service was well supported by the Commanding Officer of HMAS STIRLING, Captain Gary Lawton, a magnificent catafalque party and flag attendant together with the RANR Band.

Mr John Allert, President of the 'N' Class Destroyers Association, welcomed everyone to the service and paid respect to the Wadandi Noongar people before acknowledging the four surviving N Class sailors in Australia.

WA Ron Whitmore (Nepal)

NSW Doug Wickens (Nestor, Napier, Norman) Victoria: George Raphael and Jack Lance (Norman)

Unfortunately the WWII sailors are no longer able to attend due to their age, health issues and the inability to travel the long distance to Augusta.

John then acknowledged the only N Class widow who had made the journey, Mrs Gwen Hammond wife of Derek Hammond ex HMAS Nizam. Gwen has only missed a couple of these services and proves yet again that age, distance and health will not deter her from attending.

A wonderful address was given by Mr Vince Connelly CEO RSLWA, followed by Commanding Officer HMAS Stirling, Captain Gary Lawton who gave an excellent Naval Address.

Committee members, Wendy Johnson, Marion Clive and Kave Andrew delivered the N Class Address prepared by Kathy Stewart which illustrated the history of the ten lost

sailors before they embarked on HMAS Nizam, a journey which would be their last. Local Augusta resident, Shirley Shephard, guardian of the boys memorial boards, held each of them up for all to see, in an attempt to reveil that they are not just names on a cairn.

Head Girl, from Augusta Primary School, Ella Adams, read a lovely poem called "Bless You".

The City of Cockburn RSL Sub Branch President Mr Tiny Small OAM, read the poem "In Memory Of Our Shipmates" and also recited the Sailors Ode followed by the Naval Ode.

Due to the 2022 service being cancelled last February, six

new plaques were dedicated on the Memorial Wall together with three new ones for 2023. These were, Blue Higgins (Napier) Jack Clayton (Napier), George Ramsay (Nizam) Leonard Hill (Napier, Norman, Nepal) John Lovegrove (Nizam) and Phillip Wilson (Nizam), For 2023, Joe Treers (Nepal), Keith Sharp (Nizam), and Richard Hooker (Napier)



Family members for Blue, Jack and George were in attendance to

dedicate 2022 plaques. A special mention of Keith Sharp's daughters, Jenny and Richard Sambell and Ann and Adrian Ballantyne who travelled from Queensland and Victoria to dedicate Keith's plaque and lay a wreath. Wreaths were also laid for the other plaques by committee members, on behalf of those families who could not attend from the Eastern states.

A beautiful tribute to the ten sailors who were lost overboard with the lovely display of the memorial signs placed amongst the flowers lining the pathway to the cairn. This display gives them an identity of more than just names on a cairn.

A banjolele is a four stringed musical instrument with a neck like a ukulele and a body like a banjo. This instrument achieved its greatest popularity in the 1920s and 1930s and combines the small scale tuning and playing style of a ukulele with the constructive and distinctive tone of the banjo, hence the name.

Its development was pushed by the need for vaudeville performers to have an instrument that could be played with the ease of the ukulele, but with more volume.

This was the instrument played by British comedian Geroge Formby who developed his own style of playing in accompaniment to his comic songs. His name is associated with the instument more than any other musician.

Other famous players who have used this instrument in later years are Queen member Brian May in the song "Bring Back That Leroy Brown" and George Harrison in later years, using it in several recordings.

There is always a spare ukulele for anyone who would like a try or just come along and sing.

Pigs Might Fly only just won the next three after some tight sailing downwind and on the reach to the finish. Thanks again to the starting box, safety boat and handicapping ladies and gentlemen, we couldn't go sailing without you.
