
Alfresco Dining in Augusta!

Leeuwin Lines

The Forces Combine for Successful Memorial Weekend

The 79th Anniversary of the "NIZAM"

tragedy when 10 young sailors lost their lives at sea, 11 nautical miles off Cape Leeuwin in 1945, only six months prior to the end of WWII was appropriately remembered in a Memorial Service at Cape Leeuwin on Sunday 11 February attended by around 200 people. The service which was very well conducted by Retired RAN Chaplain Barrie Yesberg was wonderfully supported by a Catafalque Party and the Navy Band from HMAS Stirling base.

A lively and well attended AGM ART CLUB NEWS last month resulted in a return of the Committee unchanged from last year. Thank you to all of you for continuing to steer, plan,

take minutes, ensure compliance etc. which can be a thankless task.

We have had some interest from arty people who work and cannot attend club days for an evening session. We would like to hear from anyone interested in a Tuesday evening weekly session and plan to start this soon (possibly April). This will be for people interested in drawing, painting and china painting. The normal rules regarding membership will apply ie you can attend 3 times before committing to joining the club.

The club will hold an Open Morning during the Augusta Anyone who has enquiries about our club, (eg the Fiesta Weekend (Labour Day Long Weekend) This will take place on Saturday 2nd March and will have fun art activities for visitors to try out. (See attached flier) The Studio Gallery will be open with lots of new artworks for sale, everyone is welcome to come and join us. I spend a lot of time reading Art Magazines and books and have a fascination for learning about the materials we all use to create our art so I thought I would write about some of these materials and tools and the ethics and safety associated with them.



In a late 1980's Art Magazine I read an article about a famous Art Supply Company attending the Leningrad Fur Auction and 'scooping' a special lot of rare red Kolinsky Sable tails with which to make high end watercolour brushes. Many people probably have heard of

Kolinsky Sable brushes and (of slightly less concern to me) ox hair brushes, but possibly have not considered the treatment of animals in 'fur farms'. The Sable is a type of Marten valued for its luxuriant fur. The Russian sable tail hair is especially valued. In another later magazine a letter to the editor asked if the animals were killed to harvest the tail hair and the answer was of course ves. (The reason I am slightly less concerned about the use of ox hair is that it is a by product of the

farming of cattle for meat whereas the Kolinsky sables presumably are farmed mainly for the hair on the tip of their tails which cannot be cut but has to be pulled out) The good news (if there can be any) is that these days there are excellent alternatives to animal hair for brushes. Taklon is a synthetic material which has the benefits of cost (usually quite inexpensive) and the brushes do not shed hair, they keep their shape and are as tough as nails. EGGING NATURE ON- Introduction to Biomimicry

I'd never been hit in the head with a duck's egg before. It felt more like a rock, except for the wet ooze that spread over my ear, neck, and shoulder. Though the same shape as a hen's egg, the duck-made variety is larger and decidedly tougher.

As the only Fisheries inspector in a remote coastal town of bored, off-season cray fishermen, it didn't take much for someone to dream up "Egg fight with the Fisheries!" The one store in town quickly sold out of eggs, and new supplies were three days away by truck. The fishermen raided their fridges, pooled their egg resources, and launched numerous attacks against Fortress Fisheries—loosely including the government house/office, patrol vehicle, and my person.

Eggs are wonderfully and optimally streamlined and can be thrown with considerable accuracy over a long range. I, of course, in the interest of self-defence and Fisheries honour, was forced to retaliate. As the owner of the only live fowl in town (ducks), I had a steady supply of ammunition—though waiting for fresh deliveries tested my patience.

Although dozens of eggs had flown and had made their marks on house and vehicle, none hit me-until the last day of the battle. The fishermen had exhausted the town supply. I endeavoured not to appear too smug and thought that the affair had ended. Just in case, I still carried a retaliatory egg in my hand everywhere I went. One of my foes, however, had snuck over my fence and helped himself to the sole duck egg of the day. I was walking across my front lawn to get in my truck whenthwack!—that awful sensation. A loud cheer went up from a group of fishermen standing at the open door of a pub across the street. Without hesitating, I spun around and flung my own egg at them. In the time it took to fly across the street, the men scattered, the egg flew through the door—and smashed itself on the mirror behind the bar. Quite a mess I had to clean up. It looked, to all, like certain defeat of the Fisheries, but I had other tricks up my sleeve. However, that's another story.

It seems that whenever humans create technology to solve a problem, we end up causing detrimental side effects. We created the internal combustion engine, which is less than 30 percent energy efficient, and gave rise to asbestos, chromium, lead, and methyl tertiary butyl ether (MTBE) contamination of air, lakes, and aquifers, and escalating asthma rates in our children—to name just a few consequences. We created woodpulp based paper and are subsequently responsible for clear-felled forests, erosion, spoiled rivers, collapsing ecosystems, and mercury poisoning. Plastics pollute with dioxins and mostly aren't biodegradable; thousands of new chemicals have never been tested for toxicity; and

we continue to generate nuclear waste. On the other hand, when nature seeks to solve a problem, it resolves all associated problems.

Take, for instance, the humble egg. It's streamlined, so it can be laid with the minimum of discomfort to Mum. In fact, it's so streamlined that it's the shape a rectangular brick will be turned into by nature, if left long enough in a flowing stream. We all know how thin an eggshell is. The hen uses the least amount of energy and materials in its creation so as not to deplete her own calcium levels. If she can't replace the calcium needed to make eggshell quickly enough through her diet, she extracts it from her skeleton, causing a condition known as avian osteoporosis, and even her own demise. While fragile enough to break from the inside when pecked at by a delicate, hatching, chick, the shell is incredibly strong under compression from the outside. In 2001, scientists duct-taped a raw hen's egg to the side of a deep-sea submarine. It descended one thousand meters below the surface of the ocean—a depth that would crush almost anything. The egg returned to the surface intact.

Eggs are also highly thermally efficient. When Mrs. Hen needs to take a walk for food or other necessities, the egg holds and recirculates its heat efficiently so that it doesn't cool down too much during her absence. The egg is also optimised for nutrient distribution. Both its heat and nutrients flow in a highly efficient, doughnutshaped ring vortex, perfectly matching the shape of the egg. Many eggs are elongated at one end. This out-ofround shape means that should an egg roll out of its nest, it will tend to roll back toward it again—handy if you've laid your offering on a cliff ledge. If the egg does take a fall, it has a shock-absorbing air pocket at the larger end. This also doubles as a pressure-relief valve if the egg gets overheated, since the air pocket compresses and protects the shell from expansion forces. The shell also offers the dual features of keeping out dirt and water, while being microscopically porous so that the developing chick gets oxygen as needed. Clearly, a number of strategies are related to an egg's shape—which matches the proportions of nature's whirlpools. These proportions can result in an infinite number of variations; hence we see many egg shapes and sizes that all share similar benefits. Beyond all these attributes, the egg is entirely recyclable and leaves no deleterious residue.

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.

250TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BIRTH OF MATTHEW FLINDERS

Saturday 16th March 2024 marks the 250th anniversary of the birth of Matthew Flinders the first person to circumnavigate the continent of Australia.

He commenced his circumnavigation from Cape Leeuwin on 6 December 1801. He was acting against the admiralty orders which commanded him to commence the mapping and circumnavigation from a point on the coast at 130 degrees East near modern day Ceduna SA.

We should thank Matthew Flinders for initiating the names Terra Australia and Australia instead of New Holland and Van Diemen's Land which had been used previously.

He was born at Donington Lincolnshire on 16 March 1774 to parents Matthew and Susanna Flinders.

Matthew Flinders senior was a doctor and apothecary. Matthew was the eldest child. He had a younger brother Samuel who sailed with him on his voyage of discovery.

The Augusta Picnic Regatta on Saturday the 27th January was a success and a

great team effort to pull it together. Some 150 plus people for lunch, with six races with some very tight finishes. The weather was picture perfect & whoever booked the weather did an outstanding job — windy the day before & it rained (mizzle anyway) the morning after.

The regatta welcomed the newly launched South of Perth Yacht Club skiff 'Ballina C' for their first regatta which had a novice crew having only rowed together once before (& that was the previous day.) Denmark brought their two skiffs for the first time, RFBYC brought their three skiffs, loaning one to Margaret River and with our skiffs bought the total number of skiffs to nine — all of which raced together on several events testing the course capacity and the starter's skills.

A brief overview of local planning and development:

At State level, there are a few planning documents which are notable locally — the State planning strategy, the Leeuwin Naturalist Sub-regional Strategy, Rural Planning, and the Residential Design Codes make the most impact.

A little more subtly but extremely importantly, the Draft State Planning Policy (SPP) 2.9 Planning for Water (which limits development within 2km of the Blackwood River, particularly regarding septics), SPP 2.6, Coastal Planning Policy (which limits development within a coastal erosion area to allow for sea level rise, e.g. within approximately 90 metres of the coast), and SPP2.4 Planning for Basic Raw Materials should be considered – your dream home development could turn pear shaped without due diligence!

Locally, development is guided by the Planning Strategy, a Planning Scheme (Number 2 is currently under community consultation), a Local Tourism Planning Scheme (curiously only available on the State planning website), and Townsite or Hamlet strategies, which guide development very locally.

The planning scheme is used by our Shire to guide what type of development is allowed to go where – most commonly, we will see:

- Residential zonings, used for planning development of dwellings (usually with an R code to indicate density – see table below)
- Town or Neighbourhood Centre, used to indicate where commercial or mixed use (with residential) development and activities can take place
- Rural, used to indicate activities such as intensive or non-intensive agriculture
- Tourism zoning, which generally can't be used for housing, but can be used for accommodation or tourist attractions, or to protect sites identified as being of strategic tourism importance from alternative land uses.

Residential building R codes, often referred to as zoning or planning regulations, are guidelines set by local governments to regulate the development of residential areas. These codes aim to ensure that buildings and neighbourhoods are developed in a way that meets specific standards for safety, aesthetics, and functionality.

In our stomping ground, we also have some areas with special provisions in our scheme, including the Molloy Island Area – (SCA 2) and Flinders Bay Heritage Conservation Area – (SCA 3).

Guidance on limitations imposed on all developments within approximately 2km of the Blackwood River is taken from the Draft State Planning Policy 2.9 Planning for Water (SPP 2.9) and Planning for Water Guidelines.

In terms of housing density, R codes typically include rules about how many housing units can be built on a certain piece of land. They might specify the maximum number of dwellings allowed per acre or square metre. Higher density may be permitted in certain zones, encouraging more compact and efficient land use, while other areas may have lower density requirements to maintain a more spacious or suburban feel.

In simpler terms, R codes help determine how closely together or how spread out homes can be in a residential area, contributing to the overall character and livability of the community. You can work out how many dwellings can be built on a given site size by referring to Table 1 in SPP 7.3 Residential design codes - Volume 1.


CWA Augusta enjoyed a break over the festive season and is now rested and ready for another busy year supporting our community.

Thank you to Berry Bliss for providing delicious ice-creams throughout the night. We hope to see you again at our next events!



STUDENT NUMBERS 2024


We warmly welcomed eleven new families to Karridale Primary this year—with nine of these families enrolling children in our Kindy.



able to entice it back (and every other bird around) with fresh fish. With no open injuries we were able to release the Pacific Gull straight away. Great work!

Backyard Buddies

Your monthly guide to pests, weeds and diseases

March 2024

That's so weird!



Witches' broom on *Jacksonia* causing red deformed growths, fasciation on *Templetonia*, chimera on orange rind, and phyllody on strawberry.

Plant abnormalities have intrigued gardeners and botanists alike for many years. These abnormalities sometime result in strange growths or odd variations. Causes include environmental or genetic factors, pests, and disease. Below are some common examples, and perhaps you've noticed one or two of these before?

Witches' broom

Witches' broom is a symptom of stress in woody plants resulting in a deformed mass of twigs and branches, which looks broom-like in appearance. Causes include insect pests, viruses, fungi, environmental factors and genetic mutations.

Fasciation

Fasciation appears as abnormal flattened, ribbonlike, crested or elaborately contorted stems or leaves. Causes include hormonal, genetic, bacterial, fungal, viral and environmental.

Chimera

Chimera is the result of a genetic mutation. The overall appearance of fruit can be changed and sections of the rind or skin can appear striped and/or green. This is often reported in citrus where the rind colour is perfectly split between yellow and orange. Chimera leaf mutations

produce variegated, misshapen, or completely white leaves. These mutations may be prized and propagated to create new varieties.

Phyllody

Phyllody is the abnormal development of the leaf tissue caused by viral infections or environmental factors resulting in an imbalance of the plant hormones. It makes leaves grow in strange places.

Is control or reporting necessary?

Not much can be done to prevent these oddities. Keep plants as healthy as possible to allow them to fight off pests and diseases as best they can. These weird and sometimes wonderful malformations can be a great talking point, but if you don't want them on your plants, consider removing the affected parts. Remember to disinfect gardening equipment before and after, to avoid spreading pests and diseases.

Lower Blackwood Catchment LCDC Community Update March 2024

Evaluation of Engagement Shows Catchment Land Managers Active in Landcare



LCDC Project Officer Dr Chaira Danese has been busily collating and analysing Information & data for our State NRM project 'Evaluating Engagement' and the analysis to date has confirmed what we already knew – that our land managers are very active in caring for this special corner of Australia.

As a reminder, the project commenced early 2023 and aimed to provide a long-term and holistic evaluation of our landholder engagement over the last 4 years to gauge the impact of this work. The project included an evaluation of our longer term on-ground works (eg. Fencing and revegetation) over the last 20 years to establish the impact of these projects on catchment health but also the social impact. By this we wanted to see whether or not there is a ripple effect on neighbours surrounding the area where the work has been undertaken and the effect of landholders as key influencers on their neighbours.

We are super excited about the project outcomes as we have been able to assess the success or otherwise of our AAA Engagement Framework (Increasing Awareness, Providing Advice, and Encouraging Adoption), in supporting landholder uptake of regenerative and sustainable agricultural practices and the corresponding environmental, economic and social impacts on those landholders and the wider catchment. In addition, the evaluation has enabled us to identify project and landholder support gaps and given us key recommendations moving forward, including further development of our GIS mapping system as a data management tool and to guide future project prioritisation.

So watch this space, we will be publishing & sharing the report link with you in the next edition of the Pelican Post.


