The Pelican Post

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Augusta & Districts Community Childcare Inc. (A&DCCI) and the Member for Warren-Blackwood, Jane Kelsbie, have secured a massive childcare win for families in and around Augusta.

A&DCCI has been working alongside Ms. Kelsbie to secure a facility and additional funding after the Shire of Augusta-Margaret River-owned Recreation Centre was taken off the table as a venue for the service.

Following several months of advocacy by A&DCCI and Ms. Kelsbie, the McGowan Government has announced on 17th April a long-term lease of a vacant State-owned building and additional funding of \$250,000 for A&DCCI to transform the building into a fit-for-purpose childcare facility. A total of \$350,000.

From a project which began in 2019 with identifying a need for childcare places in Augusta, to the formation of Augusta & Districts Community Childcare Inc. in 2020, through the opening of our Leeuwin Kids holiday program for 4-12 year olds in December 2021, and through many hours of letter-writing, meetings, lobbying, planning and fundraising, we are now full steam ahead on a childcare centre on Hillview Road, Augusta! A&DCCI will renovate and landscape this property to meet childcare regulations and create a beautiful learning space for children. The state government's significant funding and pledge of a lease in our name has enabled this vision to come true.

A quote from the board of A&DCCI: "The significance of this announcement can't be underestimated. This is more than a service for working parents and the local economy, as important as that is. This is a project that will provide learning opportunities and community connections to Augusta's littlest residents. So much is said about the importance of a child's first 1000 days in shaping their future outcomes in health, education and social skills. Children living in rural postcodes deserve equal access to early learning. We want to see our Little Leeuwins thrive during their early years, in preparation for a strong start to school, and to support young families on their parenting journeys."



A Message from the Shire President

The Augusta community has been buzzing with activity and I am delighted to have joined the many recent events in this very special part of our Shire.

It was my first time attending the commemoration of the HMS Nizam Tragedy. This poignant event commemorates the deaths of 10 sailors from the N Class Destroyer 'Nizam', which was hit by a king wave while rounding Leeuwin Cape on 11 February 1945.

The lighthouse was 'dressed to impress' by the Lions Club of Leeuwin and the many attendees enjoyed a beautiful event officiated by Chaplain Barrie Yesberg PCHA RAN (Ret'd). Amongst the guests were Captain Gary Lawton, Commanding Officer from HMAS Stirling and the navy band.

The Augusta River Festival was huge! This eco-friendly event had something for everyone and was the perfect day for a festival. I was particularly excited to see a river race, meet special guest Tex Perkins who provided a world class show, and chat on stage with Pam Winter from 2OceansFM.

Councillors joined the festival crowds, alongside many excited locals and visitors. We are just in awe of the efforts of the dedicated volunteer committee, who with the support from the Augusta Abalone Football Club and the Youth Advisory Council, made this event so successful for another year. Thank you for your ongoing contributions to our community, they are invaluable.

A fun time was had by all groovers at the Dr. fish concert organised by Augusta Presents. The event attracted a full house and the Augusta Pub rocked on despite weather driving the party indoors. We boogied all night long and enjoyed the huge repertoire of soul, blues and roots music of Howling Onshore and Dr. Fish - I had the time of my life!

I was thrilled with a last minute decision to stay overnight in Augusta, waking up with a beautiful view of the Blackwood River on Sunday morning, followed by great coffee and cake at Two Seas Collective amongst Augusta community members.

Council continues their efforts to keep in touch with the Augusta community. Community members will have a chance to meet and chat informally with two Councillors at our 'Cuppa with a Councillor' sessions held at the Deckchair Café on May 17. Share your questions, suggestions and ideas with us over a hot drink. Last month, I had a coffee at the Deckchair Café with Nick Belyea, who having just finished his post as Chair of the South West Development Commission, is now spending much more time in Augusta. We have since met with other members of the stakeholders group, alongside the Shire's Executive Leadership Team.

If you missed the last Council Meeting in Tallinup on March 8, we talked about all things Augusta to keep the local community abreast of planned works. So far, the following have been completed/commenced:

- Flinders Bay to Cape Leeuwin path preferred alignment of trail from Dead Finish to Cape Leeuwin has been identified and the consultant is currently preparing a plan and cost estimate
- Tennis/Croquet Club internal wall removal & concertina door installation
- Albany Terrace reseal ocean section
- Blackwood Ave footpath & kerb upgrade (Augusta bakery) - proposed alignment of path is being negotiated with the owners of the bakery site
- Blackwood Ave formalise car parking outside bakery same as above
- · Leeuwin Rd seal and line marking
- Augusta Aerodrome upgrades
- · East Augusta Jetty refurbishment
- · Ellis Street Jetty renewal works & the Augusta foreshore walls renewal works

As always, walking softly on Boodja and working together for our community.

Shire Adopts New Cat Local Law 2023:

A new Cat Local Law for the Shire came into effect on April 7 to help protect our local environment and keep domestic cats safe. The law seeks to promote responsible cat ownership and will include three major changes for the community.

- Control of cats creating nuisance (in public and other spaces)
- · Cat prohibited areas in the Shire
- Modified penalties imposed for non-compliance

For many community members, cats are much loved household companions. This is not about banning cats - it's about making sure they are kept safely on your property to avoid detrimental impact to your pet, neighbouring properties and native wildlife.

There are 45 areas in the Shire where cats are prohibited absolutely. You can view all Cat Prohibited Areas online via our interactive map: http://bit.ly/3m5Fv9d

In the beginning...

James Woodward Turner, a builder and surveyor in London, made the momentous decision at the age of 50 to move his family to the new Swan River Colony in Western Australia.

In October 1829 they sailed from Portsmouth on the Warrior – Turner, his wife Maria and seven of their children (one daughter, Sarah, appears to have stayed in England and joined the family later in 1837) along with 21 servants and labourers and their families. A total of 30. They arrived at the colony in March 1830 after a journey of over 4 months!! At Fremantle they erected a temporary home on the north bank of the Swan River while decisions were made regarding land grants. As you can imagine, he was not happy when informed no land was being granted around the colony but after discussions with Lieutenant Governor Stirling and others, he joined a group to venture south to what is now known as Augusta.

Arriving on the Emily Taylor on 2nd May 1830 Turner came very well prepared (including a house in pieces -

On 2nd May 1830, the first white settlers arrived in Augusta aboard the "Emily Taylor". This was under the command of Captain

James McDermott. The ship carried families and servants from three established groups – the Bussells, Molloys and Turners - and also settlers John Dawson, Richard Dawson, John Herring, John Kellam (surveyor) and soldiers. Captain Stirling also accompanied the settlers and decided on the mouth of the river for the site of the new settlement.



This year, volunteers of the Augusta Historical Society and Museum will attend a **Commemorative Dinner** at the Augusta Hotel, to celebrate 193 years since the landing of the European settlers in Augusta, and have

invited Dr Nonja Peters, The Heritage the Netherlands and Australia Share 1606-2023, to speak on the night.

he eventually erected a substantial two storey house). However, there were many problems to be faced which included inexperience, unfamiliarity with the local conditions - in particular our hardwoods, failure of the Government to maintain shipping and supplies and unforeseen labour troubles. The lack of shipping increased the settlement's isolation as well as difficulty with supplies reaching them and exporting their produce.

James Turner eventually left the area in 1849 (dismantling his home and taking it with him), perhaps being the longest of the first settlers to remain. With the various highs and lows the community has managed to survive and grow, due in part to Turner and others like him and we can now commemorate 193 years in the life of Augusta.

Our Commemoration Dinner will be held at the Augusta Hotel on 2nd May and the next meeting will be held Thursday 18th May 7pm in the Historical Society Meeting Rooms. We then have a three-month break before recommencing with our AGM in September. Hope to see you there.

Dr Peters, PhD (Anthropology UWA), is a Western Australian historian, anthropologist, museum curator and social researcher who was born to Dutch immigrants and was educated in Northam WA. In March 1622, Dutch sailors sighted the south western tip of Australia and named it 'Landt van de Leeuwin' meaning the land of the lioness.






After a few weeks off from

competitive sailing in Augusta, the 20th of March turned into a beaut day to get back into it. The monohulls had a club championship heat, four boats all vying for some points. The race started with Warrigal winning the start, but by the first crossing Pigs Might Fly had the slenderest of leads. She held this lead almost to the bottom mark where Warrigal pinched it back from her. Big Red Dwarf and Anitra were also at it about 200 meters behind. At one lap to go, Warrigal had the lead but, Pigs Fight Fly was able to slowly but surely catch her and then out of the blue, Warrigal just left her for dead. It quickly became apparent on board Pigs Might Fly that they had hooked up with something, weed or perhaps a crab pot that wouldn't be dislodged easily, so the decision was made to soldier on. Big Red Dwarf and Anitra seized on the opportunity and at the top mark had Pigs Might Fly in their cross hairs. The positions were unchanged to the last mark up in West Bay, Warrigal got the gun, Pigs Might Fly was sailing like a pig, Big Red Dwarf was pointing like a demon and closing in on the line, Anitra just behind her. All Pigs Might Fly could do was tack onto port and get to the line first. She got there with a couple of seconds to spare. Lucky for her and the crew, the "good olde AYC protest rules," were adhered to, allowing her to be second over the line. In the end when the vardsticks were applied it didn't matter, Warrigal first, Big Red Dwarf second and third was Anitra. It was a really good time out there on the water.

2/4/23: Another monohull championship day and the powers that be decided on two shortened races in the one-day. There was a great turn out, four RL24'S, two Satus19's and Redback. The breeze was southeast at 10 to 12kns. Pigs Might Fly won the start, Redback close by. By the first mark Redback was metres in front and they had a comfortable lead on the rest of the fleet. One lap later, the breeze had dropped but the positions hadn't changed. The whole field was tightening up. In the end it was Redback first, Pigs Might Fly second and Big Red Dwarf third in front of Warrigal, Seabird, Anitra and F Troop. After a short break it was back at it, the breeze had strengthened to 15kns and it was pretty much the same two out in front, this time Pigs Might Fly rounded the first mark in front, Redback and Warrigal in hot pursuit. CONVERSATIONS: LEEUWIN CURRENT

Dr Lynnath Beckley, rockstar Marine Scientist from Murdoch University wowed the sell-out crowd with a fascinating overview of the Leeuwin Current, as the inaugural speaker at the official launch of our new series of events, Conversations: Taalinup Augusta.



The scene was set for the Go with the Flow talk by explaining that the large differences in the climate, biodiversity and fisheries between the west coasts of Australia and South Africa are largely caused by contrasting ocean currents.

After revealing that the Leeuwin Current was only scientifically described in 1980, the sources and trajectory of this anomalous warm, southward flowing current were explained. Its biological oceanography including distribution of fish larvae and other zooplankton were described and the 'secret life' of rock lobsters was divulged, namely, their many months in the plankton when their phyllosoma larvae are largely at the mercy of the Leeuwin Current and its many eddies.

The talk concluded with information about modern ocean forecasting and how interested people can get marine information through the national Integrated Marine Observing System (www.imos.org.au).

We look forward to bringing more interesting speakers out of the local woodwork and beyond, so keep an eye out for the next one in June.



Backyard Buddies

Prohibited aquatic plants

Fret over these floaters

Keep your eyes peeled for aquatic plants such as Salvinia and water hyacinth – two highly invasive weeds that we need to report and eradicate from Western Australia. They have the ability to negatively impact our local ecosystems by outcompeting local species and reducing water quality.

The costs and efforts taken to remove these aquatic plants once they enter our environment are massive. They can impede water flow, increase flooding and erosion, block agricultural irrigation channels, create health hazards and displace natural vegetation. Some aquatic plants can even form thick mats to resemble groundcover, creating drowning hazards for people and livestock.

Salvinia, (*Salvinia molesta*), is a non-flowering, free-floating aquatic weed that has pairs of oval leaves connected by a horizontal stem. They have a multitude of hair-like structures on top of the leaves which split and re-join at the tips to form eggbeater like structures helping them to be buoyant. They produce vegetatively - meaning that even small stems that break apart can form entirely new plants.

Water hyacinth, (*Eichhornia crassipes*), is a notorious floating weed with large funnel-shaped lilac flowers that have 6 petals and a yellow centre.

These flower summer to early autumn. The leaves are hairless, glossy and have a spongey base that helps them to float. This weed can double in size in just two weeks via flower pollination, or vegetatively. They have submerged fruits that can carry up to 300 seeds each, and these 1 mm seeds can be viable for up to 20 years!

Don't get caught out!

These plants are sometimes advertised on platforms like Facebook Marketplace, Gumtree or other channels, but they're illegal to have in WA. Salvinia and water hyacinth are prohibited species under the *Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007* and cannot be sold, traded or cultivated. This also applies to several other aquatic plants including *Rotala rotundifolia*, water lettuce (*Pistia stratoites*) and Sagittaria (*Sagittaria platyphylla*).

You can be a responsible gardener and report any suspect illegal plant sales, or the presence of these declared weeds in the environment. Reporting options include the Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), the MyPestGuide[®] Reporter app or webpage, or you can anonymously report an illegal agricultural matter on <u>crimestopperswa.com.au</u> or phone 1800 333 000. If you're unsure about the plant, report it anyway.



Lower Blackwood Catchment LCDC Community Update April 2023

Feral Pig Focus – Protecting the Scott River Coastal Plain



Last season we **removed 439 feral pigs** from the Scott Coastal Plain, and we're **already up to 74 in season 2** (season 2 runs from January to July 2023). The aim of the project is to remove the pigs causing damage to local properties and also build capacity in Lower Blackwood landholders to monitor and control feral pigs on their own property. But the project is about more than trapping - pig activity transects and camera trapping give us a more comprehensive view of the activity around the catchment.

This monitoring has also revealed the extent of other feral creatures roaming the Scott Coastal Plain. Significant numbers of feral cats and foxes have been captured on monitoring cameras across the project area.

Pig tracks can be confused with those of sheep, goats or cattle of a similar size, but in softer mud tracks can be distinguished by the presence of dew claws.

When is a Wattle not a Wattle?

The Cape Leeuwin Wattle (Paraserianthes lophantha subspecies lophantha) is not actually a member of the Acacia family – it also goes by the name of Plume Albizia and unfortunately it has become become a naturalised weed here, in South Australia, Victoria and NSW, as well as NZ, South Africa and other countries. (Source: Weeds Australia)

If you are keen to learn more about controlling these and other Weed Wattles? Stay tuned - we have a workshop coming up in August!

Through our **State NRM funded 'Weedwork -Declared Weed Control Support in the Lower Blackwood'** Project we are able to offer landholders the opportunity for a 50% contribution towards control of weedy wattles with a special call out to Scott River landholders - we have quarantined some funding to assist you to get on top of this pretty problem .






