### THE MARVELS OF MEDICAL SCIENCE

One of the many foundations that Leeuwin Lions have supported over

past years is that of Parkinson's Research, initially due to the loss of a very good member and great contributor to many projects – Lion Ken Kowald.

This support has been reinforced in the recent times with the introduction to the town and community of retired CMDR Philip Orchard AM, a patron of the "N Class Destroyers Association of WA" which visits annually for the NIZAM Memorial weekend.

Many of you will recall the presentations given last year in February and October on "Living with Parkinson's Disease" given by Phil Orchard, along with Chris Cleghorn who together with three colleagues, rowed the Indian Ocean to raise money for Parkinson's research.

As pictured, the Lions have donated \$2500 to the Perron Institute through 'BrainWaves' research towards Parkinson's Disease. Whilst Chris is planning his next row, likely to be Drake's Passage between Cape Horn and Antarctica in December 2026, Professor Sulev Koks has been conducting further research into the disease. One of the areas is a study called TONiC – (Trajectories of Outcome in Neurological Conditions) a quality of life study that collects and measures information about what it is like for people living with neurological conditions, including Parkinson's. Phil is very much involved in this study too.

Phil has recently undergone Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS) surgery which is a therapy treatment for the movement symptoms of Parkinson's including tremor, stiffness or difficulty in walking movement. Just like a pacemaker for the heart, a small neurostimulator is surgically implanted under

the skin just below the collarbone to deliver DBS therapy. The device sends electrical pulses through extension cables to the leads and electrons that are placed in an area of the brain that controls movement. These pulses disrupt some of the brains messages that cause the symptoms associated with Parkinson's.

DBS therapy is reversible and can be discontinued at any time by turning off the neurostimulator or surgically removing the device. Parkinson's is a progressive disease meaning symptoms worsen over time. There are opportunities for those with Parkinson's to consider DBS when the 'window of opportunity' arises. This is when Parkinson's medication does not meet its purpose.

This treatment has made a terrific improvement to Phil's quality of life and is thoroughly recommended for those suffering Parkinson's Disease who are in the 'window'. Lions are pleased that Phil and Isobel Orchard are to be our guests at a Partner's night at the Augusta Hotel on Monday 10th November where Phil will give an update on his inspiring and groundbreaking surgery in aid of medical science.

#### LANDSCAPE LIONS PROVIDE EVERLASTINGS FOR "PINK UP AUGUSTA"

Given winter is not the ideal time for gardening, the Landscape Lions have shown resourcefulness during the winds and storms in creating pink flowers made from scrap wood and iron to place amongst the garden beds for 'PINK UP AUGUSTA" or to brighten up the street for any other function such as the Spring Fete.

The Augusta Police Station has welcomed a familiar face, with Sergeant Simon Harrison returning as Officer in Charge after first serving in the town more than two decades ago.

Having spent the past 20 years building experience across a range of policing roles throughout Western Australia, Sergeant Harrison says the opportunity to return to Augusta is both professionally rewarding and personally meaningful.

"It's a privilege to come back to a community I know and respect, and to work alongside dedicated officers to keep Augusta safe," he said. "A lot has changed since I was



last here, but the sense of community is as strong as ever."

### **Shire news September**

#### Welcome to August from Shire President Julia Jean-Rice

Kaya Augusta,

After what feels like months of non-stop rain, it's hard to believe spring has arrived. Which means the countdown to summer and bushfire season has begun.

At last month's Council meeting we endorsed our new Bushfire Risk Management Plan, which has also been signed of by the Office of Bushfire Risk Management. This is our guide to keeping the community safe by managing fuel loads and access routes on Shire land.

Our planners also reported on how local planning rules can support bushfire safety and identified several advocacy opportunities to raise with the State Government.

Of course, community safety also depends on everyone doing their part. Spring is the perfect time to prepare your property, and I urge you to get fire-ready now.

We've also started planning our wider community consultation on the Turner Street Jetty, which will commence after the elections.

Speaking of which, nominations are open for Council elections until 4 September. Councillors play a vital role in shaping our community's future, and we need diverse voices around the Council table to truly represent our residents and influence local priorities.

Another exciting project is the extension of the Wadandi Track, with \$17.5 million in State funding secured to connect Busselton to Augusta.

This is a joint project with the City of Busselton and we've asked to CEO to appoint a project manager to oversee planning, approvals and construction.

Finally, our CEO Andrea Selvey will be working from the Augusta office on Monday, 8 September and Friday, 26 September. If you'd like to discuss anything directly with her, or simply stop by for a chat, she'd love to see you.

The upcoming local government election will be held on Saturday 18 October 2025. This election will be conducted by postal vote, with ballot packages sent by the WAEC in late September.





Whatever your needs, we will work with you to put a plan into action so that you can live your best life at home in your own community.

If you are over 65, or an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander over 50, you could be eligible for a Home Care Package funded by the Australian Government. Home Care Packages are subsidised by the Australian Government and are available in 4 levels based on your needs.

- **Level 1** basic needs like essential cleaning, pet care, social outings
- Level 2 services like meal preparation, cleaning, gardening and home maintenance




#### **Karridale** Primary School News

#### **Year 6 Emergency Services**

Things are heating up for our Year 6 students! They've begun their Emergency Services Program which runs every Thursday afternoon and where better than to start at the local Volunteer Fire and Emergency Services?

Da Vinci was born in 1452 in the small town of Vinci near Florence

in Tuscany. The humble farm amongst olive groves is still there and is now a museum to Da Vinci. He did not paint prolifically in his early years in spite of his obvious talent, but from 1472 onwards he started to paint seriously both for himself but mostly on commission.

the

The first major painting was The Annunciation in 1472 followed by: The Baptism of Christ, Ginevra De Benci, Virgin of the Rocks, Lady with an Ermine, The Last Supper, Mona Lisa (1503-1517), Virgin and Child with St Anne and Salvator Mundi. His works spanned mainly religious subjects and commissions, and he demonstrated a mastery of technique and exploration of human form and emotion.

Mona Lisa, whose real name was Lisa del Gioconde was painted on commission from Francesco de Gioconde,

her husband. In Italy the painting is known by the name La Gioconda.

Da Vinci was never entirely satisfied with his Mona Lisa and reworked it for many years. The painting was never given to Francesco De Gioconde. It moved to France when LDV was employed by the French King Francois 1 in a chateau on the Loire, where LDV painted many frescos on the chateau walls. He reworked the Mona Lisa and never considered her finished. Next month, just for fun, I will relate the story of the adventures and misadventures of the Mona Lisa following the death of LDV in 1519.

Her enigmatic smile, may be (methinks) the result of non-existent dentistry back in the 1500s - she perhaps did not want to open her mouth! Each of LDV's paintings of women had the same closed mouth (almost) smile.

LDV is almost as renowned for his fascination with and mastery of science, maths, anatomy and engineering. His technical drawing skills were quite extraordinary although he never built any of his inventions on paper.




We, at the Art Club, are very saddened to have recently lost Mary Palmer (*left*) who passed on 3rd August 2025.



# Help Track Australia's Changing Seas Join Redmap!

The Range Extension Database and Mapping project – or Redmap – is a national citizen science initiative that invites Australians to share sightings of marine species that are unusual or uncommon in their local waters. These community observations help scientists track which species may be extending their ranges in response to changes in our oceans, such as warming seas and shifting currents.

Australia has one of the largest coastlines in the world, and monitoring it is a huge challenge. That's where you come in. By reporting an unusual fish, lobster, shell, or anything else you've spotted while diving, fishing, swimming, or beachcombing, you're contributing to a national database that can act as an early warning system for environmental change. This information helps highlight regions and species experiencing the greatest shifts, directing valuable research and guiding marine management decisions.

Importantly, Redmap data is already making a difference. Recent scientific studies have used community sightings to better understand how tropical fish are moving south into cooler waters, and what determines whether they survive temperate winters. Research published in Global Change Biology and other journals shows that Redmap observations are filling crucial gaps. For example, 91% of range shifts for over 200 marine species reviewed between 2013 and 2022, would not have been detected by traditional science alone. These insights are helping researchers and managers forecast ecological change, plan for shifting ecosystems, and support coastal communities.

Your contribution doesn't stop with logging a sighting. You can help spread the word by telling friends, sharing Redmap's posts on social media, giving a talk at your local club, or simply encouraging others to keep an eye out while they're on the water. The more people who know about Redmap, the more sightings we collect, and the clearer our picture of Australia's changing marine environment becomes.

Across the globe, species are already "moving house" in response to climate change. With your help, Redmap Australia is building a powerful tool for scientists, managers, and communities to share data, collaborate, and better understand the future of our oceans.





# Biosecurity Blitz 2025: Scanning for Land and Water Invaders

### Vigilance is key

Spotting invasive species early helps prevent pest outbreaks and protects our local environment. When community members report what they see, we can identify these species quickly and act before they spread. Your observations make a real difference in managing these threats.

### Power in numbers

Keen-eyed observers across Western Australia can sign up to take part in DPIRD's <u>Biosecurity Blitz</u> 2025 (16 October to 16 November) to report not just pests, but also unsung beneficial organisms that play a vital role in maintaining ecological balance, pollination, and naturally help control pest populations.

Past Biosecurity Blitz observations revealed increased sightings of beneficial bugs like hover flies and lacewings in urban gardens, clear signs that habitat-friendly practices are taking root across local communities. Predators, such as lacewings, ladybirds, and predatory mites, actively hunt and consume pests. Parasitic wasps, hover flies, and even some spiders, lay their eggs on or inside pest species. Their larvae then feed on the host, often killing it in the process.

Community observations help shape the story of WA's biodiversity. What new discoveries will this year's Biosecurity Blitz uncover? DPIRD encourages people of all ages to sign up, download the <a href="MyPestGuide® Reporter">MyPestGuide® Reporter</a> app, submit sightings, and share photos to help map beneficial species and confirm the absence of exotic pests across WA.

### Don't forget the waterways

Biosecurity Blitz 2025 isn't just about gardens and bushland—it's also about what's lurking in our waterways. Invasive aquatic species like carp and the carpet sea squirt (*Didemnum vexillum*)

threaten WA's biodiversity and can spread through floods, fishing, boating, and pet release. Other pests like non-native crustaceans, molluscs, and worms, can disrupt ecosystems and impact industries like aquaculture and tourism.

Even hardy aquarium fish can become invasive if released. Pearl cichlids, for example, are not native to Australia and compete aggressively with local species. Originally 5–15 cm as pets, they've grown to over 30 cm in Perth waterways!

While taking part in the Blitz, report any sightings of released aquarium fish using the MyPestGuide® Reporter app. Your actions help protect WA's aquatic ecosystems. Happy hunting!

### **Building Soil with Fungal-Rich Compost**

What do worms, wire, and waste have in common? They're the building blocks of healthier soils, as a group of local landholders discovered at our hands-on Johnson-Su Bioreactor & BEAM Workshop earlier this month.

Led by soil systems expert Mark Tupman (Productive Ecology) and hosted at Wayfinder Estate, this session

was all about making the magic of fungaldominant compost.



Participants didn't just learn - they got their hands dirty. In just a few hours, they braved the weather to:

- Build a fully functioning Johnson-Su bioreactor, a low-maintenance composting unit that requires no turning
- Discover how to create the ideal conditions for fungal microbes to thrive
- Learn how to use that finished compost to boost soil biology and bring life back to tired pastures
- And as an added bonus, they built a DIY worm farm!

Why fungal compost? Because fungus-rich soils support deeper roots, better nutrient cycling, and greater resilience in times of drought or stress - making it a perfect fit for our farming conditions.

With the abundance of rain, the Community Garden is looking fresh and revitalized.

There is nothing better or the plants than the water from the heavens, except the wicking beds, which are a little waterlogged, so the drain pipes face down for a while.

We have started preparing for a stall at the Garden Club Spring Fete on Saturday, October 4th. We received an assortment of pots kindly donated by Aprille, which we will pot up with some colourful annuals and herbs.

The CG is also organising night markets on Saturday, December 6th, 1-8 pm. We will keep you informed on the progression of this.

Winter is a great time to go Bird Watching in Augusta.

Birdwatching around Augusta provides opportunities for impressive coastal scenery and walks through Karri / Jarrah forests, or along the Blackwood River with a wide range of birdlife, including 11 species endemic to WA. Donovan St Reserve – is a 83ha site on the shores of Hardy Inlet close to and easily accessed from the northern end of Augusta via Donovan St, then left into Blackwood Ave and right into Pelican Rise. Park at the end.

There is a pleasant walk into town to the right but walk left for the reserve. A range of habitats includes riparian vegetation (plants that grow on the banks of rivers/streams), low heath in shallow soils on granite outcrops, Marri/Jarrah woodland and damper understorey areas. Look for White-naped Honeyeater, Spotted Pardalote, White-browed Scrubwren, Red winged Fairy-wren, Western Golden Whistler & Grey Shrike-thrush.

A variety of waterbirds can be found along the river margins, keep an eye out for migratory waders when the tide is low. Many other bird species found include the Little Egret, Pelicans, Yellow-billed Spoonbills, Ibis and Little Black Cormorants. You may be very lucky to see a Black Bittern.

Or take a walk along the old rail trail, to see Golden Whistlers, Splendid and Red winged Fairy-wrens, White-breasted Robin, Crested Shrike-tit, Grey Currawong and many other species.

Keep an eye to the skies as sometimes you many be lucky enough to see Red-tailed Black-Cockatoo and Baudin's Black-Cockatoo or any of the many raptors living around Augusta including the Wedge Tailed Eagle.

Take a drive from Augusta to Cape Leeuwin to visit the lighthouse and old waterwheel. This area is a favourite haunt of the Rock Parrot, sometimes feeding on the grass in front of the café. The Southern Emu-wren can also sometimes be seen in vegetation around the café. Cape Leeuwin is an excellent place to go sea birding in winter. Southern and Northern Giant-Petrel, Cape and Great-winged Petrel, Black-browed, Shy and Indian Yellow-nosed Albatross, Wilson's Storm-Petrel and Australasian Gannet have all been sighted here.

From the Augusta Boat Harbour, a walk along the beach towards Dead Finish may also offer opportunities for seabirds. Species found include Eastern Reef Egret, Caspian Tern, Australasian Darter and Sooty / Pied Oystercatchers.

Keep an eye out for the Ospreys from Turner Street, they often fly out to the boat harbour and beyond in search of a meal.




