
CHANGEOVER COMPLETE

Shire news

August



Kaya, as we reach the end of Makuru, the coldest and wettest of the Noongar seasons, I hope you have managed to stay warm and dry. Our teams have been working hard to respond to the conditions across the Shire and keep our home tidy and safe.

Our July Council Meeting was our biggest and most important meeting of the year. First up, council discussed the Turner Street Jetty. We investigated the feasibility of several options and presented them to the Turner Street Jetty Community Reference Group, who showed support for removing the existing jetty structure, and designing and reconstructing a fixed timber decked jetty. This option comes with a price tag of around \$660,000 which is a significant investment that will affect other projects that we can deliver. We will continue to progress with detailed design however before we commit, we will be asking for community feedback to make sure that this choice reflects everyone's priorities. Thank you to the Community Reference Group for your time, effort and passion - it is greatly appreciated.

Council also adopted the Strategic Community Plan 2025 - 2035. Over the past 12 months, we've been checking in with our community to make sure we understand what matters most. The result is the new Strategic Community Plan, which will guide everything we do over the next decade to achieve our shared vision: One community, standing together with nature.

To turn this vision into action. Council endorsed the 2025-26 Corporate Business Plan and Budget which includes a \$25.9 million capital works program, \$875,000 for local community and environmental groups, and continued funding for essential services like ranger operations, community health, libraries, and Nala Bardip Mia Margaret River HEART.

This is a responsible budget, developed through careful, rigorous, and long-term planning.

It's designed to meet the needs of today's ratepayers while also planning for future generations by caring for our natural environment, managing our built environment and supporting the wellbeing of everyone who lives here

Augusta's coastal trail vision moves forward

Construction is now underway on the Cape Leeuwin Trail Extension, bringing Augusta one step closer to a continuous coastal trail linking the town centre to the Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse.

The 3.1 km shared-use trail, stretching from Dead Finish to the Water Wheel Carpark, is designed for both walkers and cyclists, offering a safe and scenic route along Augusta's

The project reflects more than 20 years of community interest and over a decade of planning by the Shire.

The trail is expected to be completed by November 2025.

Environmental consultants are working closely with the Shire to ensure protection of rare flora and fauna, and to rehabilitate degraded areas along the route.

Residents and visitors are advised that temporary closures are in place. Leeuwin Road scenic lookout and the carpark opposite Water Wheel will be closed during construction. Access points between Dead Finish and the Cape Leeuwin Lighthouse may be temporarily inaccessible. Signage will be in place.

VACANCY STAYING IN PLACE COORDINATOR (FIXED TERM - 1 YEAR)

Augusta Community Resource Centre (ACRC) is seeking a part-time Staying in Place Coordinator based in Augusta. This is a fixed term position for 1 year with a possible opportunity for extension for the right candidate. ACRC is an independent not-for-profit and registered charity who is implementing the Staying in Place program locally to support seniors in the Augusta and surrounding region.

The SIP program is an innovative community approach that is making it possible for older people in rural and regional areas of Western Australia to stay living in their own homes, in their community. It is a model that draws on 'locals supporting locals' through coordination from the ACRC in partnership with an approved aged care provider Homemade and local workers who provide their services through the Mable support worker platform.

The SIP Coordinator role will commence as a two day a week position (16 hours) which could increase to three days or more in the future as more SIP clients come onboard to access local services.

This is a new role, and we are looking for someone who is able to work with SIP clients with patience, understanding and has a desire to help clients achieve and maintain wellness so they have the ability to stay living in their own home, in their own community.

We are seeking an individual who has the following skills and experience:

- Excellent interpersonal, verbal and written communication skills applicable to working with elderly people.
- Networking capacity with community organisations and services and Government.
- Strong communication and time management skills with attention to detail.
- Current Police Clearance or can acquire one if requested.

- Knowledge, awareness and understanding of the Staying in Place model.
- Experience in case coordination.
- Experience as a support worker or contractor to aged people.
- Confident analytical and problem-solving skills.

Home Care and Support Services

REGISTER YOUR INTEREST IN THIS PROGRAM!

The Augusta Community Resource Centre in conjunction with Homemade & Mable – a Commonwealth approved home and community care provider for older people - will be introducing a wide variety of home care support and services for seniors so you can continue to enjoy living at home.

Whatever your needs, we will work with you to put a plan into action so that you can live your best life at home in your own community.

If you are over 65, or an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander over 50, you could be eligible for a Home Care Package funded by the Australian Government. Home Care Packages are subsidised by the Australian Government and are available in 4 levels based on your needs.

- Level 1 basic needs like essential cleaning, pet care, social outings
- Level 2 services like meal preparation, cleaning, gardening and home maintenance
- **Level 3** higher care and support needs such as meal preparation, domestic assistance, personal care, gardening and home maintenance, social support, allied health services

Level 4 - higher care and support needs such as meal preparation, nursing care and allied health services, personal care, domestic assistance, medication support, gardening and home maintenance, and social support.

The Augusta Community Resource Centre will be the coordination centre in Augusta for the Staying in Place program and we encourage people over 65 in Augusta and the surrounding areas of Hamelin Bay, Kudardup and Karridale to register now to find out more about the program and how it can support you locally.

The Augusta Community Resource Centre is currently recruiting a Staying in Place Coordinator but while that role is being finalised, we encourage you to get in touch with us and register your interest in the program.

You can also ask for our flyer to be sent out to you that explains the Home Care and Support Service further or collect a copy from Reception at the Augusta Community Resource Centre.

Our Year 6 students recently had the unique opportunity to contribute to the



Leeuwin Naturaliste National Park -**Cape to Cape Track Trailhead Construction**



The project

The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) is working with key stakeholders to improve the Cape to Cape Track trailheads at Cape Naturaliste and Cape Leeuwin within the Leeuwin Naturaliste National Park. The trailhead renewal works includes:

- construction of new pedestrian pathways and gathering areas with seating
- installation of new signage structures
- improved carparking
- improved site drainage.

During construction, impacts (including noise, traffic, and dust) will be minimised as much as possible. Onsite works will be undertaken by contractors between 7am and 6pm, Monday to Friday. Weekend works will only to be undertaken if required due to weather conditions.

To safeguard the natural environment, vegetation will be retained and protected from damage during construction. Work will commence at Cape Naturaliste on Monday 21 July 2025 and is expected to be completed by the end of August 2025. Work will commence at Cape Leeuwin on Monday 1 September 2025 and is expected to be completed by 12 December 2025.

Visitor information

To ensure visitor safety and expedite contractor works, some areas will be closed to the public while work is underway. Access to the lighthouse and cottages will remain open. The public is requested to follow all construction signage during the project works.

Access and closures

- The construction area will be fenced and closed to the public. Access to the lighthouse, cottages and toilet facilities will remain open.
- Small sections of the carpark will be periodically closed to vehicle access to facilitate stages of construction. Traffic management signage will be in place during the prohibited access periods.



This month I had a fall and sustained several broken bones including the right wrist fracture which sadly

put me out of doing any craft for some time.

Knitting is a great way to treat anxiety, depression and stress but in saying this if knitting or crocheting is to help an injury it is important not to overdo it. Make sure your yarn is loose, use large knitting needles and if crocheting, a crochet hook can be pierced through a tennis ball to provide extra grip on the hook.

There is no need to follow a pattern and be sure to take regular breaks to stretch fingers, wrists and forearms to prevent stiffness and fatigue. Too much knitting can also have its problems like carpal tunnel syndrome, tendonitis and back pain.

War injured veterans used knitting which was beneficial for recovery from various physical and emotional challenges gained during conflicts. Knitting was one of the many many ways civilians participated in the homefront. General Dwight Eisenhower would later call this the friendly hand of this nation, reaching across the sea to sustain its fighting men. (Eisenhower's address to congress, June 18th 1945).

On all stretches of downtime idle hands were turned to service as civilians knitted articles of warmth and comfort for the soldiers, and therapeutic distraction for the knitter.

First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt was often photographed knitting for the war effort and carrying her voluminous knitting bag. She effectively launched the World War Two Knit for Defence Tea held at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City on September 31st 1941. The Red Cross was the single clearing agency for all knitting and were granted priority status for receiving wool.

Seattle's chapter of the American Red Cross had formed in 1898 to provide war relief during the Spanish American war. Red Cross leaders were being trained in the oldfashioned art of carding and spinning yarn from wool.

Knitters also produced fifteen to twenty foot stretch bandages which were knitted with 100% cotton in garter stitch. Garter stitch produces a stretch fabric which lies flat on the edges. The finished bandages was sterilised and shipped to medical units worldwide.

Tugusta Wildlife <mark>Care</mark> W.H. Inc. Rescue Rehabilitation Release of Dustralian Wildlife

Mirco Bat

A concerned local contacted AWC after they observed a Micro Bat to have been on the ground for 24 hours following a storm. On retrieval, the bat had no noticeable injuries but was cold and so was placed in a small dark container with an external heat source to gradually warm and dry the tiny mammal.



Micro Bats can't easily take off from the ground and if they're grounded, they're usually injured or unwell and won't recover without specialised

care. Bats around the world are hosts to a number of zoonotic diseases and are known to bite. It is important that members of the public do not handle bats, and instead just like this concerned local, if you find an injured or grounded bat contact a wildlife rescue / rehabilitation organisation or local veterinarian. People trained in handling bats are required to be vaccinated and advised to always use appropriate protection when interacting with bats.

The rescued bat was thought to be a Lesser Long Eared Bat as this species is the most common in the southwest and because of the length



of its ears as seen the photos. After warming up and having a feed on a special "insect based" mixture $-\,48$ hours later our little friend returned to the night skies.



Pinkie

Also taken into care was "Kael" a Western Grey Kangaroo joey whose mother was killed on Bussell Highway near Caves Road. Kael is what is known as a

"Pinkie". Pinkie is the term used to describe joeys that are only seen when rescued from the pouch of a dead animal. Pinkies are the earliest stage of a kangaroo's development and are too young to survive outside the pouch as they are unable to create enough heat to keep warm as they have no fur. Kael was uninjured in the incident which killed his mother and is now in the care of Rocky Ridge Wildlife who specialise in kangaroos. Kael is being nursed indoors in a specially made pouch with a heating mat and fed every 4 hours on special formula.

Collared Sparrow Hawk

A Collared Sparrow Hawk decided recently to drop into the Augusta Pharmacy to check out the range of products. After "making itself comfortable", a quick capture saw the bird released to nearby bushland.

Bob

And as a last word.... Bob the Western Ringtail baby possum who came into

care in February weighing just 102 grams, has been released to fend for himself. Almost fully grown and independent, he has a new home in a possum nest box which was erected in a tree near where he has been lovingly cared for over the past 6 months. He still drops in to check out his old digs and to see if anything is on offer.

Kids, Cows, & Catchments: Year 6's Dive into Water Health

What do cows, chemistry, and catchments have in common?

Just ask the Year 6 students from Augusta Primary School, who recently got a deep dive into the world of water health, and how our actions on land ripple downstream.

The students kicked off their learning with Adam Acosta from the **Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER)**, who wowed them with facts about pH, salinity, turbidity, and dissolved oxygen, all the essential ingredients in a healthy river system.

Our very own Ali Babington talked about how some farming practices, when not managed carefully, can have a big impact on river health - think compaction around riverbanks, nutrients flowing into streams, and muddy water harming aquatic life. Ali also talked about the positive actions that many catchment farmers are undertaking to help improve the health of our waterways, including:

Fencing off waterways to keep livestock out, protecting fragile banks and reducing sediment and nutrient loads & Revegetating riverbanks, which not only stabilises the soil but also filters runoff from nearby farms, and provides a lush home for native animals.

By the end of the session, students walked away with a $\ensuremath{\text{a}}$

solid understanding of the threats to the Hardy Inlet, plus a clear sense of how they, and their community, can and are supporting



healthy waterways for the future.

European wasp successful season







European wasps feed on grapes and other fruit, human and pet food, insects and dead animals like rats, kangaroos and bandicoots.

The European wasp 2024-25 season has drawn to a close with 31 nests found and destroyed!

Western Australians can now relax and enjoy the coming few months knowing that the aggressive and invasive pest has once again been thwarted in its efforts to establish itself in WA. Every year fertilised queens enter WA via vehicles, freight and cargo from interstate where they are well established and a major social, environmental and economic pest.

WA has been entrenched in a battle for the past 48 years to prevent this pest from calling our state home. Since the first detection in 1977 WA has undergone a surveillance and eradication program, developing early detection techniques and trapping systems to locate and destroy any nests that spawn in WA. A large part of this success is due to public awareness and reporting of wasp sightings. Three of the nests destroyed this season were due directly to public reports.

The majority of nests were detected and destroyed in the City of Belmont and City of Canning in industrial areas that take delivery of interstate freight, as well as around the interstate rail freight yards. There were two regional nests destroyed: one in the suburb of Webberton in Geraldton and one in the town of Napier just north of Albany. Around 3000 surveillance traps were deployed in the Perth metropolitan area and in strategic higher risk regional centres.

What to look for

There are similar looking black and yellow wasps in WA, so look for these key characteristics:

- Scavenging on human food and drinks, fruit like grapes, apples and stone fruit, pet food and roadkill (carrion).
- Nest underground nests are HUGE, growing larger than a basketball in a single season, and have a small (golf ball sized) entrance hole.
- Completely black antenna.
- Legs up in flight (rear legs don't dangle).

LITHIUM BATTERY HOUSE FIRE IN AUGUSTA

I came home early that afternoon a couple of weeks ago. Just as well. As I drove up to the house, I heard our fire alarms going off.

What a nuisance, I thought. It wasn't the first time that dust, an insect or a flat battery had set them off. However, this time I smelt smoke as I came in from the back porch. What on earth could that be?

As I entered the kitchen I saw dense black smoke billowing from the hallway. I opened my office door and saw flames shooting from my desk to the ceiling. I grabbed a fire blanket that we keep in the kitchen and threw it over the flames. This slowed them down some but didn't put them out. Meanwhile huge clouds of acrid, jet-black smoke forced me out of the house. I closed the office door as I went, hoping that would starve the fire of oxygen. Fortunately, it did help suppress the fire somewhat.

Jesse Stewart, my super-competent friend and fire captain at Kudardup is on my speed dial. "Call 000 and get a hose in there immediately," he told me as he raced to my place to help. The Augusta firies turned up a few minutes later with their brand-new state of the art firetruck. How lucky that it was training night and many volunteers were in attendance.

Fortunately, Jesse and our wonderful firies saved the house, though there was considerable damage and loss of furniture and clothing. The cause of the fire: my old but still functioning iPad had been sitting on my desk. It was turned off and hadn't been charged recently but it still overheated, smoldered, and caught fire.

Unfortunately, this is increasingly common. iPads use lithium ion batteries, like many devices including smartphones, laptops, power banks, power tools, smartwatches, and even electric toothbrushes. But lithiumion batteries degrade over time, even when turned off and especially if left unused for long periods.

Contact - Paul Sofilas 0419 940 066 oceans2meet@hotmail.com Please inform Paul if planning to participate. This can lead to chemical imbalances in the battery and the risk that the battery becomes "thermally unstable," which means it can explode.

I'd heard of some Samsung phones catching fire, but thought Apple products were so well engineered that they were immune. How wrong was I? In fact, there are now about three house fires every week in Western Australia caused by lithium batteries exploding. When they do catch fire, they burn with intense heat (1500 degrees C) and are extremely difficult to extinguish.

A critical sign that a lithium battery is compromised is any swelling or bulging of the casing. This means gases are building up inside. Other signs include reduced battery life, overheating during charging, or difficulty charging.

After this experience, I'd recommend that if you have old mobile phones, iPads or laptops laying around your home, dispose of them. Just because they're not being used, doesn't mean they won't explode. Never dump one in the regular bin – take it to battery recycling. If you do ever see bulging in a battery, stop using it immediately and isolate it, preferably out of the house and away from anything flammable until it can be disposed of.

Incidentally, you may want to check your home insurance policies. It turns out that ours didn't cover contents destroyed by an electrical fire.
