New National Standards for Food Businesses

New national food safety standards have been introduced across Australia to reduce the rate of foodborne illnesses linked to poor handling of food in certain food service, retail and catering food businesses.

The standard introduces three food safety management tools for businesses that handle unpackaged, potentially hazardous, ready-to-eat foods. These tools include:

- Food handler training or demonstrate skills and knowledge in safe food handling practices
- Appoint a qualified food safety supervisor
- Show that your food is safe
- Businesses must implement the new requirements by 8 December 2023.

A very special thank you to our lovely host Pauline McLeod and the Margaret River Bookshop for the sponsoring of the Singapore Slings and Emergency Chocolates.



Hippos - Introduction to Biomimicry By JAY HARMAN

Most of us sunning by the pool or on the beach probably aren't thinking about a hippopotamus, let alone its perspiration. However, it turns out that hippo sweat provides a highly effective, four-in-one sunblock. We humans perspire by allowing salt water to leave our pores, using the physics of evaporation to cool the skin. Hippos-long-lost cousins of whales and dolphinssolve more than just a cooling problem by secreting a blend of chemicals that takes care of many challenges simultaneously. Besides being an excellent, nontoxic sunscreen (though perhaps a little aromatic in its natural form), hippo sweat is also antiseptic, insect repelling, and antifungal.

Researchers at international universities have studied the rust-colored combination of mucus and chemicals secreted by hippos. They found two pigments that absorb light across the ultraviolet-visible range, with crystalline structures that ensure the material spreads over the entire skin without the need for being rubbed on by hand (a challenge for a hippo). The pigments turn white skin a shade darker, while simultaneously slowing the rate of bacteria growth.

Two out of three Aussies will develop skin cancer in their lifetimes. In fact, there are more skin cancers diagnosed than all other cancers combined. With one million Americans developing skin cancers each year, the market for sunscreen is substantial-\$640 million a year and growing. Yet of the more than eighteen hundred products containing sunscreen on the market today, three out of four have been shown not to live up to their claims. In addition, most chemicals applied to the skin can be absorbed straight into the bloodstream. so some scientists are concerned that certain sunscreens may prevent sunburn but introduce toxins that can still cause cancer. In fact, the US federal government recently responded to concerns about product efficacy by tightening the rules for sunscreen labels.

Of course, few bathing beauties would find delight in smelling like a hippo's armpit, so there's the exciting opportunity to synthesize the sweat's beneficial properties, having it smell more like, say, coconuts. Longer term, scientists anticipate applying the hippo's chemistry to exterior paints, clothing, and other UVsensitive products.

Whether finding inspiration from hippos to reduce skin cancer or developing better road systems by studying the tracks made by slime molds seeking food, biomimicry, or bio-inspiration as some call it, very simply means applying lessons learned from nature to solve human problems. Examples of biomimicry include everything from energy-producing solar cells

that mimic tree leaves to lifesaving pharmaceutical breakthroughs based on the biology of lizards to antibacterial paints that emulate sharkskin to highly profitable businesses that improve their organizational structures based on redwood groves. Even the Velcro we undoubtedly have somewhere in our closets is a prime example of biomimicry in action.

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.

Whale Watch WA

Augusta is a beautiful coastal town located in Australia's South West region and has a rich history intertwined with the migration of whales. Cape Leeuwin is a pivot point for the northern Humpback Whale migration as it is the most south westerly point of Australia. The sighting grounds are within Flinders Bay as the whales hug the coastline on their journey north providing the ideal location for whale watching in sheltered and protected waters.

The bay welcomes the largest Humpback Whale migration on the planet as over 45,000 Humpbacks migrate past the coastline during late May to late August. Flinders Bay is also a nursery ground for the endangered Southern Right Whale as mothers come to raise the next generation each year and use the protection of the coastline as a safety blanket for their growing calves. Bottlenose Dolphins and Common Dolphins are often sighted feeding in the bay with regular sightings of Albatross, Shearwaters and Gannets accompanying them on their feeding adventures.







Our family own and operate daily tours from the beautiful Augusta Boat Harbour during May to August each year as we celebrate the arrival of the whales each season. 

Garden Gossip

At this time of year, it is all about taking stock of what did and what

didn't provide us with inspiration (and work!) in our gardens in the previous seasons. The best thing I can do for my garden is to visit others, and this month saw the Augusta Gardening Club exploring Margaret River's A Maze'N gardens and maze ...



Set in five hectares of landscaped botanical gardens with unusual and rare Western Australian plants and deciduous trees, the whole place is a wonderful habitat for bees, butterflies. native birds, and wildlife. The large manicured Cypress maze, planted 29

years ago, is an imposing sight, towering over the pristine gardens.

Meandering along, at every twist and turn there is something new and exciting to see! Before entering the coffee shop, there is a Buckinghamia silky-oak which is stunning: the flowers are very similar to Grevillea, but with larger toothbrush-shaped flowers (both are members of the protea family).



On the other side of the coffee shop there is a multitude of different flower beds which contain roses, camellias, protea, banksia, and natives, along with smaller mazes to walk around.

These gardens are well worth a visit - in fact

they're a-MAZE-ing ...! (Sorry I couldn't resist.) They provide endless amounts of ideas and inspiration at any time of year. My head is bursting with potential additions and updates to my own garden!



Vi Douglas's gardening tip for June: Well, the colder months are finally upon us and now is the time to get all those winter vegetables growing in your vegie garden. Molasses spray is the best organic option to counter those pesky caterpillars that chew though the broccoli and cabbage leaves!

To make it, dissolve one tablespoon of molasses with a teaspoon of dishwashing liquid. Spray top and underside of leaves and repeat after rain or overhead watering. Molasses can be easily purchased from a supermarket.

The past month has seen a variety of activities undertaken by the Augusta

At the 'Have a Go Day' organised by the Augusta Community Development Association , whilst we had outstanding weather we had a few new comers for a row and we saw our own crews sneak out to practise their surfing capabilities whilst another crew went exploring up the Dead Water.

The Molloy Island Big Morning Tea row was well patronised with positions on both skiffs being keenly sought after – filled within hours of the Booking Sheet being posted. Singing, bird watching, fellowship and the big morning tea were all part of the row.

There is some interest being shown for a skiff build in Dunsborough – very early days and will continue to monitor the situation and at some point we will take the skiffs for a row on Geographe Bay.



Lower Blackwood Catchment LCDC **Community Update May 2023**

Watch out – pigs are about!



Sadly, these aren't just three little piggies, but it seems that the recent germination has brought out the big boys in search of the fresh shoots. This is a great time to spot feral pig damage as their hoof prints should be quite visible in the soft ground, but they are also causing significant damage to emerging plants as they forage for fresh greens.

The Scott River rains have fallen hard over the last week or so, and as well as boosting pastures it's also having an impact on our trapping efforts. The top photo shows some trapped pigs – but the photo below shows the same trap two weeks later – totally submerged.

Local landholders are extremely helpful and vital to the success of the project. We rely on your ongoing information and support as you help us to ensure that pig sightings and damage are recorded to identify hotspot areas where the field officers can focus their work. This approach has been enormously successful with the trapping numbers escalating already.

This Feral Pig Focus - Protecting the Scott Coastal Plain 2022 -2025 project is supported through funding from the State Natural Resource Management Program, the Shire of Nannup, and Peppermint Estate Pty Ltd., and is delivered through a continuing partnership with the Lower Blackwood LCDC, and the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group.

Splitting the difference

Larvae in firewood

During the winter period where firewood is often collected and split, our service receives a common enquiry: "I've chopped some wood and found these grubs! Are these borers? Is this the European house borer? Is my house at risk???

The first question we ask to split European house borer (EHB) from many other wood borers is: "What wood are you cutting? Is it pine?" If the answer is no, it's not going to be EHB.

EHB larvae will only reproduce in seasoned (dry) coniferous timber and wood, including pine, fir and spruce. Of these, pine trees (*Pinus* species) and pine timbers are abundant in WA.

What if the answer was yes? - If you notice larvae or borer emergence holes in dead pine branches, logs, or untreated pine pallets or timbers, please report this. EHB has the potential to cause major structural damage to buildings constructed with untreated pine timber. Infested wood stored in or around the home is worth investigating.

Who's on the chopping block?

Most firewood burnt in WA is from native hardwood species and pictured in this article are the larvae of native longicorn beetles (Phoracantha species) in jarrah. These beetles

attack live or recently dead/felled Eucalypt trees and do not pose a risk to the timbers in your home.

If you have been chopping firewood for years but are only starting to see these borers, it's likely the trees the firewood has come from, were stressed or recently felled. Trees stressed by drought or disease are particularly susceptible to borer attack.

Reporting

We can't all be insect identification specialists, but that doesn't matter. If something isn't familiar to you, it's best to report it rather than ignore it. When reporting, please include as much information

as possible about what's occurring. Collect and hold onto any insect samples, and if taking photos, include things like a ruler or a pen so the dimensions of insects, holes or other symptoms can be gauged.

If borers are coming out of furniture, timber, or wooden products like bowls, chopping boards or ornaments - report it as soon as possible and we will provide guidance from there.




