



FIREBREAK NOTICE 2023-2024

BUSH FIRES ACT 1954

The following Notice is hereby given to all owners and/or occupiers of land within the Shire of Augusta Margaret River.

PURSUANT to the powers contained in Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, you are hereby required and therefore ordered by the local government to carry out fire prevention work in accordance with the requirements of this Notice, on or before 30 November 2023, and maintain the requirements up to and including 12 May 2024, except for APZs which must be maintained all year round.

Inspections, appointments, education, and compliance

Owners and occupiers who would like an early inspection by appointment, for reasons including biosecurity, locked gates, and dangerous animals, or for an explanation on the requirements of this Notice, should contact Rangers as soon as possible and by no later than 1 November 2023. Where inspections by appointment are not requested, Rangers are appointed as Bush Fire Control Officers with the power to enter land under the Bush Fires Act 1954 and will be inspecting properties for compliance without further notice from 1 December 2023.

People who do not comply with this Notice or a Variation to this Notice may be issued with an infringement Notice (\$250) or prosecuted with a penalty up to \$5,000. The Shire of Augusta Margaret River may carry out the required work on the land at the cost of the owner/occupier.

Requirements of landowners and occupiers:

- All landowners/occupiers must comply with the requirements in Part A of this Notice. 1.
- Owners/occupiers of Residential lots 4000m² and under must comply with the requirements of Part A and Part B. 2.
- 3. Owners/occupiers of Residential and Rural/Residential lots 4001m² and over must comply with the requirements of Part A and Part C.
- 4. Owners/occupiers of Rural lots (excluding Plantations, Vineyards, Orchards, and Olive Groves) must comply with the requirements of Part A and Part D.
- 5. Owners/occupiers of Plantations, Vineyards, Orchards, and Olive Groves must comply with the requirements of Part A and Part E or F depending upon the land use.

Definitions of terms referred to in Parts A. B. C. D. E and F of this Notice

Asset Protection Zone (APZ) means an area of land within 20 metres from the external walls of any habitable building. Bushfire Management Plan (BMP) means a plan prepared specifically for a property in satisfaction of a development approval or subdivision condition.

Driveway/Access Way means the access route from a road reserve to a habitable building.

Firebreak means an area of land that has been cleared of all trees, bushes, grasses, and any other object or thing which may be flammable, leaving a bare surface to a width specified under the requirements in Parts A, B, C or D with a 4 metre high vertical clearance.

Trafficable means a firm, stable surface capable of allowing a 4WD fire appliance to enter, exit and turn any corner (10 metre radius) without reversing.

Variation means an individual property-specific Firebreak Notice served by the Shire on an owner under s33(2) of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

Clearing permits and exemptions

Property owners that clear vegetation in compliance with this Notice will be exempt from the requirement to seek approvals or permits. Owners should attempt to minimise environmental impacts as much as possible and should contact the Shire if they believe that clearing beyond the requirements in this Notice are necessary to reduce fire risks or if they are aware of any protected flora or fauna. Owners who clear beyond the requirements in this Notice without approval may be subject to prosecution.

Variations to the requirements of this Notice

Where compliance with the Notice is not practical due to environmental considerations or site-specific constraints such as topography, water course or steep gradients, owners may apply to the Shire of Augusta Margaret River for a Variation to the Notice. Variations must provide an alternative means of meeting the objectives of the Notice, including bushfire risk mitigation and property access, considering site-specific constraints and advantages and not all properties will be able to accommodate Variations. Applications must be completed on the approved form, which is available upon request or can be downloaded via the Shire's website. Applications for a Variation have a \$30 fee unless they are submitted before **1 November 2023** in which case, they are processed free of charge.

Part A - Requirements applying to all properties in the district of Augusta Margaret River:

- 1. <u>Asset Protection Zone (APZ)</u> The fuel loading (flammable material) in the APZ is to be reduced and maintained to less than 2 tonnes per hectare. Trees must not be closer than 2 metres to a building, and trees must not overhang a building within 4 metres of the external roof. APZ requirements apply to all properties (excluding Vacant lots), regardless of size, and must be maintained all year round. (Note: There are numerous online resources to assist in identifying excessive fuel loading and ideal APZ standards, Rangers can also visit outside of inspection periods to provide property-specific advice.)
- 2. Bushfire Management Plan (BMP) - properties subject to an approved BMP must comply with the requirements of their BMP in addition to the requirements of this Notice. (Note: At the discretion of the Shire, Variations may be issued that exempt some owners from compliance with requirements in this Notice where they are meeting alternate methods and requirements for compliance in an approved Bushfire Management Plan.)
- 3. Driveway/Access Way - any property with a habitable building must have a driveway/access way that is a minimum of 4 metres wide up to a maximum of 6 metres wide with a minimum 4 metre vertical clearance and a turnaround area to allow emergency vehicles to access buildings on a property and exit. There must be no encroachment into the driveway by any vegetation (living or dead) or any other object, this includes gates, which if installed, must open the entire trafficable width of the driveway.
- 4. Firebreak - 2 metre wide firebreaks are required around all piles of garden refuse and/or wood stacks, fuel and fodder.
- Gutters and Rooftops to be kept free of excessive twigs, leaves, and plant material. 5.

Part B - Additional requirements applying to Vacant lots 4000m² and under:

1. Vacant cleared land - grasses maintained by means of slashing/mowing/grazing to less than 10cm in height. Slashed/mowed grasses are to be removed from the lot.

Part C - Additional requirements applying to Residential/Rural Residential lots 4001m² and over:

- Firebreak 3 metre wide trafficable firebreaks must be maintained within 10 metres of all boundaries. 1.
- 2. Vacant cleared land - grasses maintained by means of slashing/mowing/grazing to less than 10cm in height.

Part D - Additional requirements applying to Rural lots (excluding Plantations, Vineyards, Orchards, and Olive Groves):

- 1. Firebreak - 3 metre wide trafficable firebreak must be maintained within 100 metres of a boundary that abuts a road reserve. Where land is actively grazed or maintained to less than 10cm, the firebreak within 100 metres of a boundary that abuts a road reserve may be reduced to 2 metres.
- 2. Grasses to be maintained slashed/mowed/grazed to less than 10cm in height.

Part E - Additional requirements applying to Plantations:

- 1. Firebreak 10 metre wide mineral earth firebreak around each cell or block. 3 metres must be trafficable.
- 2. Grasses to be maintained slashed/mowed/grazed to less than 10cm in height.

Part F - Additional requirements applying to Vineyards, Orchards, and Olive Groves:

- 1. Firebreak 5 metre wide mineral earth firebreak around each cell or block. 3 metres must be trafficable.
- Grasses to be maintained slashed/mowed/grazed to less than 10cm in height. 2

Check your mailboxes for election packages (ballots) for this year's local government election. Completed ballot papers can be returned in person or via post and must be received by 6pm on Saturday 21 October.

Early voting

October 2023

You can submit your vote as soon as you receive your voting pack through the following options:

1.Return via mail using the reply-paid envelope

If you plan to post your vote, please allow enough time for it to be received before election day.

2.In person at a Shire office

- Augusta Shire Office during opening hours. The Augusta office will also be open the day before Elections on Friday 20 October from 9am-12pm,1pm- 4pm.
- Margaret River Shire Office during opening hours (Monday-Friday, 9am-4pm)



Voting on the day

On election day, Saturday 21 October, you can submit your completed ballot papers at the Margaret River Shire Offices at 41 Wallcliffe Road only, between 8am-6pm.

Optional Preferential Voting

The 2023 local government elections will use 'Optional Preferential Voting' similar to the way voting is done in State or Federal elections.


CAMP QUOKKA



Bioluminescence - Introduction to Biomimicry By JAY HARMAN

It was November 1985 and a pitch-black, steamy night in the Java Sea. En route to Singapore from Australia, our 15-metre sailboat should have been lit up by at least the tricolor navigation light at the top of her mast. Instead, the night before we had been hit by lightning, which shorted out the boat's electrical systems. There was no wind, so the main engine was propelling us and I had rigged a small flashlight, covered with red cellophane, to the compass allowing us to see and navigate. About midnight, I looked behind us and was enraptured by a broad trail of exquisite sparkling lights stretching back a kilometer or two from the stern of the boat. Millions of fluorescing organisms had been scintillated by the turbulent rotations, or cavitation, of our propeller. It looked like a scene from a Peter Pan fantasy - one of the most beautiful and grand sights I have ever seen.

Bioluminescence means "living light" and that's exactly what it is. While specific mechanisms differ across the many species that use bioluminescence as part of their survival or mating strategies, it always emits from a living organism and involves the oxidation of an organic molecule. By dramatically agitating the water with our churning propeller, we were, in effect, turning on their chemical lighting systems.

A few minutes later I heard the familiar whoosh of dolphins expelling air as they surfaced. I rushed up the deck to stand on the cathead, a small platform protruding from the bow. When you're standing on it, you feel like you're suspended in the air over the ocean. It's an enthralling experience, especially when dolphins are swimming and breaching through the surface just two metres below your feet.



We were often accompanied by dolphins. As many as forty or fifty in a pod swam with us, in and out of our bow wave, sometimes for fifteen minutes or more. This night, as they leaped out of the water, they trailed cascades of sparkles. As they re-entered the water,

they pulled air and sparkles with them, clearly defining their tracks underwater. I was surprised to observe that after a few seconds below the surface, the dolphins created no more fluorescence until they broke the surface again. As I watched them play, admiring the fact that the dolphins did not disturb the fluorescing organisms, no matter how fast they swam, I began to wonder. Could traditional boat designs and propellers be biomimetically recreated to achieve such efficient motion? Turbulence, or cavitation, is a negative consequence of boat propellers. It results from rotating blades disturbing the water so vigorously that it essentially boils into millions of tiny bubbles of vapor. When the bubbles collapse, a force of as much as twenty thousand pounds of pressure per square inch occurs. (A car tire is typically inflated to just thirty-five pounds per square inch. A can of Coca-Cola has about forty-five pounds of pressure per square inch.) In fact, these explosions are so violent that they tear chunks of metal are torn away from propellers and can eventually destroy them. I've heard of a ship, that, on its maiden voyage from the United States to England, lost blades from its \$100,000 propeller-in just one trip. The bioluminescence I saw that night causes the world's navies considerable angst. Modern stealth technology has made naval ships almost invisible to radar. What they can't control in waters with bioluminescent organisms, however, are the long light-shows trailing their vessels at night that are clearly visible to enemy satellites.

In the years following that sailing trip, my efforts to create a propeller that wouldn't produce the turbulence I had seen scintillating the water in the Java Sea led me to design a whole series of devices that move water, air, and other fluids. I also designed and, with the help of Augusta's own Iain Stephens, built boats modeled on the dolphins' ultra-streamlined shape: the WildThing and XAP.

Nimble and stable, these watercraft have been used in a wide variety of applications, from search and rescue to fishing to diving to racing. Their hull designs copy the way dolphins and other water animals cut drag. The ratios of their pontoons mirror the body shape of dolphins and porpoises. The egg-like, compound curves of the boat hulls make them strong without needing heavy internal support, so they are a fraction of the weight of similar craft. Coupled with streamlined design, this translates into a third less fuel used compared to conventional approaches.

Nature's fastest objects, almost invariably, have flexible or adaptable surfaces, but boats, like most human-made technologies, generally have hard skins of wood, fiberglass, or metal. The XAP design also adapts a particular characteristic of a dolphin's skin. When the animal needs to lower drag to put on a burst of speed, its skin develops goose bumps, somewhat like the dimples in a golf ball. Similarly, the XAP's surface isn't shiny slick, but is instead slightly textured in a biomimetic drag-reducing pattern. Who could have imagined that a dark night on the Java Sea could translate to a boat with goose bumps?

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.



Used plastic milk cartons are perfect when it comes to making covers; all you need is a sharp knife to get started. Turn the carton on its side and cut approximately 2 inches (5cm) off the bottom. Poking a stick carefully through the hole at the top and then pushing the carton into the surrounding soil will help keep your DIY covers in place when it gets windy.

The September long weekend makes the third anniversary of the launching of •

the two St Ayles and since that time a further 5 skiffs have been added to the Western Australia fleet, bringing the total to 11 – Hopefully we'll see a good representation of the fleet at our regatta in January.

There is interest being expressed in adding a 5km race to the regatta, from the Turner Street Jetty to the Yacht Club, starting around 8am (tide dependant), which should have all completing the course by 9am. The short course events could then commence at 10am and still finish by 12:30pm for lunch under the peppies. Watch this space.

The introduction of new regulations relating to boat safety requires unregistered boats greater than 4.8m – which is the classification of all three of our skiffs – to carry life jackets whether on the river or ocean. For ocean rowing added is the requirement for an EPIRB, marine radio and flares or location light. Two St Ayles skiffs are in the process of being fitted out for ocean rowing.

A recent incident highlighted the lack of understanding of inflatable life jackets, and all are encouraged to read and understand how they are to be inflated, in particular in the event of the fitted inflation system failing and how to inflate the jackets manually. The Department of Transport has an excellent brochure on the operation and maintenance of these inflatable life jackets. See their web page:



The area where the Blackwood River turns into Hardy Inlet and runs to Flinders Bay is Talinup, which is named after the Talin or Knob Sedge (Carex inversa), a bush/reed that appears on the estuary shores.

Josh provided a brief overview of local area and traditional lifestyles of the Wadandi people, Aboriginal 6 Seasons and how this influences what is foraged/hunted and eaten, interconnectedness between Aboriginal people, plants, animals and landscape, an artefact and tool display, and finished with an interactive didgeridoo music session.



Don't tip toe through these tulips!

You might have recently noticed these pretty looking flowers when walking through the bush, spotted them growing along roadsides or seen them in paddocks, particularly in the Southwest of the state. Members of the Iridaceae (Iris) family, these lovely looking flowers are actually a serious and widespread weed in Western Australia. They are commonly called the One-leaf and Two-leaf Cape Tulip.

As the name suggests, One-leaf Cape Tulip typically has only one leaf per plant. The flower colour ranges between orange and salmon pink with a yellow centre. It reproduces via both seed and annually renewed corms. The seeds and corms sprout in autumn after rain, with up to 60% of corms potentially staying dormant each year.

Two-leaf Cape Tulip has a similar looking flower but can be distinguished by having two to three leaves per plant. It sprouts in autumn and flowers in spring. However, unlike the one-leaf variety, it doesn't seed, but produces cormils on its stems.

Why control: Both varieties of cape tulip are a serious weed of pastures, roadsides, wastelands, and bushland. In pasture, livestock often selectively graze clovers and other more palatable species, which allows cape tulip to flourish. However if eaten, all parts of cape tulip are toxic to livestock while the plant material exists - whether it is alive, dying or dead. Spraying with herbicides does not remove its toxicity.

When to control: The optimal time for chemical control of both plants is July to September, when they flower, and the corm is exhausted. After this time the plant material will start to dry out, making any kind of chemical difficult for the plant to absorb.

If you have missed the opportunity to control this year, all is not lost. Take note of where you have seen Cape Tulip so you can be prepared and ready to control it for the next season.


