

REMEMBERING OUR NURSES

Saturday 10th February 2024 RSL Park York street, Augusta

On Saturday 10th February at 10am we will pause to remember the Australian Army Nurses who lost their lives in World War II following the sinking of the SS Vynor Brooke February 1942. 265 passengers including 65 Army Nurses were evacuated on the ship following the fall of Singapore. The ship was shelled and sunk by the Japanese, and 12 nurses perished as a result. 21 nurses were shot on the beach at Banka Island. The remaining 32 became prisoners of war. They were prisoners for three and a half years under appalling conditions, 8 died in captivity. 11 nurses drowned following the sinking of the hospital ship SS Centaur. A nurse was killed on the hospital ship SS Nanunda during the air raid at the Darwin Harbour. We pause and reflect on the sacrifice and challenges that these nurses made.


The service of remembrance is at 10am at the RSL Memorial Park Osnaburg. All are welcome to attend.

Look Out for Our Beach-Nesting Birds

Augusta beachgoers, it's breeding season for our beach-nesting birds, including the threatened Hooded Plover.

Their vulnerable nests are near the high tide mark and the chicks are at risk from various threats.

Help protect them by following signage, keeping dogs on leashes and in dog exercise areas, avoiding nest areas when walking, parking in designated car parks and not driving on the beach.



79th ANNIVERSARY HMAS NIZAM TRAGEDY



The N Class Destroyers Association of WA will be hosting their Annual HMAS Nizam Memorial Service at Cape Leeuwin on Sunday 11th February at 10 am.

31 years ago, in February 1993 N Class members first embarked on the area to respectfully commemorate the loss of ten young N Class sailors lost at sea off Cape Leeuwin and to dedicate the Memorial Cairn in their honour.

On February 11, 1945, at 2215 hrs, HMAS Nizam, was 11 miles south of Leeuwin Lighthouse, when it was struck by a freak wave. The ship rolled 75 degrees and tragically the ten Australian sailors perished when they were swept overboard. These young sailors were aged 18-23 years.

Lest We Forget .. LS Colin Ryder, OS Garnett Hill, OS John Wallace-Barnett, OS Keith Mills, OS Leslie Holloway, AB Victor Keys, AB Alfred Kerr, AB Allen Milich, AB Vincent Richardson and Stoker John Poulton.

After the war ended, N Class Destroyers associations were formed in NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, South Australia, Queensland and lastly Western Australia in 1989. Today Western Australia is the only branch still operating.

Over the years the members of the association have passed to higher service.

With only three surviving members left in Australia.

Ron Whitmore WA ex HMAS Nepal, aged 97, George Raphael OAM ex HMAS Norman, VIC aged 97, and Doug Wickens ex HMAS Nestor/Norman/Napier, NSW aged 102.

Unfortunately, none of our three surviving members are able to travel the distance due to poor health and age.

Three of our widows will be attending, Gwen Hammond aged 99, Aurelia Haley and Joan Donaldson aged 96 travelling from Victoria.

Family members now form the very strong association together with affiliate and honorary members from all over Australia. Associate Membership is open to any direct descendants of

N Class Sailors and Affiliate Membership, to anyone who has a keen interest in our association.

The Memorial Wall, which stands alongside the Cairn, was dedicated in 2002 by Past Patron of the N Class Destroyers Association, Rear Admiral Phillip Kennedy RAN (Rtd). Twelve plaques were originally positioned on the wall, which is now nearly completely full with 121 plaques.

On Saturday afternoon, 10th February, the Naval Band will perform a free concert at the Augusta Hotel on the lawn area and will also provide full support together with the HMAS Stirling Officers, LCDR Keith Bromfield and Command Warrant Officer, Thomas Costello, OAM and a magnificent catafalque party at the Memorial site on Sunday morning.

Chaplain, Barrie Yesberg PCHA RAN (Retd) will be conducting this years' service and we sincerely thank Barrie for his support.

A special thank you to the Leeuwin Lions and Margaret Martin who always support us each year. Sincere thanks to our Patron, Jim Challis and staff at the Augusta Hotel who have welcomed our members and guests over the past 31 years.

A new flagpole was purchased last November, to replace the old one which was rusted through. This is being concreted back in place where the old one was by local residents. Thank you.



BOBBING FOR COCONUTS - Introduction to Biomimicry

Each year, just fifteen cargo ships spew out as much acid-rain-creating sulfur dioxide and pollution as the world's cars combined. The global fleet of large ships numbers over 50,000 and uses 370 million tons per year (at about \$600 per ton) of the nastiest, filthiest, highest-emission bunker fuel. It smells and looks like liquid bitumen. When seaweed and barnacles accumulate on a ship's hull, they can cause so much drag that they increase the amount of fuel burned on a voyage by as much as 40 percent. Even today's best, very expensive antifouling paints are effective for a relatively short time and degrade quickly. Ships are taken out of the water, at great cost, every two or three years for fresh paint (most pleasure boats—every year). Effective antifouling paint makes a difference to both the bottom line of running costs as well as atmospheric emissions. Unfortunately, by their nature of being toxic to unwanted seaweed and barnacles, conventional antifouling paints are also highly toxic to the marine environment in general. Sharkskin is inspiring a different way of handling antifouling and so, it turns out, are coconuts and seaweeds.

Many of the world's plants, particularly in the tropics, migrate by floating their seeds on ocean currents. Coconuts are a prime example. You can see them washing up on beaches and germinating in the sand throughout the equatorial Pacific, Atlantic, and Indian Ocean islands. It turns out that many of these seafaring seeds don't suffer from the fouling that you see on ship bottoms. In other words, weeds and barnacles don't take a ride on them. This would be a good survival strategy, since accumulation of heavy growth could cause the seed to sink and never propagate. Researchers at the Biomimetics Innovation Centre in Germany have discovered that a number of palm seeds' surfaces have microsized, hairlike structures that constantly move, thereby giving no place for seaweed or barnacles to settle. A new antifouling surface has been developed based on the seeds' strategy. The global consumption of traditional, copper-laden, antifouling paint is around eighty thousand tons per year, costing upward of \$200 per gallon-a multi-billion dollar market with opportunities and good margins for alternative products.

Our pristine Augusta coastline is a joy to visitors and residents alike. Many people think of salt water as a good cleansing agent for wounds and infections, but sea and ocean water is teeming with biofilms of bacteria that coat most fish, reef, and coral. What is a biofilm? If you, like many, leave your wet toothbrush in a glass beside your sink, after a few days you might have noticed a very thin film of something building up in the bottom of the glass. That's not just toothpaste that

didn't get rinsed off the brush but biofilm. Biofilms are clumps of microorganisms that stick to one another and to all manner of surfaces, causing 80 percent of all human infections.

Severe and even fatal infections can be the result of an underwater scratch or nick. When I was a nineteen-year-old cadet Fisheries and Wildlife officer, I dropped a lobster on my bare foot. From a tiny prick of my skin, I ended up in hospital for several days with doctors wondering if I would lose my foot due to biofilm-caused infection. Fortunately, I got to keep the foot, but the experience left me highly conscious of biofilm hazard.

Scientists on a marine expedition off the Australian coast noticed that the surface of Delisea pulchra, a red feathery seaweed, was completely free of biofilms even though it was living in a soup of bacteria. They discovered that the plants produced chemical compounds-halogenated furanones-that interfered with the way bacteria communicate and assemble into dense colonies. The Australian company BioSignal Ltd. was established to commercialize the antibacterial features of those seaweed furanones. An obvious potential application was that ship hulls could be coated with synthesized furanones, instead of environmentally damaging, short-lived antifouling paints. Another area of interest was the interior coating of large oil pipelines to prevent the development of corrosion-causing biofilms. This is a classic example of a biomimetic platform technology, one that doesn't fix just a single problem but could make a wide range of existing processes or devices more effective. An outgrowth of the technology transfer program at the University of Sydney, BioSignal was able to utilize university research facilities in its early days and pursued a range of applications including toothpaste to eliminate bacteria-laden plaque biofilms and alternatives to pharmaceutical antibiotics. According to the company, its products have been used as drug candidates for the treatment of lung infections, as well as in various applications, such as water treatment, oral care products, cleaners, deodorants, catheters, and contact lenses and contact lens solutions.

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.





Hoping everyone has had a great Christmas break. Santa and one

of his elves came early down to the AYC. It was a perfect way to finish off the last sail for the season. Some wine and beers were the accompaniment to a BBQ and snacks.



Preceding the frivolous action there had been two races for the catamarans in 18kns from the SE.

The first race was a club championship heat. Cliff Hanger led the charge and there was no stopping him. Xena and Escape Route in front of the rest of the pack were in a real dice for the rest of points. After two laps, Cliff Hanger was in the box seat but the rest of the fleet had closed in, Zephya and Billy M were making their move heading straight for the mark on the down wind leg whilst the others sailing on a dogleg where the wind was stronger.

At the last mark it was neck to neck for third and fourth between Escape Route and Billy M. They battled to the finish, Escape Route third by 37 seconds. First and fastest went to Cliff Hanger and second to Xena.

The second race, a consistency race, had the boats getting battered by a strengthening breeze on the line, a couple of close calls but they all got way, amazing really. Cliff Hanger, Billy M, Escape Route and Zena out in front and Frisky, Yellow Taxi, Zephyr and No Name in a second group.

The breeze was pushing 20+kns, the first lap was done and dusted in no time. The western side of the river was pretty rough and had most sailors tacking into difficulties at least once.

Yellow Taxi and Frisky were at it and just ahead of them Escape Route and Billy M were in a monumental scrap. With one lap to go, Cliff Hanger was half a leg in front when out of the blue came Zena. She had halved the deficit and was flying downwind and by the reach she was in contention. We had the perfect view on the rescue boat all be it a fair way away, it looked like Zena had it by a small increment. We later learnt, Cliff Hanger fastest by one second on the line. It was a ripper race. For the handicap points, Billy M first, Frisky second and Yellow Taxi third.



The wind from after Xmas to New Years was horrendous, good reason to have a break but on 7/01/24 it was deemed suitable, proved to be only just with 20 to 25kns from the East.

It was really trying conditions, there was no time to check the catamarans out whilst sailing in race one. The handicap results were, first Xena, second Billy M and third Yellow Taxi.

In the monohulls it was a hard flog from the start, Redback were around the first mark miles ahead of Big Red and Pigs Might Fly. The positions hadn't change but Pigs Might Fly was coming back, overtaking Big Red with half a lap to go. Redback was probably finished by then. The handicap results were Big Red Dwarf first, Redback second Pigs Might Fly third. It was classic, all captains and crews had sore hands, no blisters though. NATIVE ANIMAL DEATHS:

We have heard about several native animal deaths in various locations. Experts suggest these may be due to lack of access to fresh water, or poisoning via rodent bait.

Providing fresh water baths in safe locations is the best way to help out. Avoiding rodent bait is best or take guidance from owlfriendly.org.au, which advises, "If baits are a necessity, choose only First Generation ones with active ingredients Warfarin (e.g. in Ratsak Double Strength) and Coumatetralyl (e.g. in Racumin). Wildlife and pets can cope with these relatively well when taken in through secondary poisoning".

Augusta Land and Coast Care Group and Augusta Community Nursery

The Augusta Community Nursery was busy in the latter months of 2023 generating new plants for the

2024 planting season. Watering at the nursery has always been dependent on an unreliable battery-powered reticulation system. Augusta Lions has now funded the hook up of power from the Recycling Shed to the Nursery. The connection of the programmed reticulation system to mains power will alleviate our duties of checking on the watering system this summer and the assistance from the Lions is gratefully acknowledged.

The Coast Care Group has been working along revegetated sections of Redman Brook at Flinders (See Plan below). Rejuvenation of Redman Brook has been tackled in sections since 2019 after the Shire commissioned a Management Report as follows:



Section 1 (~78m) (Reserve 24653) Coast to Davies Rd:

The mouth of the Brook and last 30m is dominated by native vegetation and revegetation – the next 40m to Davies Road was a weed-dominated man-made drain with steep sides and very little vegetation. (See photos showing planting and results below.)

Section 2 (~93m) (Reserve 24573) Davies Rd to Peppermint Drive: The western edge represents cleared and landscaped open parkland with managed grass and trees. The eastern portion is a vegetated creek line with weed-dominated understorey and groundcovers and a mature canopy of WA Peppermints.

Section 3 (~115m) (Reserve 24538) Peppermint Drive to Wishart Rd: The northern portion of this section is a narrow reserve with weedy vegetation dominating the stream channel adjoined by cleared parkland on the western side. The southern portion is very overgrown with a mix of peppermints, some natives and a broad range of woody, climbing, geophyte and herbaceous weeds.

Rehabilitation of Section 1

This coming winter more plants will be added along the upper area of the banks.





Another typical behaviour is head-bobbing amongst males, perhaps related to dominance within their social order. They are often seen basking on fence posts. 

Backyard Buddies

Eggfruit not so Eggsellent!

In a world of Solanaceous garden delights such as capsicums, tomatoes, chillies and eggplants, an unwelcome pest often goes unnoticed until harvest time: *Sceliodes cordalis*, more commonly known as the eggfruit caterpillar. This common garden grub has a craving for plants belonging to the Solanaceae family and can turn your hardearned produce into a feast for their insatiable appetite.

Biology and management

Eggfruit caterpillars begin their journey when the small brown moth lays her tiny, white oval eggs. These eggs are predominantly laid on the stem or calyx of the developing fruit. They hatch tiny white ravenous caterpillars, which bore into the fruit through the stem or calyx. This disguises their entry point. Munching and pooing their way through the inside of the fruit, the caterpillars often turn bright pink or red in colour as they mature. Eggfruit caterpillars are particularly hard to detect as there's rarely any external signs of infestation of the fruit. These gluttonous grubs eventually chew their way out of the fruit to pupate, and later emerge as adult moths.

Controlling this pest can be challenging and requires well-timed management during all life stages. Make sure to remove any weeds from the Solanaceous family (e.g., nightshade) to reduce

their breeding sources in the garden. Moths and eggs can be controlled using light traps, or by spraying insecticidal soap on the calyx. These soaps can affect the delicate wings of the adult moth, making it too slippery for her eggs to stick to the calyx, and may also desiccate the eggs. As freshly hatched caterpillars, there is a very short window for control before they enter the fruit. Target the stems and calyx with caterpillar control products. Look for ingredients such as spinosad or the biological control 'BT' (Bacillus thruigiensis). These insecticides become virtually ineffective once the caterpillars burrow into the fruit, as they are well-protected inside. If infested fruit is found, remove and discard to break their lifecycle.

Report your capsicum criminals!

Although eggfruit caterpillars are a well-established species, it's the small white caterpillars that may be confused with the larvae of the non-established and reportable Queensland fruit fly (Qfly). Qfly is a significant pest of over 300 fruits and vegetables. You can report suspicious larvae in your produce to MyPestGuide or contact the Pest and Disease Information Service by sending in photos of the larvae and cut-open fruits. Report early to keep your Solanaceous garden delights safe from unwelcome feasters!




