Feasibility Assessment Progress

February 2025

Synergy is investigating the feasibility of a wind farm in Scott River. The feasibility assessment is considering up to 20 turbines up to 250m tall.

Thank you to those who attended the December 2024 drop-in sessions to discuss the proposed wind farm in Scott River. Below is a summary of the sessions.

Participation

- Five drop-in sessions were held in Molloy Island, East Augusta, Augusta, Alexandra Bridge and Margaret River.
- Over 150 community members attended.
- During the sessions 46 feedback forms were received.

What we heard

Attendees highlighted the following areas of the highest importance:

- Visual amenity
- Sound levels
- Environment
- Management of acid sulfate soils
- Impacts to birds

Next steps

To enable more comprehensive data to be gathered, Synergy has extended the feasibility study period until mid-2025. The remaining studies are underway and, once complete, further information will be shared with the community. Synergy seeks to progress the wind farm to contribute to the State Government's 2030 decarbonisation targets. The wind farm's delivery timeline can be impacted by many external factors outside Synergy's control including wind turbine supply chain constraints, the grid connection process, and environmental, development and government approvals.

Frequently asked questions

The following questions were commonly asked during the recent drop-in consultation sessions.

How is the biodiversity in Scott River being considered?

In alignment with Synergy's Environmental Policy we responsibly consider the environment in all stages of a project life cycle, including the feasibility stage. Feedback from the community has reinforced the importance of the unique biodiversity in Scott River. Synergy is in the process of completing several studies into the flora, vegetation and terrestrial fauna within the feasibility area. We are also embarking on a second year of bird studies to ensure we have collected adequate data to inform our proposed project layout and impact assessment.

How will Synergy manage acid sulfate soils?

Synergy acknowledges the presence of acid sulfate soils (ASS) at the proposed wind farm site and is now progressing from a preliminary geotechnical, ASS and contamination investigation, to a detailed field investigation to better assess and mitigate associated risks.

If the wind farm were to go ahead, Synergy would be required to demonstrate to the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER) that we can safely manage acid sulfate soils.

DWER provides comprehensive guidelines for the identification, assessment, and management of ASS. Management strategies being investigated by Synergy include, but are not limited to, alternative wind turbine foundation types, construction timing, dewatering methodologies and treatment.

Does hosting a wind turbine on my farm affect my ability to sell red meat?

Hosting a wind turbine does not impact obtaining or retaining Livestock Production Assurance accreditation and there are no additional audit requirements.

There is no prohibition or restriction on having items such as transmission lines, wind turbines, solar panels or any similar equipment on property where animals are raised for meat production.

Do wind turbines generate infrasound harmful to humans?

Infrasound is sound with a frequency below 20Hz which is below the human threshold for hearing. Infrasound has both natural sources, like the ocean and the wind through the forest, as well as human-generated sources such as traffic. Infrasound from wind farms has been shown to be below other sources of infrasound in the environment, both natural and humangenerated, in rural and urban settings.

A study commissioned by the National Health and Medical Research Council has confirmed that infrasound from wind farms does not harm human health.

Do wind turbines generate vibrations?

Like most machines and infrastructure, wind turbines experience vibrations, similar to those from a bridge swaying in the wind or a car engine running. To ensure the safety of the turbines and the technicians working inside them, wind turbines are equipped with advanced vibration management systems.

Is the feasibility assessment owned by international investors?

The feasibility assessment is 100% led by Synergy and is owned by the Government of Western Australia, represented by the Minister for Energy.

How often are wind turbine blades replaced?

Wind turbines are designed to withstand the lifespan of the wind farm, which is generally between 25 and 30 years. It is uncommon for spare blades to be stored at the wind farm during operations. Blades are very rarely replaced and spares would need to come from interstate or overseas.

How often would the wind turbines be turning?

Generally, wind turbines begin turning at wind speeds of approximately 11 km/h. Based on Synergy's collected wind data, there will be enough wind to generate power over 90 percent of the time.

What about nuclear energy?

Nuclear power is not currently permitted in Australia under either the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (Cth) or the Australian Radiation Protection and Nuclear Safety Act 1998 (Cth). These acts prohibit the approval, licensing, construction, or operation of a nuclear plant.

Can aerial firefighters access the wind farm area in case of fire?

The wind turbines can be switched off remotely to allow aerial firefighting. In the event of a fire, the pilot would determine their level of comfort to fly over the wind turbines. There would be dedicated large water tanks onsite which would be made available for fighting fires. A robust fire management plan would be developed in consultation with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services and local fire services.

Are there restrictions on where neighbouring landowners can build on their property?

Neighbouring landowners can build anywhere on their property. Synergy works with neighbours to ensure any plans for their property aren't affected by the proposed wind farm or, if they choose, they are compensated for any adjustment to their plans or compliance with certain building restrictions.

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80th ANNIVERSARY HMAS NIZAM TRAGEDY



The N Class Destroyers Association of WA will be hosting their Annual HMAS Nizam Memorial Service at Cape Leeuwin on Sunday 9th February at 10 am.

On February 11, 1945, at 2215 hrs, HMAS Nizam was 11 miles south of Leeuwin Lighthouse, when it was struck by a freak wave. The ship rolled 75 degrees and tragically ten Australian sailors perished when they were swept overboard. These young sailors were aged 18-23 years.

After the war ended N Class Destroyers associations were formed in NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, South Australia, Queensland and lastly Western Australia in 1989. Today Western Australia is the only branch still operating.

32 years ago in February 1993 N Class members first embarked on the Leeuwin area to respectfully commemorate the loss of ten young N Class sailors lost at sea off Cape Leeuwin and to dedicate a Memorial Cairn in their honour.

Over the years the members of the Association have passed to higher service and there are only three surviving members left in Australia. Ron Whitmore WA ex HMAS Nepal, aged 98, George Raphael OAM ex HMAS Norman, VIC aged 98, and Doug Wickens ex HMAS Nestor/Norman/Napier, NSW aged 103.

Unfortunately, they are not able to travel the distance to join in the commemoration due to poor health and age.

Our dear member and widow of the late Derek Hammond, Gwen Hammond aged 100, will be our only widow attending. Family members now form the very strong association together with affiliate and honorary members from all over Australia. Associate Membership is open to any direct descendants of N Class Sailors and Affiliate Membership, to anyone who has a keen interest in our association.

Associate Members will be travelling from NT, Queensland, NSW, Victoria and Tasmania to attend our re-union dinner and the HMAS Nizam service.

The Memorial Wall, which stands alongside the Cairn, was dedicated in 2002 by Past Patron of the N Class Destroyers Association, Rear Admiral Phillip Kennedy RAN (Rtd). Twelve plaques were originally positioned on the wall, which is now nearing completion with 122 plaques.

On the afternoon of Saturday 8th February, the Royal Australian Navy Band will be providing a free concert on the lawn area at the Augusta Hotel. Everyone is welcome to attend.

The Navy Band will also be supporting us at the HMAS Nizam Service, playing all the hymns. Captain Ken Burleigh from HMAS Stirling, and Command Warrant Officer Danny Burgess with a magnificent catafalque party will also be in attendance at the Memorial service on Sunday morning.

Chaplain Barrie Yesberg PCHA RAN (Retd) will be conducting this year's service and we sincerely thank Barrie for his ongoing support.

A special thank you to Margaret Martin and members of the Leeuwin Lions, who continue to assist us in preparing for the service each year. Sincere thanks to our Patron Jim Challis and staff at the Augusta Hotel who have welcomed our members and guests over the past 32 years.

We welcome everyone to the free Navy Band concert on Saturday afternoon and most importantly to the Memorial service on Sunday morning commemorating the 80th Anniversary of the HMAS NIZAM Tragedy.

The benefits these dogs provide to those who need assistance is life changing, and in time, the benefits to all communities will be profound.

LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION (LCIF) DISASTER RELIEF

Lions are well recognised for the immediate on ground support provided worldwide in times of disaster. The highly destructive wildfire in California is the latest that will result in all Lions Clubs being called upon for assistance.

DON'T BUG ME - Introduction to Biomimicry By JAY HARMAN

Although we mostly see them as pests, insects and bugs of all shapes and sizes have survived for millions of years. Their hardy structures, complex chemistry, and ways of moving offer a wealth of opportunity to industries from transportation to medicine to metallurgy.

Those pesky flies that freeload at barbecues and picnics all over the world are actually nature's masterpieces of aerodynamic performance. These Ferraris of the sky have much to teach even our most advanced aeronautical engineers, let alone us poor schmucks trying to swat them away from our sausage sizzles. A scientist wondered how these little party poopers managed to so easily avoid being swatted. By filming with super-slow-motion cameras as he tried to swat, he found that "They perform an elegant little ballet with their legs to position their bodies, so that when they jump, they push themselves away from the looming threat." This entire routine happens in less than a split second. The fly's tiny brain can perceive threat and where it's coming from, calculate the best escape route, complete its pirouette, and leap to safety-all in a tenth of a second. The researcher found that flies were "marvellous machines—arguably the most sophisticated flying devices on the planet." Understanding their strategy could lead to cars, planes, or helicopters that avoid crashes or car seats that respond to an impending crash by jumping away from a direct impact.

Is there life in space? One thing we do know, thanks to the European Space Agency, is that there are earthly life forms that easily survive and even thrive in the extremes of space. Apart from some species of lichens and bacteria that have taken rides on space shuttles, at least one animal has laid eggs 160 miles above the earth's surface. Tardigrades (also known as water bears, moss piglets, or their affectionate nickname, tardies) can withstand temperatures as low as minus 273° Celsius (nearly absolute zero) and as high as 151° Celsius (one and a half times egg-cooking temperature) without a shiver or a sweat. They can live in a vacuum, liquid helium, or 90 percent alcohol and are impervious to radiation one thousand times anything that would kill us. Tardies are teetotalers, not needing water for a decade at a time. They can dry out to just one percent of their normal water content before their next drink—and then probably binge. Wherever you travel on earth-from Mount Everest to Antarctica or four kilometers deep in the ocean-you can find water bears. All you need is a microscope. Discovered by German scientist Johann Goeze in 1773, there are more than one thousand species growing to a hulking one tenth of one millimeter long (the width of a hair) and in many colours from red to green. They seem to enjoy romance, with very complicated courtship and mating rituals. Who knows what we can learn from these eight-legged little guys about new materials, surviving in space, and even the essence of life itself, but their ability to survive many years without water has made tardigrades a mentor for vaccinepreservative research.

The invention of vaccines is one of the great achievements of human ingenuity. Through their use, smallpox has been eradicated from the world, polio is getting there, and literally billions of people have been spared debilitating or fatal diseases. One major challenge to their wider use in the poorest, most populous, and greatest suffering regions of the world is the absence of refrigeration needed to preserve live vaccines. Half of all vaccines sent to these areas don't get to patients. Anhydrobiosis is the Greek-derived word for "life without water." Some organisms, including tardigrades, survive by replacing their water molecules with specialized, stable sugar molecules. This lets them stay dormant but viable for greatly extended periods. Imagine if vaccines could be kept in a dry state with no need for refrigeration. Many more people in remote communities could be vaccinated.

Another organism that we call a bug—a bacterium—is not to be sneezed at when it comes to biomimicry. These microscopic titans create proteins called enzymes that can digest just about anything, including radioactive material. There are germs that eat petrol and diesel fuel, or neutralize some of the most powerful plastic explosives. Other bacteria quickly evolve to safely eat foods made with genetically modified organisms (GMO) that were originally designed to kill them. A new species of bacteria that eats iron was recently found on the Titanic, four kilometers under the ocean's surface. In the chemistry of these bacteria lie secrets that researchers can study, synthesise, and ultimately put to use in everything from rust prevention on oil rigs, pipelines, and ships to the cleanup of toxic waste.

Traditional mining strategies for capturing metal ores are often damaging to the landscape and the fragile ecosystems living there. The extensive use of arsenic in the extraction of gold is just one example. A research team observed the ways that microbes selectively collect, manage, and transport metals such as iron, copper, and zinc, because each has a particular nutrient value to the microbe. By mimicking their strategies, an automated decontamination and metal reclamation system was developed that can extract fortytwo targeted metals including gold, mercury, cadmium, and copper, as well as radioactive and toxic metals. The system can reclaim metal from mining tailings and industrial sludge and detoxify and remediate water and sewage.

When I bumped into Dr. Daniel Bedo, a boyhood friend I hadn't seen for many years, I learned he had become one of the world's foremost authorities on the chromosomes of blackflies. I asked him how there could possibly be enough happening in a bunch of microscopic chromosomes to keep him fascinated. His response: "When you enter the world of a single chromosome, it's like you walked through the door to an entirely new and unique universe. The lessons nature has to teach us are infinite."

The southwest of Australia is one of the world's most biologically diverse environments. Nature solves the same problems facing humans, but does so in surprisingly efficient and sustainable ways. Jay Harman is sharing a series of examples in the Pelican Post.

BUSHCARE Bushland surrounding Augusta is Unallocated Crown Land (UCL)–

shown as Park and Recreation Land under AMR Shire maps (Figure 1). It extends as a strip west of Augusta between the town and the airport and north into Kings Park and Flat Rock. Leeuwin National Park lies west and south. Unallocated Crown land means an area: (a) in which no interest is known to exist but native title under the Native Title Act 1993 of the Commonwealth may or may not exist; and (b) which is not reserved, declared or otherwise.



residents use the bushland daily for recreation. Walking the dog, taking bushwalks when southerly winds restrict the beach, fishing or riverside activities, searching for orchids, biking or driving along the numerous tracks between Leeuwin and the Airport Roads.

Many Augusta

Landcare and Coastcare volunteers are concerned that the bushland is misused as a dumping

Parks and Recreation Bushland (UCL - light grey) ground. (See Figure 2). Tyres, building materials, fish

remains, garden waste and particularly bulbs are of major concern since they rapidly become invasive and destroy native bush. No funding exists for the care and maintenance of Unallocated Crown Land. **PLEASE AVOID DUMPING AT ALL COSTS.**

As Bush Carers, we aim is to preserve this bushland for the residents of Augusta. The bushland backs onto the Wadandi Trail, for which significant funding is now available.

Bush care activities include the following: -

- 1. Eradication of sweet pittosporum, polygala and Victorian Tea tree by removing small plants or cutting at the stump. Follow-up will be needed for two years to fully eradicate seedlings.
- 2. Removal of any sighted arum lilies and outliers of watsonia.

Plant discards are left in the bush to break down as mulch and usually disappear inside a year.

Much work was done over a busy time of year by members of the community, Shire and Council to bring about this outcome. The proponent has 28 days to appeal to SAT (State Administrative Tribunal). ACDA has written to the Shire and Council to request its advocacy committee considers a review of agricultural lime in WA at state level, with a view to identifying and providing access to resources in more appropriate locations.

We wish to express gratitude for the support received during the Christmas raffle at Augusta Local Grocers and January meat raffles at the Augusta Hotel Additionally, please remember to leave water out for wildlife, shallow dishes on the ground, bird baths under foliage protection, pot plant trays hung up in trees, pet style gravity feed water bowls, remembering to add a 'ladder stick' in case a little critter needs an escape route.

This will help our wildlife over dry hot spells and may even help young animals as they transition to independence. Please ensure the safety of fledglings by placing in something like an ice-cream container if on ground and parents not obviously there and securing this in a branch as high as you can reach. Only intervene if they are injured.

Possum bridges constructed from mooring ropes provide connections between trees and serve to redirect possums away from residential properties towards the nearest trees.

To keep your home cleaner and provide access between tree gaps set up possum bridges.

Put up nest boxes for fauna with hinged lids to allow access in a crisis.

In this latest Connection to Country story, Wadandi / Pilulmun Custodian Iszaac Webb explores the six seasons of Bibbulmun country, focusing on the cultural significance of each season, the flora and fauna that indicate seasonal changes, and the communal gatherings that occur during Birak (December-January), the season of the young, and Bunuru (February-March), the season of adolescence.

Water and Seagrass Snapshots

The Department of Water and Environmental Regulation has released two new publications about our beautiful Hardy Inlet!

Some Quick Facts about Water Quality:

- Due to a dry 2022 and 2023, rainfall was very low for the Hardy which means that river flow was also very low
- Even with lower rainfall, the nutrient count in the Hardy wasn't too bad!
- There was an increase in algae blooms, but there were no reported effects on our river fauna

Some Quick Facts about Seagrasses:

- In January 2024, Seagrasses covered 331 hectares of the Hardy Inlet catchment!
- The seagrasses monitored range from 10 to 30 cm tall, with an average of 15 cm
- Although due to the lower rainfall, the amount of seagrass had declined from 2020 to 2023

European wasp surveillance in full swing



European wasps feed on grapes and other fruit, human and pet food, insects and dead animals like rats, kangaroos and bandicoots

The annual hunt to detect and eradicate European wasps (Vespula germanica) from WA is in full swing!

Guard your BBQs, monitor your pet's food and check the insects you scoop from the pool! European wasps, we are looking for you!

The European wasp is a declared pest and must be reported. It has threatened to establish in WA since six nests were found and destroyed near Fremantle in 1977. Thanks to ongoing collaborative surveillance between the Department, community, local governments and businesses, WA has prevented the permanent establishment and spread of this species, to date. This is globally unique, and an extraordinary achievement.

European wasps are widely established across most of southern Australia and Tasmania which aren't subject to such a coordinated program. Consequently, new queens hitchhike their way into WA each year, and this is our 48th year spent competing in a sophisticated game of 'hide and seek' against this highly adaptable and destructive pest.

These wasps have the proven potential to establish nests from Kalbarri to Eucla, with outbreaks historically

in Kalgoorlie, Kalbarri, Geraldton and regional towns across the south-west. Most detections are made in the Perth Metro, but current regional detections include the Bunbury, Geraldton and Albany regions. These are huge areas to monitor, so please keep your eyes peeled.

What to look for

There are similar looking black and yellow wasps in WA, so look for these key characteristics:

- Scavenging on human food and drinks, fruit like grapes, apples and stone fruit, pet food and roadkill (carrion).
- **Nest underground** nests are HUGE, grow larger than a basketball in a single season, and have a small (golf ball sized) entrance hole.
- Completely black antenna.
- Legs up in flight (rear legs don't dangle).
