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














It was fabulous to see the iconic Augusta River Festival back in full swing last month after being cancelled in 2021 and 2022 due to Covid-19. Putting together a full-day event like this takes a huge amount of time and energy and I'd like to express my sincere thanks to all of those involved in bringing this event to life. The Shire is immensely proud to sponsor this event and it was a pleasure to see everyone having such a great time.

With regard to a childcare solution for the Augusta community, following a discussion with the State Government and the Augusta and Districts Community Childcare (ADCC), the Shire is no longer pursuing a Management Order over 7 Hillview Road in Augusta to enable them to pursue direct discussions. In February, a group of keen Augusta residents gathered at Turner Holiday Park to hone their skills on identifying and controlling the noxious Sweet Pittosporum (Pittosporum undulatum) weed. Under the guidance and expertise of well-known bush regenerator Rick Ensley and Nature Conservation Margaret River Region's Nathan Hammer, participants learnt how to identify Sweet Pittosporum plants and apply different control methods that can be used in backyards, gardens and in bushland.

The workshop was part of the Shire of Augusta Margaret River and Nature Conservation Margaret River's partnership project aiming to control Sweet Pittosporum across the Shire. This fast-growing shrub or small tree has bright orange marble-sized fruit which is spread by birds. In time, it chokes out and degrades bushland

areas by outcompeting and shading the slower growing native plants.

A number of other sites in the Augusta area will be targeted for Sweet Pittosporum control during the year. A collaborative effort is needed, and with support of local residents and property owners, it is hoped that this invasive species can be stopped in its tracks. Howling Onshore





The year is off to a flying start at the Men's Shed here in Augusta. We have been very busy completing multiple projects. The pièce de resistance


being the 1952 Ferguson TED-20 tractor that is now completely restored and up for sale to raise important funds for the Shed. Once again, our team of dedicated vehicle enthusiasts led by Dave Waterson has lovingly brought this tractor back to its former glory of being one of the most valuable farm vehicles to grace the paddocks of farms all around the world in the 1950s. Made in England by the Standard Motor Company of Coventry the TEx-20 series of tractors featured the hydraulically operated unique 3-point linkage system at the rear of the tractor to mount and operate a range of farming implements from ploughs to cultivators, trailers, loaders, seed drills etc. This rapidly became a standard method of mounting such equipment and other manufacturers soon copied it to supply their own versions of farm implements. Interestingly, the motor in the 'little grey Fergy' was a relatively new design of 4-cylinder petrol engine that had aircraft engine origins and was shared with several of the Standard Motor Company cars of that era namely the Vanguard and the early Triumph TR series sports cars. It was renowned for its reliability and longevity. One other interesting

feature of the actual tractor we have restored is the letter "D" in its model designation, some people think it stands for Diesel when in fact it was one of the variants of the TEx-20 series that ran on TVO (Tractor Vaporising Oil) or power kerosene (paraffin) that was a cheaper fuel for the farmers in the early 1950s. There were lots of variants of this faithful little tractor and for those interested you can find them all in a good write-up on https://en.wikipedia. org/wiki/Ferguson_TE20 including some facts about the 'Fergy' being the first vehicle to reach the south pole with Sir Edmund Hillary in the mid 1950s.

Other projects we have been working on include a coffin thanks to our president John Parlor who is pictured 'trying it

for size', well done John, we were a little worried there for a while thinking that we might have to find a new president!

We also completed 20 little wooden





We have been liaising closely with the AMR Shire to get permission to security fence the whole Shed site and complete some hardstand area at the back to serve as overflow parking and laydown storage. It will also allow better all-weather vehicle access to the rear of the Shed. This work should finally kick-off in early April all going

Hello and welcome to Autumn. Our March meeting on Thursday 16th was a full house thanks to British Historian Guy de la Bedoyere. Members from Margaret River and Districts Historical Society joined our group as we listened enthralled as Guy gave us the history of an interesting Cameo from Roman times, through the hands of Peter Paul Rubens and on to the Dutch East India Company and being on the Batavia when it was wrecked and onto current times – with several gaps in its history that are simply unknow. He was lucky enough to see the cameo during one of his visits to Australia when it was briefly here on display before being returned to Europe. This includes Insurance, mowing, fertilising, removal of rubbish, dead trees, and branches, and replacing greens, thanks to the effort of members.


With the planned improvements the Club will be holding busy bees and asking for support from the Community and other users of the course.

Vi Douglas's gardening tip for April: Chrysanthemums should be budding-up

now in time for Mother's Day. Keep fertilising with a high potash fertiliser (I recommend Yates Flower and Fruit). If you are cutting flowers to put in a vase, make sure you trim off all the bottom leaves and change the water every couple of days. For large flowering plants that are growing in the garden, cut back hard after flowering has finished, about 3 inches from the ground, as this will provide a good strong base keeping the plant alive and healthy for years to come.

ANZAC DAY

Why is this day special to Australians?

On the morning of 25 April 1915, the Anzacs set out to capture the Gallipoli peninsula in order to open the Dardanelles to the allied navies. The objective was to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul in Turkey), the capital of the Ottoman Empire, and an ally of Germany.

The Anzacs landed on Gallipoli and met fierce resistance from the Ottoman Turkish defenders. Their plan to knock Turkey out of the war quickly became a stalemate, and the campaign dragged on for eight months.

At the end of 1915, the allied forces were evacuated. Both sides suffered heavy casualties and endured great hardships. Over 8,000 Australian soldiers were killed. News of the landing on Gallipoli and the events that followed had a

profound impact on Australians at home. The 25th of April soon became the day on which Australians remember the sacrifice of those who had died in the war.

The Anzacs were courageous and although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign left us all a powerful legacy.

What does Anzac Dav mean today?

With the coming of the Second World War, Anzac Day also served to commemorate the lives of Australians who died in that war. The meaning of Anzac Day today includes the remembrance of all Australians killed in military operations. read more www.army.gov.au







Riparian Revegetation & Fencing

Seven revegetation sites, totalling 6 hectares, were planted up in 2022 with the support of Healthy Estuaries WA - the properties ranged from Witchcliffe down to Karridale and over the river in Warner Glen and Scott River.

The revegetation sites have had their challenges, like prolific weeds and difficulties with site preparation during the wet season, but Andrew

Hemsley, our enthusiastic Revegetation Officer is generally happy with the survival of the planted seedlings. It was decided not to install tree-guards, mainly to avoid harbouring snails and leaf-munching insects.

Understanding Aphids

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, sap sucking insects which belong to the order Hemiptera. Let's examine some unique biological features about aphids to better understand why they are so difficult to control.

- Host plant range: Many species of aphids can feed on a wide range of host plants, which makes it difficult to control infestations in mixed plantings. These aphids are referred to as 'polyphagous' and includes the green peach aphid which feeds on a wide range of crops including vegetables, fruit trees, and ornamental plants.
- Rapid reproduction: Aphids can reproduce asexually through a process called parthenogenesis, where females give birth to live young without mating with a male. This allows aphid populations to grow rapidly under favourable conditions, and some species produce 20+ generations a season.
- Developmental plasticity & dispersal: Aphids can produce alates (winged aphids) in response to changes in environmental conditions. A drop in food quality, overcrowding or increased

predation pressure can alter their development and produce winged individuals to aid in aphid dispersal.

- Ant mutualism: Some species of aphids have a
 mutualistic relationship with ants, which can
 protect them from predators and parasitoids.
 This can make it difficult to control aphid
 populations without also addressing the ant
 presence.
- Insecticide resistance: Some aphid populations have developed resistance to commonly used insecticides, which can make control even more challenging.

Understanding these factors can help you develop effective strategies for managing aphids. This may include cultural practices like removing infested plants, biological control methods like introducing natural predators or parasitoids, and careful use of insecticides that are effective against the specific aphid species present.

If you don't recognise the aphid you are trying to control, please report it.




