New National Food Safety Standards for Businesses

If you own a food business, now's the time to prepare for the new national standards that will come into effect on 8 December.

The standards will be introduced across Australia to reduce the rate of foodborne illnesses linked to food handling in certain food service, retail and catering food businesses.

You'll need to comply if your business handles unpackaged, potentially hazardous and ready to eat foods.

Augusta-Karridale network upgrade



Residents in Augusta, Karridale and surrounds will benefit from improved power reliability with a comprehensive network upgrade and maintenance program commencing in November. The upgrade will involve replacing approximately 70 poles and 12km of conductor along the main feeder line between Augusta and Karridale, strengthening network resilience against seasonal and environmental impacts and enhancing safety.



Timeframe

The work will be taking place in two stages, with the first completed between 19 November and 22 December, and the second between mid January and February 2024.

Planned outages

It's important to know that we need to schedule power outages to do the work safely. To minimise the impact on the community, we're deploying a temporary large-scale generator to support homes and businesses in the area as we complete these essential works.

Residents of Karridale, Kudardup, Augusta and Molloy Island may receive some short outages, one in the morning and one in the evening (up to 30 minutes) while the generator is connected and disconnected.

Draft Local Planning Scheme Open for Feedback

To ensure our planning rules are current and relevant, the Shire's Draft Local Planning Scheme is open for public feedback.

The Local Planning Scheme is the rule book that guides development across the Shire. The Scheme determines the types of development that require planning approvals and provide the criteria used to assess development proposals ranging from large scale commercial development to residential development.

The Draft Local Planning Scheme aligns with the recently endorsed Local Planning Strategy, reflecting a shared vision for our Shire informed by a high level of community consultation.

The Scheme provides a mechanism to put that vision into effect by creating rules for development.

Consultation for the Draft Scheme will remain open until January 2024 - community members are encouraged to provide their feedback during this time.

A targeted mail out will occur over the coming months to notify key stakeholder groups and those who own properties directly affected by the proposed changes.

Shire staff will also be available to meet residents to provide additional feedback on how the new rules would apply to their properties

Community meetings will occur at townsites across the Shire between October and January.

Natural Burials at Karridale Cemetery

If being close to nature is important or you're eco-conscious, a natural burial may be of interest to you and your family.

This greener way to bury your loved ones has become a popular choice in place of granite monuments at conventional cemeteries.

Natural burials offer the community a unique and sustainable final resting place with minimal disturbance to the natural bushland environment. The body is returned to nature in a biodegradable coffin made from natural fibres

Natural burial sites are located to the left of the entrance in the southeast corner of Karridale Cemetery. This unique pocket of bushland will become progressively vegetated with natural plant species as plots are utilised, encouraging revegetation and birds and fauna to visit.

Locals Urged to Do Better at **Poole Road Transfer Station**

The Poole Road Transfer Station is being regularly misused, with users leaving furniture and other items that cannot be disposed of at this location. Waste Transfer Stations allow rural residents who do not have a kerbside collection service, the opportunity to dispose of their household waste and recyclables that would otherwise be collected in the red and yellow lidded bins.

Transfer Stations cannot accept bulk waste such as furniture, building waste, fencing wire, waste oil and batteries, all which should be taken to the Davis Road Waste Management and Recycling Facility.

Users of the Poole Road Transfer Station are asked to check their load before leaving - if it couldn't go in a kerbside bin, it can't go to the Transfer Station. Please take building waste, fencing wire, waste oil and batteries to the Davis Road Waste Management and Recycling Facility which is open 7 days a week from 8am to 4pm (except Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Good Friday).

As a community facility with access for local residents only, community ownership is important. Please report offenders directly to the Shire's Waste Services team by email to waste@amrshire.wa.gov.au or call 08 9780 5677.

Local native plants are the essence of our region's beauty and biodiversity.

Plant them in your garden to maintain our unique sense of place, save water, minimise the risk of introducing garden escapees and enjoy the natural wonder of native wildflowers.

During September and October our work focussed on clean up along the river walk and duck pond near Ellis Street Jetty, along Redman Brook and around Flinders. After a quiet period in the Community Nursery following several weeks of planting at Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse, numerous localities around Flinders, the duckpond and in front of Turner Caravan Park, the nursery has recommenced generating new seedlings and cuttings for 2024. Several new volunteers have joined, which makes for highly productive work.



Polygala myrtifolia (left) is a garden escapee we wish to highlight this month for everyone's attention – whether in vour garden, along a verge and/ or taking over nearby bushland. A medium, shallow-rooted shrub <2.5m with light green, elliptical leaves about 1.5cm long, polygala has clusters of pea-like magenta and white flowers for much of the year followed by circular fruit capsules.

Polygala originates from South Africa and is a serious weed throughout Australia. While the seed is short lived, it reproduces at a startling rate and generates a myriad of seedlings, which eventually choke the native bush and gardens. Polygala also rapidly forms thickets in disturbed sites.

Around Augusta polygala establishes itself in neglected gardens of holiday homes, along verges, on steep embankments and beside roads or tracks bordering bushland. All residents are encouraged to remove this weed from their properties and adjoining verge. The Shire of Augusta-Margaret River strongly supports Land Care activities, especially the removal of troublesome weeds.

Alternatives to plant in the Augusta area include Hibbertia cuneiformis or Yellow buttercup and Spyridium globulosum (Basket bush). With removal of polygala from roadsides and bushland, Leucopogon parviflorus (Coast beard heath) may easily reappear with the help of birds.

INVETERATE INVERTEBRATES - Introduction to Biomimicry By JAY HARMAN

Ever wonder about those dark-coloured blobs that wash up and rot on the beaches of Flinders Bay?

Some classes of mollusc do just fine without a shell. Nudibranchs, a remarkable and shell-less subset of the molluscs, have highly evolved methods of communication and protection that offer surprising opportunities for bio-inspired design. The three thousand or so species include the above amorphouslooking sea hares and other varieties that are the most colourful creatures on earth (or rather, in the sea). They're exquisite in decoration with a huge variety of forms. One species, called the Spanish dancer, sports beautiful scarlet and white ruffles that look just like a dancer's flounced dress. This shell-less sea slug twists and gyrates its entire body in a choreography of movement that propels it along.

Scientists have discovered that these molluscs are a veritable chemistry lab, storing and recycling what they eat to great advantage. Their brilliant colouration and toxicity to predators results from reusing chemicals in their food. In particular, nudibranchs have a penchant for snacking on stinging sea anemones. While it was originally thought that a layer of mucus protected them from getting stung, researchers instead discovered that nudibranchs have evolved a storehouse of different chemicals-specific to each type of anemone-that neutralise the prey's poison. Nudibranchs go one step further and absorb those toxins so that they can be reused in self-defence! Unfortunately, this makes them especially toxic to dogs that find them washed up.

Anaesthetists are interested in better understanding the chemical mechanisms underlying this strategy so they can improve pain control in patients. To humans, nudibranchs can smell like "lemons, watermelon, vanilla, or flowers." Researchers are identifying the chemicals that trigger those smells, as well as the chemical messages about danger, mating, or food that their slime trails leave hanging in the water. These signals are laid down in a mucus that stays put even under water and act as instant messages and invitations to the next passing nudibranch—sort of like slime mail. Potential biomimetic applications include the inhibition of unwanted chemical signals given off by medical and industrial chemical processes.

One thing I am particularly struck by is the apparent intelligence of what are usually considered dumb animals. For instance, if you place food morsels into a screw-top jar and place the jar near an octopus, the animal will work out how to unscrew the lid to access the goodies. I know of an octopus at a celebrated aquarium in California that would wait until the

attendants left for the night, climb out of his tank, walk across the floor to adjoining fish tanks, eat his fill of their occupants and then return to his own tank before the staff arrived in the morning. It took bewildered workers some time and an infrared surveillance camera to figure out why their fish were disappearing.

Octopi, squid, nautilus, and cuttlefish are considered to be the smartest of all invertebrates. These spineless cephalopods are another class of mollusc and are cousins to the gastropods, which include sea and land snails. Cephalopod means "head-foot," since these animals are mostly head and lots of legs that developed in the place of a snail's single squishy foot. Some still live in shells, like the nautilus, while others carry a remnant of a shell inside their bodies (the cuttlefish) or none at all (octopus).

Squid, octopi, and cuttlefish invented the equivalent of polarised sunglasses aeons before us. In 1950, Dr. T.H. Waterman of Yale University discovered that cephalopods and many fish, crustaceans, arthropods, and aquatic insects have specialised mechanisms in their eyes that analyse light polarisation. This ability lets them significantly reduce glare from bright sunlight. Dr. Waterman continued his research for decades, though the developers of Polaroid sunglasses, which were originally invented in 1936, undoubtedly had no idea that they were biomimics of marine animals. We could learn more from these highly-adapted creatures to optimise our modern optics, telecommunications, and medical devices.

Even a common garden snail can teach us about nanotechnology, optimised balance, minimisation of materials, streamlining, defence, camouflage, and aesthetics. Who knows what we'll discover in coming years, as scientists zoom farther into the depths of the oceans and the molecules of molluscs. But you don't need to be a biomineralisation expert, a zoologist, or an engineer to discover a valuable biomimetic solution to formerly intractable problems. Any of us can discover and develop something new if we keep our eyes and curiosity open. The treasure chest of nature's secrets is waiting for you.

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.

So the moaning is in vain, I must roll up my sleeves, pop in my EarPods, select a podcast, and get back to the eternal weeding!

This month we were off visiting another local garden of choice: Brenda and Andy Scholar's. What a joy this garden is. The couple have been at this eight-acre property for thirty-nine years and when they arrived, there was mainly blue gum, peppy and fir trees, a few paddocks and a scattering of juvenile English Oak and Cork Oak. Since then the Scholars have converted the hay and slaughter shed into the most amazing home using recycled items from in and around Augusta. They've planted numerous fruit trees: Loquat, Fig, Mandarin, Lemons, Bananas and Macadamia to name but a few.

Brenda has a passion for succulents, and visitors are greeted by pot upon pot of these wonderful plants in every imaginable shape and size! When they moved from Bridgetown all those years ago, they brought with them a cactus which they planted by the original 1925 settler's shack. Gardening tip for November:

Most garden plants that are planted out grow best with one to two inches of water per week. If there is insufficient rainfall, water thoroughly once or twice a week instead of lightly each day. Frequent light watering only moistens the top layer of soil and encourages the plant's roots to remain shallow instead of growing deeply.

On Tuesday 10th October, the Pollie Pedal pelotons cycled through Augusta with a photo stop at Cape Leeuwin lighthouse and lunch at the Deckchair café. Departing from Margaret River, the riders completed 130kms, enjoying the scenic roads, albeit a few hills.

Pollie Pedal was founded by former Prime Minister Tony Abbott in 1998. Since then, participants have ridden over 23,000kms and raised more than \$7 million for charity. At the Deckchair, Paul Sofilas from Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse caught up with participant Tony Abbott, as Paul had ridden with Pollie Pedal 2001, from Sydney to Canberra, which raised funds for the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

This was the first time the ride was held in WA and funds raised went to not-for-profit veteran support group Wandering Warriors. An organisation making a real difference to the lives and future of our former service personnel as they transition to civilian life.

Making Waves - Augusta Taalinup Beach Clean-up Makes a Splash

Augusta's community spirit shone bright during the 2023 WA Beach Clean-up. This event saw the local community come together to give back to the environment and make a difference. On Saturday, October 14th, thirty-six people came together on a mission to spring clean our picturesque coastline, stretching from Quarry Bay to the Blackwood River mouth.

The heart-warming part of this endeavour was that age was no barrier to participation. Our youngest helper was just 6 months old, showcasing the inclusivity and warmth of the Augusta community. It was fantastic to see so many children joining in.



This event was more than a clean-up; it was a celebration of our community's unique character. It offered a chance to have fun, make new friends, and soak in the beauty that surrounds us. Our volunteers removed 12.5kg of debris from our beaches.

Quarry Bay, a monitoring site for Tangaroa Blue, presented a unique challenge during the clean-up. It was evident that an unusual amount of small debris accumulates in this area. The statistics were eye-opening, with a staggering 1,620 hard and solid plastic pieces collected from Quarry Bay, in stark contrast to 363 gathered from all the other beaches. Many of these pieces were only a few millimetres long.



Over the years, one trend has become increasingly apparent: the growing number of plastic pieces and 'nurdles' washing up on our shores. Nurdles, are tiny plastic resin pellets less than 5mm in length, are used to create many everyday plastic items, from bottles to car parts. This year, Quarry Bay saw a significant influx of nurdles. These miniscule plastics are often ingested by fish and birds, causing harm to our ecosystems.

Positive changes are happening. Only four plastic drink bottles were discovered during the clean-up, showing the effectiveness of recycling efforts and the difference everyone can make.



Other items collected included an old mobile phone, part of a metal flue, 185m of fishing line, 53 pieces of rope less than 1 metre, 22 foil food wrappers, 13 pieces of foam packaging, 3 used shotgun cartridges, 80 pieces of broken glass (much of which was from the embankment at Flinders Swimming Beach), 51 sanitary items, mainly tissues and wet wipes, 42 pieces of plastic bag, 8 items of clothing, wood, straws, confection sticks and food scraps.

The debris collected has not been forgotten. It has been entered into the Australian Marine Debris Database (AMDI), contributing to evidence that assists in developing strategies to prevent marine debris from occurring. This information is crucial for understanding trends, identifying changes, and implementing source reduction plans. It is a testament to the power of community action and the profound impact it can have on safeguarding our environment.

more hazardous in the morning hours and the late afternoons. You probably will have noticed this already travelling along our country roads. Like school zones we need to slow down to the conditions, our side country roads are like built up areas for our Roos, 50-60km would spare them and give you a relaxing scenic drive too. At 80km/hr a 40km trip like Augusta-Margaret River will still only take 30 minutes.

Spring time is busy, mobs come together, Bucks & Does pair up, juveniles are still with mum and the pouched joeys moving to be at their mother's feet more and more. Take the time to take off some speed. It could be lifesaving to yourself, your passengers and the beautiful creatures we share the natural environment with.

Our Carers literally have their arms full with rescued Kangaroo joeys, Western ringtail possums and other assorted wildlife.

Kerry and Dave Bell alone last week had

- a joey from a pouch search from a previously hit unchecked doe - this little one needed a different teat before feeding properly
- a phascogale & its suite set up
- a white robin chick/fledgling who was very vocal & insisting on being fed still, ignoring its mealworms
- a teeny tiny swallow chick
- a quenda who needed treating & then relocating after being rescued for the third time from cats
- and a wattle bird outside in the aviary.

Every hour something was squawking or needing a feed! Plus for call outs on top!

Police Legacy

CITIZEN SCIENTISTS

- Our Year 3 students were fortunate to join a Year 3 class at Margaret River Primary School (MRPS) to build on the knowledge from our recent excursion to the Montessori wetlands. Back in August we took water samples to learn about macroinvertebrates.
- During this visit, as citizen scientists, we investigated invertebrates in the gardens at MRPS with Lauren Scanlon from Margaret River Nature Conservation.
- Did you know there are an estimated 200,000 species of invertebrates in Australia of which only 5 percent have been identified and named? We found insect larva, earthworms, jumping spider, slaters, millipedes and a spider in our research area. We learnt how vital these creatures are to sustaining plant and animal life as pollinators, nutrient recyclers, seed dispersers, predators and food for wildlife. They are critical to life on our planet.

PILLOWCASE PROJECT

- Members of our local Red Cross visited to teach our students about personal and family preparedness, safety skills, local hazards and basic coping skills for emergency situations.
- The Pillowcase Project helps the children to decided what they would pack in a pillowcase in an emergency. Things to consider include: medicine, toiletries, pets, change of clothes, water, food, first aid kit, torch, chargers and pencil and paper. Each child received a sturdy pillowcase to plan the items they'd take with them and using fabric markers drew pictures on the pillowcase. We hope families feel better prepared for the bushfire season, with thanks to our friends at Red Cross.

Green Light for RAPP to Continue

We are delighted to announce that for a fifth year running, we have secured funding through the Augusta Margaret River Shire's Environmental Management Fund to continue our hugely popular Regenerative Agriculture in Practice Program (RAPP). Even better news is that the funding will continue for the next 3 years under the fund's new multi-year option.

RAPP 2024 will have two areas of focus, with the ultimate goal of offering a comprehensive 'learning to doing' program. **Regenerative Farm Planning** will give new participants an introduction to how rural landscapes work plus full access to online courses on regenerative farming principles around soil health, grazing management and building pasture diversity. **Supporting Transition** will give previous participants the opportunity to continue to grow and develop their skills and knowledge, build connections and networks as well as comprehensively monitor, record and share progress.

Expressions of Interest for the 2024 program will open next month – watch this space!



More Support for Tackling Ferals

Through the latest Environmental Management Funding round, the AMR Shire will be supporting a 1-year pilot Feral Pig Focus project in which the LCDC will assist the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group (LBVPMG) to work collaboratively with landholders, plantation companies, DBCA, DPIRD, Undalup and local government to undertake priority feral pig control work in the Augusta-Margaret River Shire.

This new project works alongside our Scott Coastal Plain project - the **State NRM** funded **Feral Pig Focus - Protecting the Scott Coastal Plain 2022 -2025 -** which has highlighted a need for monitoring and controlling feral foxes and cats. The project will enable field officers to take control of these pests.

Ants in your plants, and pavers?

Want to know what your problem ants are and how to control them? You've come to the right place.

There are thousands of ant species in Australia, and most are difficult to identify without a microscope and specialist knowledge. There are very effective baits for some species, while others require control using sprays. Other species rarely need any control and can be left alone. Unless you know the species of ant, control can be guesswork, which can waste your time and money, and involve the unnecessary use of pesticides.

By submitting samples for identification, you can learn about the species of ants at your property and how to control them, plus you'll contribute to ant surveillance in WA. Detections in recent years of exotic and problematic species such as the African black sugar ant, red imported fire ant and browsing ant, is a testament to the ability of ants to arrive in WA via freight and cargo. Their rapid detection provides the best chance of eradication and prevents the economic, social and environmental impacts caused by these ants.

For ant identification services, we request that only **dead** specimens are submitted. This will prevent any unintended spread of the ants, whilst keeping the postie happy!

Sampling instructions

- Brush ants into a sealed container, Ziplock bag or collect ants using the sticky side of transparent tape and fix this gently to a piece of paper.
- Place sample in the freezer for 1-2 hours to kill any live ants.
- Label samples with the collection location e.g. backyard, kitchen, bathroom, driveway etc., and include a note with your name, address, contact number and email address.
- Deliver or post to: Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, 3 Baron-Hay Court, South Perth WA 6151.

Any suspected exotic ant species should be reported for biosecurity screening to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.
